






JUNE 29TH DERECHO

EMA served the community in response to the June 20 Derecho.

A Derecho is a widespread, longlived, straight-line windstorm that is associated with a fast-moving band of severe thunderstorms.

Winds were commonly above 60 mph with numerous reports of winds exceeding 80 mph. Some areas reported isolated pockets of winds greater than 100 mph.

FAIRFIELD COUNTY UTILITIES

The Utilities staff of 23 professionals, serves over 6,000 customers, operating 5 wastewater and 2 water treatment plants in Fairfield County.

We provide over 1.8 million gallons of drinkable water and treat over 2.3 million gallons of used water every day.

GROUND BROKE FOR THE NEW UTILITIES OFFICE...





For the third consecutive year, Fairfield County has maintained its number **ONE** ranking in the State of Ohio for Cross County Titling.

Due to increased title volume, the Pickerington Title Office was recently remodeled, resulting in expanding our office space.

This improvement will create a more comfortable environment for our customers and enable us to better serve the public.

The Pickerington Title Office remodel and lease agreement was completely paid for from the Title Department Fund.







The Clerk of Courts Title Department gave \$300,000 back to the General Fund. This contribution fully funded the Fairfield County Sheriff's Street Crime Apprehension Program (SCRAP).









Through the Clerk of Courts website, all electronically stored records can be easily accessed.

The Clerk of Courts was able to lease and renovate a Document Storage Facility to comply with the Homeland Security's Mandated Record Retention Requirement.

These projects were funded through the Clerk's Funds.

No General Funds were used.



A partnership with Franklin County was implemented to develop a mandated offsite and out-of-county Records Retention Disaster Master Plan.

This collaboration is a request from the Kasich Administration to help counties satisfy these mandated requests while incurring the least possible expense.

This Fairfield-Franklin cooperative endeavor is one of the first in the State of Ohio.





Plans are being made to improve the internet and website accessibility for both intra-county and the general public to more efficiently and effectively retrieve records, files and documents.

The RPC successfully completed the Neighborhood Revitalization Program grant application on behalf of Fairfield County.

The grant application includes various community improvements to the Village of Pleasantville.

The county was awarded the maximum grant amount of \$300,000.






Local Food Council ---- RPC spearheaded a plan called "Fairfield Growing" to help link the county's farmers, producers, and retailers.



This plan was completed with the help of the County Economic Development Department, Soil and Water Conservation District, Destination Downtown Lancaster, Lancaster-Fairfield Chamber of Commerce, and The Ohio State University.



Growing for Our Future





RPC has organized the Fairfield County Local Food Council to continue the dialogue among the key stakeholders and to help promote and implement "Fairfield Growing."

In 2012 the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission received a grant to use Fairfield Growing as a model throughout the state.



The RPC Active Transportation Committee helped identify corridors where **Share the Road** signs could be installed to provide alternative transportation options throughout the county.

In 2012, with the assistance of the Fairfield County Engineer's office, the county's first Share the Road signs were installed.





The new Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Plain maps went into effect for Fairfield County in January 2012.

The RPC is the flood plain manager for the county and assisted residents with the effects of the new maps on their properties.

Help Me Grow:

In 2012 Fairfield County Help Me Grow served 427 children birth to three years of age.

For State Fiscal Year 2012, Fairfield County Help Me Grow received a 100% compliance rating from ODH, for serving children in a timely manner.

Safe Kids Coalition (Childhood Safety initiative)

\$5,000 worth of infant and toddler car seats (50) were distributed to eligible families throughout Fairfield County.

Prevention Works for a Drug Free Fairfield County is very proud of its successes in reducing substance abuse among our community's youth.

From 2004 to 2012 frequent (30 day use) tobacco use in high school senior decreased from 24.1% to 14.1%.

Between 2004 and 2012, frequent (30 day use) Rx Drug use dropped from 9.3% to 8.5% to 7.2% to 5.7% to 2.4% an all-time low of Fairfield County twelfth graders.

In 2004, 49% of Fairfield County high school seniors reported that Rx Drugs were easy to access compared to 2012, 35.7% reported easy access.

From 2010 to 2011 Compliance Checks revealed a **21% reduction in sales of alcohol and tobacco to minors throughout Fairfield County.**



FAMILY, ADULT, & CHILDREN FIRST COUNCIL

Multi-System Youth Committee

The average cost per child placed in out-of-home residential placements by the Council in 2011 was \$15,100.00. In 2012 that cost was \$9,779.48.

MSY worked with over 150 families in 2012.

49 families participated in the Intensive Home Base Program assisting youth to remain safely in their homes.

PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE MISSION STATEMENT

justice for all people and to be responsive to the needs and
concerns of those impacted by crime in our community



CIVIL DIVISION – PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE

Jason Dolin is the Chief Assistant Prosecutor of the Civil Division. He and Attorney Jeff Porter work closely with County Treasurer Brian Kuhn to collect delinquent real estate taxes – more than \$150,000 have been collected in 2013 alone!



JUVENILE DIVISION — PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE

Julie Blaisdell is the Chief Assistant Prosecutor of the Juvenile Division. Other assistants working in that division include Lori Thomson and Zoe Lamberson.

Our juvenile caseload continues to increase. On March 18, 2013, a Fairfield County jury found a physician guilty of failure to report known or suspected child abuse in the Fairfield County Common Pleas Court Juvenile Division, Judge Williams presiding.



JUVENILE DIVISION— PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE

This division represents the county in cases involving juvenile delinquency, unruly children, and traffic violations when juveniles were driving. The division also represents Child Protective Services in abuse, neglect and dependency cases.



CRIMINAL DIVISION – PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE

Melissa A. Schiffel is the Chief Assistant
Prosecuting Attorney of the Criminal Division.
Other assistants in the division include Darren
Meade, Crystal Bennett, James Davey, Darcy
Cook, Jocelyn Kelly, and Zoe Lamberson.



FROM THE PROSECUTOR'S PEN

The office of the prosecuting attorney generally inquires into the commission of felony crimes occurring within the county. We work with many law enforcement agents that work for many agencies including the Fairfield County Sheriff's Office, Lancaster Police Department, Pickerington Police Department, Baltimore Police Department, Sugar Grove Police Department, Reynoldsburg Police Department, Ohio State Highway Patrol, Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation, Fairfield-Hocking Major Crimes Unit and SCRAP. Many other agencies need assistance from our office. In fact, there are more than 250 law enforcement officers that can present cases to the Fairfield County Prosecutor's Office, not including officers from the Columbus Police Department and the Franklin County Sheriff's Office.



FROM THE PROSECUTOR'S PEN (CONT.)

The overriding mission of a prosecutor's office is to seek justice. We have an active victim/witness division that assists victims of crime on current cases and cases that have been concluded. Jennifer Boggs, Maria Schmelzer, Ashley Walters and Michelle Triplett are dedicated to assisting victims in their time of need and are actively engaged in educating the public about how to avoid crime and to encourage victims to report crimes. David Kessler works as an investigator for JFS and the Prosecutor's Office and Scott Hargrove is a full-time investigator for the Prosecutor's Office. They both investigate cases, work with officers from the various departments, and assist in crime prevention.





FROM THE PROSECUTOR'S PEN (CONT.)

The office as a whole has never been busier. In 2013 alone prosecutors have been in jury trials more than 29 days. In fact, 8 of the 10 prosecutors that work on criminal or juvenile cases have prosecuted jury trials in 2013. Jury trials are anticipated to occur the next three weeks also. The appellate division of the prosecutor's office is busy because so many cases have resulted in guilty verdicts. In fact as of March 21, 2013, two appellate briefs have been filed in the Ohio Supreme Court and seven have been filed in the Fifth District Court of Appeals.

I thank my terrific staff for their dedication and hard work on behalf of the public. I also am grateful for the service from our county's employees on behalf of the public. Public employees strive to do their jobs well and are frequently under- appreciated and misunderstood. As a member of the public, I thank all of our county's employees.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT REVOLVING LOAN FUND


The purpose of the Revolving Loan Fund is to assist new or existing small businesses achieve their goals and create jobs in Fairfield County.

- •Funding for 80 projects with loans totaling \$3.7 million










