

**Regular Meeting #10-05
Fairfield County Commissioners' Office
February 2, 2010**

9:30 a.m. Meeting with Shane Farnsworth

The Board of Commissioners met with County Economic Development Director Shane Farnsworth to discuss various issues. Commissioners present were Judith Shupe, Jon Myers and Mike Kiger. Also present were Jason Dolin, Carl Burnett and Scott Zody.

Mr. Farnsworth presented the Board with an overview of the National Development Council's Certification Program, stating that the Council is bringing the program to Ohio in an effort to provide accreditation to Ohio development specialists. The program is a 4-part course broken out into one-week segments over the course of a year, and is focused on small city/community CDBG funding recipients, and Fairfield County qualifies for the program. Each one week class will be held in Columbus during the months of March, June and October of 2010 and January of 2011.

Mr. Farnsworth added that the classes could be paid for utilizing Enterprise Zone funds, and not have any cost to the General Fund. Total cost of the accreditation is \$5,000, but the Ohio Department of Development is offering a one-time discount of \$2,500 by using Federal stimulus funds to offset the cost.

Commissioner Shupe asked Mr. Farnsworth if he intended to attend all 4 classes, and Mr. Farnsworth stated that attendance is required at all 4 to receive accreditation. Commissioner Kiger asked Mr. Farnsworth to clarify where the funds would come from to cover the cost, and Mr. Farnsworth explained that all the businesses that participate in the Enterprise Zone Program pay fees into the Enterprise Zone Fund, and this is a qualified expense, as the training and accreditation help further the Enterprise Zone Program.

Commissioner Shupe stated that since the program would not cost the General Fund anything and the cost is discounted, it seems to be a reasonable request. Mr. Farnsworth stated that an additional benefit is the classes being offered in Columbus, and since he is living in Pickerington, there will be no travel costs either. Commissioner Kiger asked if the Revolving loan Fund Committee needs to approve the expenditure, and Mr. Farnsworth stated they would not. The Board approved Mr. Farnsworth's request to attend the accreditation program.

The Board discussed the upcoming State of the County event, and Commissioner Kiger stated he would like to work Mr. Farnsworth into his presentation to discuss forward-looking economic development initiatives in the county. Commissioner Shupe stated the Board still needs to finalize an outline, and provided Mr. Farnsworth with a copy of the previous year's presentation to review.

Mr. Farnsworth stated the economy is what it is, and everyone feels there is a need for the Board to portray confidence and an upbeat attitude for 2010. Commissioner Shupe stated the theme of the presentation will be "The Challenges of Providing Quality County Services"

Mr. Zody suggested incorporating some of the recent successes of the Revolving Loan Fund into the presentation, and Commissioner Shupe stated there is usually information relative to the RLF provided for interested businesses at the event as well. Mr. Farnsworth stated there are several programs available through the USDA relative to development (over 50) and many have stimulus funding attached to them. Some examples are tax credits and foreign trade zones. In fact, Westernmans and the Wool Growers are both participating in Foreign Trade Zone initiatives.

Commissioner Myers asked what the Wool Growers do at their facility, and Mr. Farnsworth stated they purchase and sort wool by grade and do some processing, but they are sending their product worldwide.

Commissioner Shupe asked Mr. Farnsworth if he had any questions relative to the job or his office, and Mr. Farnsworth stated that he is enjoying the job thus far, and is learning about a new technology initiative at the Fairfield County Career Center. Commissioner Shupe asked what programs were involved, and Mr. Farnsworth stated it involves 6 different areas where the learning can be applied and the student participating could be used for short-term internships, some could be used by the county for small projects such as updating web sites.

Mr. Farnsworth thanked the Board for approving the Enterprise Zone agreement for Westernmans at their Regular Meeting, and Commissioner Myers asked what the agreement would entail, and Mr. Farnsworth stated it provides a tax abatement for the company in their new line of products for the nuclear energy industry, and should create at least 50 new jobs over the next 4 years.

Commissioner Myers asked if Ms. Kauffman is keeping busy, and Mr. Farnsworth stated she is very busy with several programs including the Revolving Loan Fund. Commissioner Myers asked if Mr. Farnsworth has been able to get out and meet folks in the community, and Mr. Farnsworth stated he has, and has a meeting scheduled with Senator Tim Schaffer next week, along with the Chamber of Commerce and the department of Development Regional representative.

Commissioner Myers asked what will happen with the Elks Club now that it has closed, and Mr. Farnsworth stated there are several issues between the local chapter and the national club that need resolved, and it is unfortunate because the building itself is a nice compliment to downtown Lancaster.

Review, cont.

The Commissioners discussed the contract amendment for a contract with Wachtel & McAnally for architectural services for a new county public safety facility. Commissioner Myers asked what a Phase 1 document is for, and Mr. Zody explained that the Phase 1 document is required by the state Bureau of Adult Detention (BAD) for any local correctional facility. The Phase 1 consists of basic facility designs and operational plans, and those must be approved by the BAD prior to continuing the planning and construction process. The operational plan is essentially what the Board has been referring to as a "White Paper".

Commissioner Myers asked who would pay for a facility downtown if it includes a Municipal Court, and Commissioner Kiger stated the city understands that it would have to pay for the construction of the municipal court piece. Commissioner Myers stated the city seems to be intent upon placing some form of county wide issue on the ballot to pay for it, and Commissioner Kiger stated they understand the costs must be shared, and a county wide ballot would likely be needed regardless of the site selected. Commissioner Myers asked if the Public Safety Committee had discussed how to pay for the facility, and Mr. Zody stated they had not, as they understand the Commissioners would have to make those decisions, but the Committee has clearly maintained that the city would have to bear the cost of the court structure.

Commissioner Shupe stated the White Paper should have been completed months ago and turned in for stimulus funding, and Commissioner Kiger stated that he is a member of the County Commissioners Association Public Safety Committee and there clearly has been no stimulus funding dedicated to jail or correctional facilities. In addition, the Board had agreed to wait on the environmental results of the Lancaster Glass site prior to making a final decision, based upon a recommendation from the county Public Safety Committee.

Regarding the potential sale of county property near the Fairfield Medical Center, Commissioner Myers stated he had spoken with FMC representatives and was awaiting a response.

The Board discussed the vacant Facilities Manager position, and Mr. Zody provided a copy of the most recent position description for the Board's review. Commissioner Kiger stated he would like to change the working hours and make the position a 40-hour per week job instead of 35 hours. Ms. Cordle stated the Board has the discretion to do that, and the weekly hours and working hours were set through agreement with the previous employee to accommodate his request.

Commissioner Shupe stated the Board could encourage the new person to flex their hours to provide supervision to both the day and night shift, and Ms. Cordle stated the position is a salaried position, and the Board has the discretion to set working hours and conditions. Commissioner Kiger stated he would also like to require the employee to utilize a county vehicle for work-related travel, and Commissioner Myers stated that issue should be addressed once a new person is in the job, as it may be more difficult that it appears to require that. Commissioner Myers agreed that the position should be 40 hours per week.

Commissioner Shupe stated she does not believe the Board needs to rush into filling the position right away, noting that the Board waited for 6 months prior to filling the Economic Development Director position. Commissioner Kiger stated that Mr. Vogel very clearly told the Board that he was willing to take on the position temporarily, but did not want to be there for months at a time.

Commissioner Myers stated that he does not wish to leave the position vacant for a long period, and stated the Board should discuss the temporary situation with Mr. Vogel, as he has a couple of large utility projects coming up soon.

Mr. Zody asked the Board to look over the position description and consider any changes, suggesting that perhaps the safety program be combined under one position or the other, as it currently seems to be split between the Facilities Manager and Jay Shepherd in Human Resources. Ms. Cordle stated that there needs to be coordination between the two positions, and Mr. Shepherd handles much of the administrative duties and participates in the safety inspections and walk-through, but the Facilities Manager is responsible for doing the actual work. Mr. Zody stated that he would not expect the actual repair work to change, but thought it might be more efficient to have one person responsible for ensuring safety measures are taken rather than two.

The Board will review the position description and discuss on Thursday following the Roundtable and Regular Meeting.

The Board discussed an email from Dave Conley relative to the potential refinancing of county bonds. Mr. Zody stated these bonds were briefly in the market to refinance last fall, and the Board had asked he and Mr. Conley to continue preparations in the event interest rates declined again to make the refinance worthwhile. Commissioner Myers noted that it appears the county would save approximately \$160,000 over the remaining life of the bonds, but it would cost approximately \$87,000. Mr. Zody stated it was not clear if the savings is a net or gross savings, and he would contact Mr. Conley to confirm.

The Board discussed a vacancy on the regional Resource, Conservation and Development Council, where Dick Kilbarger, the Soil & Water Conservation representative, is retiring. Commissioner Shupe noted that President Obama has proposed zeroing out funding for RC&D's nationwide, and they may not have any funding after this year.

The Board directed Mr. Zody to have the Fiscal Clerk process and pay invoices for the RC&D annual dues and the annual dues for the Baltimore Chamber of Commerce.

The Board directed Mr. Zody to check with Roger Miller to see if he is willing to serve as the County Apiary inspector for 2010. Mr. Zody stated he usually receives paperwork from the Department of Agriculture relative to the appointment, but has not received anything to date.

1:30 p.m. Health Department Merger Meeting

The Board of Commissioners met with representatives from the County Health Department, the District Advisory Council, and the City of Lancaster to discuss the future of the Combined Health District. Commissioners present were Mike Kiger, Jon Myers and Judith Shupe. Also present were Carl Burnett, Paul Martin Kathie Whitlock, Terre Vandevoot, Brian Oliver, Jason Dolin, Roy Hart, Frank Hirsch, Mayor Dave Smith, and Scott Zody.

Commissioner Myers stated that the Board would like to get to the major points of discussion relative to whether the Health District remains a Combined District or revert back to a General Health District (which would occur if Lancaster drops out at the end of 2010). Commissioner Myers asked Mr. Hart to provide an overview of the Revised Code relative to the County's obligations to provide housing for the Health District.

Mr. Hart stated the ORC states the Commissioners have no obligation to provide housing if the Health District already owns a facility, which is the case in Fairfield County. Commissioner Myers asked if anyone present disagreed with that assessment, and there were no objections noted.

Commissioner Myers asked Mr. Hirsch to provide his thoughts and comments relative to what ends he hope to achieve with the Health District. Mr. Martin responded by stating that the Board of Health (BOH) and the Health Department have been exploring the issue for several years with respect to the Department budget. Mr. Martin stated the BOH would like to explore the possibility of divesting the current building, as it is costing the Department tens of thousands of dollars to maintain each year, but the problem is they have no where else to go.

Commissioner Myers stated that he was informed that the building costs roughly \$159,000 per year to maintain, and Mr. Hirsch stated that figure is correct, and includes both building and grounds maintenance.

Mr. Hirsch stated he has explored restoration and renovation of the building but there is no funding in his current budget to cover the costs, and a recent grant they applied for through the health clinic for Federal funds did not transpire. Ms. Vandervoort stated the grant also required a 25% match, which the Health Department did not have.

Mr. Martin noted the health clinic will be totally separate from the Department in the future, and is already in the process of separation and has moved to Fairfield Medical Center.

Commissioner Kiger asked what the staffing needs for the building are, and Mr. Hirsch stated there are currently 45 employees, down from 60, and there was a study done relative to space needs that concluded the Department should utilize approximately 17-20,000 square feet. Those figures do not include the clinic.

Commissioner Myers asked if the funding source for the clinic is also separate, and Mr. Hirsch stated the clinic has become a 501c3 non-profit, and will be funded through grants and donations. Mr. Martin added that the Department could potentially do some contract work with the clinic but that would have to be kept separate from the Department budget.

Commissioner Myers asked if Pickerington is permanently out to the District, and Mr. Hirsch stated they are out for 2010, and have a 1-year contract with Franklin County, so it is unclear. Commissioner Myers asked what the City of Lancaster intended to do, Mayor Smith stated that Pickerington is out and the Department attempted to negotiate an agreement to keep Pickerington in, and Lancaster believes it should be permitted to negotiate as well. Mayor Smith stated that the rates for the city as opposed to the unincorporated areas are different, and the city pays more, and he is not sure why. Mayor Smith stated he would like to see the Lancaster rate reduced or at least renegotiate the merger contract, as they like having representation on the BOH. Mayor Smith noted that prior to the combined merger 10 years ago, the County paid for housing the Department.

Commissioner Shupe asked if the county pays a per capita fee, and Mr. Hirsch stated the rates vary between the townships and villages based upon valuation as determined by the Auditor. The City of Lancaster and City of Pickerington were paying more per capita than the townships and villages.

Mr. Zody stated that Deputy Auditor Ed Laramee had planned to be here today, but had to go out of state due to a death in the family. Mr. Zody stated that as he understands the process, the Health Department budget is based upon both self-generated fee revenues and the allocations provided under the merger contract. The Health Department presents the Budget Commission with its revenue and expenditure estimates, and the Budget Commission determines the annual allocation needed to "fill the gap". Of the first \$600,000 shortfall, Lancaster, per the contract, pays \$250,000 and the remainder is allocated to the townships and villages. Anything over \$600,000 is allocated equally to all.

Mr. Martin asked if the Department divested the building, would the county be responsible for housing whether the district remained a General or Combined entity? Mr. Hart stated that he believes the county would be responsible for housing if that would occur.

Mayor Smith stated a number of options were considered 10 years ago, such as the Liberty Center, Fairfield Medical and the Miller building (current location) but nothing was actually done. Mr. Martin stated that looking at the county situation he understands the budget is difficult but timing-wise, 2011 is when the current merger contract expires and something must be done.

Mayor Smith stated the DAC always seems to discuss funding for support of the Health Department, but recently has been eliminating fees that would offer other wise help. Commissioner Myers asked the Mayor if there was a particular number he was looking for, and Mayor Smith stated anything lower is better, as the city is currently spending approximately \$296,000 per year and would like that to be closer to \$250,000.

Mr. Hirsch stated he was looking at the contract and the numbers per capita, and Pickerington is currently paying Franklin County \$5.73 per capita, and he had offered them \$5.36 per capita and was turned down. Mayor Smith stated part of Pickerington's reason for leaving is the housing issue. Mr. Martin stated there are also ADA concerns that need addressed.

Commissioner Myers stated the whole issue can be complicated and hard to follow, and asked what the costs of a new facility would be compared to the existing one, and Mayor Smith stated if the city contracts for services and the operating costs increase rather than decrease, there are no savings.

Mr. Oliver stated it all hinges on the contract and how the operational costs are passed on. Commissioner Shupe asked where the extra costs get passed on, and Mr. Hirsch stated he has certain fixed costs that must be passed on or programs would have to be dropped.

Commissioner Shupe asked where the costs would be passed on, and Mr. Hirsch stated he would like to see both the city and the townships & villages help with those costs. Mr. Martin stated one option might be to have fixed costs and an inflationary rate of increase.

Mr. Oliver asked if everyone paid the same per capita rate, and Mr. Hirsch stated they do not, and the rates vary from approximately \$2 to over \$7. Mayor Smith stated if the County would participate like they used to that would help keep everyone's costs down. Mr. Hirsch stated it would help if they could save the \$159,000 maintenance costs.

Ms. Vandervoort noted there are some looming expenses, such as the roof and the retaining wall that could cost as much as \$250,000 to fix. Mr. Hirsch noted the building is down to one operational boiler and there may be some mold issues as well.

Commissioner Shupe asked if any alternate locations have been explored, and Mr. Martin stated he does not believe the Department can afford the costs of rent for new space. Mr. Hirsch stated he has looked at renovations with the clinic but they are not feasible.

Commissioner Myers stated that if the Department opts out of the building or if the county participates in contributing to some of the operating costs there may be some possibilities. Mayor Smith stated if the city negotiates a lower deal the costs must be made up somewhere. Mr. Martin stated it doesn't make sense for the Department to stay in the current facility.

Mr. Oliver asked if the city is in a better position to negotiate as a member or a non-member, and Mr. Hirsch stated both the BOH and the DAC must approve the contract if the city is a non-member and is only contracting for service.

Mr. Oliver stated that aspect needs to be thought over, and Mayor Smith stated the city is willing to negotiate regardless. Mr. Martin noted the contract also determines the number of seats the city has on the BOH, and Mr. Oliver noted the same would apply to Pickerington.

Ms. Vandervoort asked if the BOH is better of as a Combined or General entity, and Mr. Hirsch stated that one thing to consider is that Canal Winchester should qualify for city status after the 2010 census, and they may be interested in joining the district, and Reynoldsburg might also be interested in contracting for service.

Mr. Martin noted that Pickerington has indicated they will not return as long as the Department is in the Miller building.

Commissioner Myers noted that he can see the \$250,000 allocation in the contract, and asked how much the additional allocation has increased recently, and Mayor Smith stated it has increased by approximately \$10,000 per year over the past few years.

Commissioner Myers noted the Budget Commission meets in April, and Mr. Martin stated the DAC meets in March, and they should know what direction this is heading by then.

Commissioner Myers stated the Board needs to have a discussion on what participation they could or should have in the matter, and Mr. Martin stated he does not want something dropped into the Commissioners laps and there needs to be some transition

plan. Mayor Smith stated there needs to be a price tag placed upon whether the Department stays in the Miller building or moves to another location, and Mr. Martin stated that the Department does not want to move to "palatial" quarters, and Commissioner Shupe stated the Commissioner would obviously have concerns with that.

The group agreed to meet again on Tuesday, February23rd at 1:30 p.m. for a follow up meeting.

Adjournment

With no further business to come before the Board, on the motion of Judith Shupe and the second of Jon Myers, the Board of Commissioners voted to adjourn at 2:30 p.m.
