Jerry Starner of Amanda Township stated the Carnation Solar project is close to his home. He added that many county residents may not be fully aware of the proposed solar projects, but those in his area are very aware. He understands the concerns regarding property rights but added that he does not think the rights of others should impact his own property rights.

Commissioner Fix stated that the Commissioners do not typically address public comments but wanted to explain to Mr. Starner that the Board's responsibility is to all residents of the county. The idea that the entire county is opposed to the solar projects is not accurate. It does not mean that the Commissioners do not care about the opinions of those who have voiced opposition, but the Commission does not want to make a definitive decision which will make an impact on everyone before the hearing. We have constituencies that are very concerned and in opposition of industrial solar and others who are in favor or are not concerned.

Director Szabrak spoke about Anduril, a manufacturer of autonomous systems, and stated that the manufacturer is eager to start production and will add 4000 jobs at their facility. The proximity of the facility to the county will bring lots of opportunities to the northwest area of Fairfield County.

Commissioner Fix stated that conversations continue regarding sites in Fairfield County that could be hubs for suppliers to Intel and Anduril. He met with MORPC to discuss a connector from 33 to I-70. He added that the county is in a great location and that there is a lot of interest from companies to bring additional industry to Fairfield County.

Updates from Elected Officials and Department Heads

Treasurer Bahnsen stated that real estate tax bills are in production and will be sent out soon.

Auditor Brown stated she has been impressed by the collaboration with the Treasurer's Office on the tax bills. She congratulated Curt Truax from her office who had been promoted to Map Room Manager. She stated the 2024 Map of the Year was the Mound Builders Map and thanked the payroll team for getting the W2's out in record time and the finance team for processing more than 1100 invoices.

Mr. Szabrak touched on the workforce board and added that they will be heavily involved in the hiring for Anduril.

Commissioner Fix asked if there are any county facilities that are negatively impacted by the cold temperatures.

Mr. Kochis stated that the Courthouse and Hall of Justice buildings are particularly susceptible to cold temperatures and added that there are four county HVAC systems currently experiencing issues. He also reported that the Facilities team and IT are working on a new process regarding doors and the scheduling of rooms.

Mr. Neeley stated the project to replace access control door readers has started and his team is working with the contractor to swap out the readers.

Ohio Partners with Anduril to "Rebuild the Arsenal" for Essential National Security Needs

Defense firm to hire 4,000+ workers at new Pickaway County manufacturing facility

(PICKAWAY COUNTY, Ohio)— Ohio Governor Mike DeWine, Lt. Governor Jon Husted, and <u>JobsOhio</u> announced today that <u>Anduril Industries</u>, a leader in defense technology, will establish an advanced manufacturing facility in Pickaway County, bringing more than 4,000 new production and service jobs to Ohio by 2035.

The five-million-square-foot facility, named Arsenal-1, represents the largest single job creation and new payroll project in Ohio's history and is projected to add nearly \$1 billion to Ohio's gross domestic product.

Based in Costa Mesa, Calif., Anduril aims to "Rebuild the Arsenal" of U.S. military weapons and platforms by "hyperscaling" manufacturing with advanced software and production technologies. The Ohio facility will strengthen the state's position as a nationwide leader in the development of better, faster, and more affordable critical national defense products to help the United States deter, defend, and lead in the world's <u>Great Power Competition</u>.

"Ohio's history of advancing aviation, aerospace, and national defense runs deep, but what sets this state apart is our readiness to embrace the future," said Governor DeWine. "At this critical moment in time, our country needs rapid technological innovation, which Anduril will deliver using Ohio's skilled, hardworking labor force. The future of American air power will be made in Ohio!"

Gov. DeWine & Lt. Gov. Husted will join Anduril to provide more information on this historic announcement today at 9 a.m. Watch live at OhioChannel.org.


The facility will be located on 500 acres in Pickaway County near Rickenbacker International Airport, with room for future growth. The company plans to invest over \$900 million in capital into the surrounding area.

Anduril was attracted to Ohio due to the state's supportive business climate, ready-made workforce, and legacy of military and federal support.

"Today is a proud day for Ohio as we welcome Anduril and celebrate the creation of thousands of new jobs in cutting-edge defense manufacturing," said Lt. Governor Jon Husted. "This investment reinforces Ohio's position as a leader in advanced technology and national security. When it comes to 'Made in America,' you can't do it without 'Made in Ohio."

In addition to the 4,000 direct jobs at Arsenal-1, the project is anticipated to create a total of 4,500 indirect and induced jobs over the next ten years and more than \$2 billion in annual economic output. Over \$1 billion in in-state labor income will be generated, and projected tax revenues are estimated to be roughly \$800 million.

"Arsenal-1 represents a significant step forward in how we build the autonomous systems and weapons our nation and allies need, leveraging Ohio's world-class workforce, robust infrastructure, and scalable, software-driven manufacturing to set a new standard for securing the future of defense," said Anduril Industries CEO Brian Schimpf. "We are ready to break ground and get to work building the capabilities that will strengthen America's industrial base and national security for years to come."



The project will pursue a Job Creation Tax Credit from the Ohio Department of Development at an upcoming Tax Credit Authority meeting. The project will also request \$70 million from the All Ohio Future Fund at an upcoming Controlling Board meeting. The All Ohio Future Fund was established by the DeWine-Husted Administration in partnership with the Ohio General Assembly to support local communities with site-readiness and preparation to attract economic development projects.

Separately, JobsOhio plans to provide assistance to the project with a JobsOhio Grant and will disclose the amount of funding after the agreements have been signed. JobsOhio will also provide Anduril with Talent Acquisition Services to work with the company to attract, develop, and retain the skilled workforce the company requires.

The build out of the facility is expected to begin immediately after state and local approvals, and the first products are targeted to be manufactured beginning in July 2026.

To meet their bold staffing needs, Anduril will tap into Ohio's third-largest manufacturing workforce, a statewide network of hundreds of universities, community colleges, and technical centers, and leverage JobsOhio's Talent Acquisition Services.

Anduril recently announced \$1.5 billion in funding to hyperscale defense manufacturing. Arsenal-1 in Ohio will be the first manufacturing facility equipped to produce tens of thousands of autonomous weapons systems addressing the urgent needs of the United States and its allies. Unlike traditional defense contractors that focus primarily on hardware, Anduril's core system is Lattice OS, an AI-powered autonomous sensemaking and command-and-control platform. Lattice brings autonomy to defense's most challenging missions with open, modular, and scalable hardware components for a layered family-of-systems approach that helps deliver higher-quality products faster and more affordably.

The partnership established by Anduril and Team Ohio that led to today's announcement reflects Ohio's enduring legacy and ongoing commitment to the United States military and its evolving goal of safeguarding our nation. The project is also supported by One Columbus, Pickaway County officials, and many other local, state, and federal leaders.

Along with aerospace and defense work by GE Aerospace, Honeywell, Sierra Nevada Corp., Joby Aviation, L3 Harris, General Dynamics, and others, Anduril's decision to make a home here shows how that heritage converges with a skilled, diverse workforce and unparalleled strength in advanced manufacturing and technology to make Ohio the go-to place for forward-looking innovators in the defense sector.

"You can't outsource national security, and today, Ohio is sending a message to the world: Companies that deliver the most complex, challenging, and sophisticated solutions for the defense of the United States of America will find no better home than right here in the 'Heart of it All,'" said JobsOhio President and CEO J.P. Nauseef. "The intersection of advanced manufacturing, military and defense, technology, innovation, and the nation's hardest-working and highly skilled workers creates the ideal environment for these companies to achieve their goals of making our country safer and stronger. Best of all, Anduril will be just

down the road to the military customer at Wright Patterson Air Force Base - where the Wright Brothers learned to fly more than 100 years ago! As the United States reshores this capability and fundamentally changes the way we develop solutions to safeguard our nation, Ohio is the place that gets it done better, faster, and more affordably than anywhere else."

Anduril's new Pickaway County facility will not only push the boundaries of manufacturing technology, it will also catalyze a new frontier of economic development in Ohio. Company officials chose the site in Pickaway County for several reasons, including its adjacent location to Rickenbacker International Airport, which gives the company direct runway access for product testing and development. Rickenbacker is a civil-military public airport that supports the world's largest aircraft. It also offers a wide range of scalable services for all aircraft types, including corporate, general aviation, commercial, air freight, and military.

"This project will diversify our economy, strengthen our nation, create thousands of terrific jobs, and immediately establish the Columbus Region as a center of defense technology and manufacturing," said Kenny McDonald, President and CEO of One Columbus. "The bold leadership of the DeWine-Husted Administration, JobsOhio, and Pickaway County were pivotal in making this project a reality."

Pickaway County Commissioner Jay Wippel added: "Pickaway County has spent nearly two decades preparing for this opportunity, laying the groundwork to attract transformative projects like Arsenal-1. Through deliberate planning, investment in infrastructure, and a shared commitment among local leaders, businesses, and partners like One Columbus and JobsOhio, we've created an environment where innovation and advanced manufacturing can thrive. 

Geneva Hills has been a cornerstone of Fairfield County for over six decades, providing transformative experiences for youth and families through our summer camp programs and community outreach. Over the past year, we have worked with a respected professional architecture firm to create a comprehensive master plan, which outlines key strategies to address critical community needs. Our vision includes expanding camp capacity, providing meeting spaces for local businesses and youth sports, and creating job opportunities for both youth and adults. By strengthening families and fostering lasting community connections, Geneva Hills is poised to make a significant and lasting impact on the region.

The first phase of this plan, which we have called "The Trail Ahead," will provide the necessary resources to expand our facilities and programs, ensuring Geneva Hills continues to be a vital asset to Fairfield County for generations to come. We are seeking your support to help bring this vision to life. Your partnership will enable us to enhance our services and create lasting opportunities for growth and connection throughout the county.

Meeting the Growing Need for Summer Camp Capacity in Fairfield County

Summer camps provide an essential space for local families in Fairfield County, offering opportunities for youth development, recreation, and community connection. However, there is a significant gap in available camp facilities for larger groups, limiting access to these valuable experiences for many families.

Currently, Ohio has just 18 camps with a summer occupancy of 150 or more guests, compared to Michigan's 36. This disparity results in a capacity-to-population ratio of one camp bed for every 2,857 residents in Ohio, versus Michigan's ratio of one bed for every 1,929 residents. This shortage leaves many Ohio families with limited options, especially as demand for larger facilities continues to rise.

In Fairfield County, the need for expanded camp capacity is especially clear. Within a 50-mile radius of Geneva Hills, only four camps exceed a 150-person capacity, collectively accommodating just 1,460 guests. This scarcity of larger camp facilities presents a significant opportunity for Geneva Hills to meet the unmet demand for family-friendly, large-group spaces.

Geneva Hills is uniquely positioned to address this gap. With 350 acres of land, it has the capacity to expand and accommodate an additional 650 guests per week. This expansion would provide a vital resource for Fairfield County families, allowing for more access to

enriching summer camp experiences and meeting the growing demand for group facilities. By adding 40 beds and enhancing its facilities, Geneva Hills is poised to play a key role in strengthening the community, offering local families the opportunities they need for youth development and recreation.

In total, Geneva Hills' expansion project will not only enhance its facilities but will also contribute to the broader community by providing much-needed space for families and local businesses seeking a retreat or group gathering location. This expansion will help Fairfield County meet the growing demand for camp services and strengthen the local economy.

The Trail Ahead Project: A Strategic Plan for Growth

The Trail Ahead project, developed in partnership with a professional architecture firm, is a multi-phase initiative designed to expand our capacity and better serve Central Ohio families. This well-established master plan sets a course to reach over 750 children per week at our facility, helping close the gap currently being experienced in our state:

- Phase 1 (2025-2027): Increase bed capacity to 150 and add a 60x120 commercial meeting and recreation space for our community, requiring \$1.1 million. This phase will not only meet the need for camp space but also address a critical community need for recreation space for youth sports and large group meetings.
- **Phase 2 (2028-2030)**: Expand capacity to 250 beds by 2030, with a total investment of \$4.5 million. This phase will address the growing demand for mid-sized and large groups, increasing our capacity to serve 2,500 campers each summer.
- Phase 3 (2030-2040): With a total investment of \$25 million, including the first two phases, we would expand capacity to accommodate 750 guests weekly, addressing a substantial portion of the unmet demand in Ohio's camp infrastructure. State funding could expedite this timeline, allowing Geneva Hills to meet these critical needs faster.

This funding will support critical infrastructure improvements, including new cabins, enhanced recreational spaces, and facilities for year-round programming. By doing so, Geneva Hills can serve a broader range of families while strengthening Ohio's summer camp infrastructure.

Why This Matters: Transformative Benefits of Summer Camp

Summer camps provide Fairfield County families with vital opportunities to grow, learn, and thrive. They address key challenges such as mental health, social development, physical activity, and the growing demand for childcare. Camps like Geneva Hills offer environments where children build resilience, develop life skills, and connect with nature—preparing them for future success while giving parents essential support.

Here are the core benefits supported by research and statistics:

- Child Mental Health: Exposure to green spaces during camp can reduce the risk of psychiatric disorders by up to 55%, providing a natural environment for stress reduction and emotional well-being.
- Child Social Development: According to the American Camp Association, 93% of campers report improved ability to interact with peers from diverse backgrounds, and

96% say camp helped them make new friends, enhancing social skills and cultural awareness.

- Combating Childhood Obesity: Camps encourage physical activity, which is crucial in addressing Ohio's childhood obesity rate of 18.6%. Regular participation in camp activities promotes healthier lifestyles among children.
- Nature Education and STEM Interest: Engaging in nature-based learning experiences can enhance children's understanding of scientific concepts and foster interest in STEM fields. 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A MESSAGE FROM CHERYL SUBLER **CCAO EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Executive Director's Overview

As we reflect on the past year, CCAO President Chris Abbuhl's vision—"Teamwork for a Better Tomorrow" has proven to be more than a guiding principle; it has been a rallying call that shaped every goal, initiative, and achievement within our organization. This vision inspired a renewed commitment to collaboration, empowering Ohio's counties to work together with purpose and unity, building stronger, more innovative, and more resilient communities.

Advocacy and Policy Support

Advocacy remains at the heart of our mission strengthening the state-county partnership and equipping county officials with the tools and flexibility they need to serve their communities effectively. This year, our Policy Team spearheaded critical updates through an omnibus bill addressing essential administrative elements and mandates that directly impact counties.

In addition, the team played a vital role in developing the 2025-2026 CCAO Policy Platform. This comprehensive document sets the Association's advocacy priorities, outlining more than 100 positions on key policies and programs to guide our efforts. On a day-to-day basis, the Policy Team continued to support our members by providing timely responses to inquiries, issuing county advisory bulletins with guidance on new laws and updates, and hosting informative webinars.

Enhancing Member Value

Delivering value to our members remains a cornerstone of CCAO's mission. This year, we celebrated significant milestones across our programs:

CORSA membership expanded to 73 counties, reinforcing its reputation as a trusted partner in risk-sharing.

CEBCO reached 49 counties, providing critical health insurance solutions tailored to member needs.

The Service Corporation introduced valuable new offerings, including FREE Amazon Business Prime memberships, enhanced energy purchasing options, and innovative benefits programs such as County Benefits Plus and County Firm.

We also made strides in enhancing the CCAO deferred compensation program—Ohio County Employees Retirement Program (OCERP)—ensuring it continues to deliver meaningful retirement solutions for county. employees.

Education and Communication Growth

The CCAO Research & Educational Foundation achieved remarkable progress, doubling its fundraising revenue through a successful golf outing. This growth strengthens our ability to support educational initiatives that empower our members.

Additionally, we expanded our communications efforts with spotlight features and engaging videos that highlight innovative county programs and initiatives. Looking ahead, we are actively exploring new training opportunities to ensure our members have access to the resources and education they need to succeed.

Looking Forward

The accomplishments of this year would not have been possible without the steadfast leadership of President Abbuhl, the CCAO Board of Directors, and our dedicated county officials. Your unwavering commitment to collaboration and innovation exemplifies the spirit of "Teamwork for a Better Tomorrow." Together, we are building a stronger foundation for Ohio's counties and the communities we serve.



CCAO Executive Director



As we see this General Assembly come to a close, it feels as though the COVID-19 era is also closed in many respects. The stimulus money through the CARES Act and ARPA has been either allocated or spent at both the state and county level. The years of soaring sales tax revenue have given way to a plateau of revenue, with inflation outpacing revenue growth. The challenges brought on by COVID-19 have been replaced by property tax challenges and a shortage of housing in all areas for counties.

Speaking of challenges, the 135th General Assembly proved to be one of the most challenging General Assemblies in recent memory. Although most of the legislative activity occurred during the main operating budget, we were still able to advance some key policies in 2024 with the General Assembly and the executive branch. It took an all-hands-on deck approach to navigate and the policy team would not have been able to do so without the support of our membership.

Our members rose above the fray and were able to advance legislation and implement key agency programs that would strengthen county government in Ohio. As we close out 2024, it is important to look back on all that we have achieved, recognize the challenges that lie ahead, and prepare to hit the ground running in 2025!

Updating and Streamlining County Government: The County Omnibus Bill

CCAO formers Representative Brian Stewart and Representative Roy Klopfenstein introduced a county omnibus bill, House Bill 497. This bill was a culmination of several years of feedback from our members and their staff on areas of the Revised Code that need updated. The bill language was also reviewed and, in some instances, improved by our various county elected partners. Most of the changes contained in the bill merely updated the Code to reflect the current practice of counties, such as where certain records should be stored. The bill also increased the contracting threshold required for county prosecutors to review county contracts and the threshold for county courthouse and jail repair projects that the commissioners can unilaterally approve. Many of these changes are needed to modify monetary thresholds in the Code following the high levels of construction material inflation experienced by counties.

HB 497 was introduced in late April. In May, CCAO President and Tuscarawas County Commissioner Chris Abbuhl testified in support before the House State and Local Government Committee, chaired by Representative

Scott Wiggam, a former Wayne County Commissioner. The Ohio House of Representatives unanimously passed HB 497 in late June. It is rare to see a bill move that quickly through one legislative chamber and it is a testament to the advocacy efforts of our members, the bill sponsors, and the CCAO policy team. The bill is currently pending in the Senate and its passage into law will be a top priority for CCAO during the lame duck session.

Capital Budget

The General Assembly passed a \$4.3 billion capital budget bill, which provided support to counties in a variety of areas. We were pleased to see the continuation of the state-county partnership in the area of jail funding, investing \$50 million in county jail construction and renovation. Earlier in the year, CCAO and BSSA updated our jail project survey from 2019 and found that there is \$2.2 billion needed for projects. The survey also showed that the price for the project increased by 41.5% on average between the initial bid for the project and the most recent bid, which further illustrates the importance of state assistance.

The bill also allocated \$718.8 million from the operating budget in the One Time Strategic Community Investment Fund (OTSCIF). Of that allocation, 75 county projects were funded totaling \$117 million.

Property Valuations and Taxation

Sale prices of residential homes continued to rise throughout Ohio and the nation in 2024, continuing a long-term trend that has resulted in higher property tax valuations across the state. Forty-one counties experienced an update or reappraisal in 2023, which impacted property taxes paid in 2024. Another 24 counties were undergoing updates or reappraisals in 2024.

In response to homeowners' concerns about rising property tax valuations, the General Assembly established a Joint Committee on Property Tax Review and Reform comprised of five members from each chamber. Committee Co-Chairs were Senator Bill Blessing and Representative Bill Roemer, who were the chairs of their respective Ways and Means Committees. The committee held hearings throughout the spring and early summer.

CCAO members Tony Bornhorst (Shelby County), Don Dixon (Butler County), Dave Burke (Union County), and Mike Yoder (Logan County) provided testimony with their suggestions for reform, and CCAO staff provided additional data and issues for the committee's consideration. CCAO

will continue to advocate for a number of reforms to the valuation system, including improvements to the homestead credit and limits to property tax exemptions, in the 136th General Assembly.

Housing

The shortage of housing options for Ohioans of all ages became a major focus of public policy discussion during 2024. CCAO members were actively involved in developing solutions and shaping the response of other levels of government. Members provided testimony to the Ohio Senate Select Committee on Housing, chaired by Senator Michele Reynolds, as it held hearings around the state.

At the national level, Franklin County Commissioner Kevin Boyce co-chaired a NACo Housing Task Force which produced a report, Advancing Local Housing Affordability, that was released in 2023 and led to his testimony in January 2024 in a hearing before the U.S. Senate Committee on the Budget. Commissioner Boyce discussed the rising cost burden of housing on Franklin County families, and called for the federal government to take the following actions:

- Invest additional federal resources to adequately support housing needs
- Modernize and strengthen current federal programs
- Provide more direct-to-local government funding opportunities
- Simplify programs and reduce burdensome compliance requirements on local governments

In the second half of 2024, CCAO partnered with OhioRealtors and the Bricker Graydon law firm to foster regional dialogue about housing issues around the state. Meetings in Allen County, Fairfield County, Portage County, and Ross County featured local real estate and economic development experts and local public officials discussing conditions in regional housing markets and possible approaches for improving housing supply. CCAO will continue to focus on this issue in the state budget process in 2025.

Grants Galore

CCAO was actively engaged with both the General Assembly and the DeWine-Husted Administration as the state contemplated how it would allocate and ultimately distribute its ARPA dollars. Many of the allocation conversations occurred in 2023, but this year CCAO spent a significant amount of time working with state agencies to ensure that grant dollars were distributed in an effective and efficient manner to county partners.

We worked with the Department of Development to modify the application and criteria for grants that support "Mega Site" development, as well as grants for broadband, water and sewer, demolition, and brownfield projects. CCAO staff also worked with the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction to help develop their grant application and distribute funding to counties. Furthermore, we worked with the Department of Aging on the allowable uses and reporting requirements to maximize the value of the Healthy Aging Grants program.

With support from the General Assembly, various executive agencies, and CCAO staff, counties and their partners in local government received the following in 2024:

- \$64.1 million for the Appalachian Children's Health Initiative (28 projects in 20 counties)
- \$154.4 million for the Appalachian Downtowns and Destinations Initiative (30 projects in 12 counties)
- \$179.3 million for the Brownfield Remediation Program (176 projects in 61 counties)
- \$156 million for the Building Demolition and Site Remediation Program (3,001 projects in 88 counties)
- \$270 million for H2Ohio Funding
 - \$121.3 million to the Ohio Department of Agriculture (1.8 million acres enrolled across 24 counties)
 - \$93.2 million to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (183 wetland projects)
 - \$55 million to the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency
 - \$264,000 to the Ohio Lake Erie Commission
- \$39 million for Healthy Aging Grants (85 counties)
- \$51.8 million for Ohio's Wonderful Waterfronts Initiative (18 projects in 10 counties)
- \$94.5 million for the Residential Broadband Expansion Program (Six projects in 23 counties)
- \$29.5 million for the Welcome Home Ohio Program (263 projects in 17 counties)

Looking Forward: The 136th General Assembly

Despite the challenges in the 135th General Assembly, we were able to advance several of our policy priorities. However, we recognize that there is still work to be done. We are optimistic that the 136th General Assembly will continue to support county government in a variety of key areas. In the upcoming biennium budget, the CCAO Board has decided to focus on targeted funding for child welfare. child care, indigent defense, jail construction, and 9-1-1 funding. These areas continue to be in desperate need of funding, despite previous funding increases.

With a strong partner in the DeWine-Husted Administration and many champions in the legislature, we are strongly positioned to advance our policy priorities. The policy team would like to thank our members for their strong support in 2024 and we are excited to continue this work in 2025!



CCAO Strategic Plan

The CCAO Strategic Plan continues to be our road map for operations. Our 2024 goals focused on supporting Association members through outreach, education opportunities, and relationship building.

In the spring, CCAO launched the "County Spotlight" program, designed to amplify county innovation and collaboration. As members share information about new initiatives or program successes, CCAO staff highlight the examples through CCAO social media channels, publications, and website.

With many outgoing CCAO members at the end of 2024, the Association worked to capture their insight and valuable lessons through video interviews. Former CCAO President and Licking County Commissioner Tim Bubb and CCAO Communications Coordinator Jessica Newbacher produced a video series to showcase the diverse backgrounds of our members and how they applied their past experiences to serving county government. The series spotlights seasoned leaders who have been in office two, three, and even 11 terms.

"Our mission is to bring this expertise to the table solely for the benefit of counties, providing skilled advocacy



OSU Extension

CCAO partnered with OSU Extension to create a county land use and zoning survey, in which 77 counties participated. The survey data will allow CCAO and others to better understand how counties handle zoning, comprehensive plans, the handling of solar farms, subdivision regulations, land use planning, and many other related topics.

BroadbandOHIO

The CCAO Broadband Task Force has met with BroadbandOhio numerous times throughout the year to discuss the Ohio BEAD Challenge Process. The state's BEAD Program proposal is awaiting approval from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA). This program allowed counties and ISPs to submit challenges to the NTIA maps for the purpose of creating the most accurate map, which will be beneficial in determining which broadband projects receive funding. Within this process, a project will receive 13 points if the board of county commissioners adopts a resolution in supporting a specific project, which carries roughly a 2.5% scoring weight within the grading process.

Ohio Chamber of Commerce

CCAO collaborated with the Ohio Chamber of Commerce to continue preparations for economic development across our counties. Ohio Chamber Senior Vice President of Government Affairs Rick Carfagna attended CCAO's Board of Directors' Retreat in the spring to share highlights of The Blueprint for Ohio's Economic Future. The organizations will continue to partner on removing barriers to work, such as child care challenges, and preparing our workforce and infrastructure for further development opportunities. Additionally, CCAO is partnering with the Ohio Chamber and the Department of Development to create a Mega Development Caucus as a space for CCAO members planning for large projects to share ideas.

Week in Review

Governor DeWine signs the County Omnibus Bill, will take effect in April

On Wednesday, Governor DeWine signed <u>House Bill 497</u> (Representatives Brian Stewart and Roy Klopfenstein). The language in HB 497 will become effective 90 days after the Governor's signature, which places the bill's effective date on April 8, 2025.

A full list of the bill's provisions can be found in last week's <u>Statehouse Report</u>. Some of them include:

Approval of plans for courthouse or jail projects

The bill adds a \$75,000 threshold for boards of commissioners to approve courthouse or jail renovation/repair projects without the approval of the clerk of the court of common pleas, the sheriff, the probate judge, and the appointee of the judge of the court of common pleas. The board of commissioners may seek the advice of these elected officials. If the project exceeds the \$75,000 threshold, the current approval process in R.C. 153.36 remains in effect.

Contracts submitted to the prosecuting attorney

The bill increases the dollar threshold for contracts the board of commissioners must submit to the county prosecutor for approval to \$20,000. This statute was last updated in 1953.

County contract terms and conditions

The bill makes certain terms and conditions unenforceable if they are included in county contracts, including an indemnity clause, a requirement for binding arbitration, and the naming of a court or venue for legal action outside of the county. The language is based on an existing law that applies to state contracts.

Electronic notice requirements

The bill modifies notice requirements for county competitive bidding to allow publication in a newspaper, a newspaper's website, the state public notice website, or the county's

website and social media account.

Children services caseworker educational requirements

The bill provides more flexible educational requirements upon hiring a children services caseworker and gives a PCSA director the permissive authority to waive the requirement that an employee in good standing obtain a job-related bachelor's degree within five years of employment.

CCAO will release a County Advisory Bulletin (CAB) on the bill prior to its effective date. Additionally, the policy team will release CABs on other bills passed and enacted during the 135th General Assembly Lame Duck Session.

February 4, 2025, Commissioners' Review and Regular Meeting

The February 4th Commissioners' Meeting will be our first evening meeting for 2025. The meeting will be held in the Commissioners' Hearing Room at 7:00 p.m.
