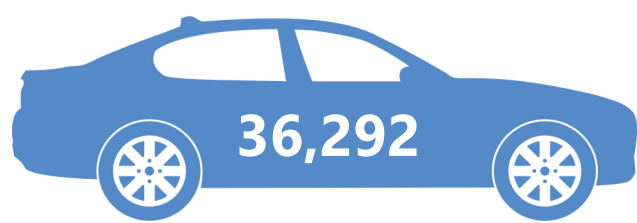

FUNDING MAKES IT POSSIBLE

Of the local funding Child and Adult Protective Services receives, \$3.1 million comes from the tax levy, while \$1.4 million comes from the County's General Revenue Fund.

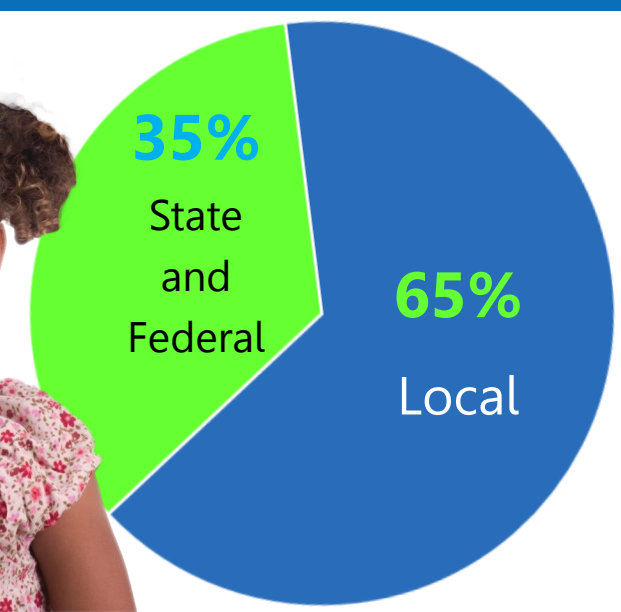
