Welcome

Commissioner Fix opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance and thanking everyone for their interest in county government. He spoke about his desire, when elected, to bring the Commissioners to the residents of the county, and how the purpose of the evening meetings was to enable those unable to attend a morning meeting the opportunity to participate. Commissioner Fix then explained the portions of the meeting and that during the Public Comment section members of the public would have the opportunity to address the Commission.

Commissioner Fix then spoke about the county's Strategic Plan that was created when the county decided to take a comprehensive look at the needs of the county after learning about the American Rescue Plan. he explained that the Strategic Plan has six main components that are the known as the pillars of the plan. Everyone was encouraged to look at the county's website and the Strategic Plan contained therein.

Commission President Fix continued by speaking about the new county facility located in the northwest corner of the county and how the Commissioners, Clerk of Courts, Branden Myer, and the County Administrator, Andrea Cordle, worked to bring the facility to fruition. The Sheriff's Department and Clerk of Court's staff will both occupy space in the facility. Commissioner Fix expressed his appreciation to Violet Township Trustees Terry Dunlap, Lori Sanders, and Darrin Monhollen, as well as Pickerington City Mayor, Lee Gray, for their part in helping to bring the county together through the new facility.

Commissioner Davis acknowledged Branden Myer for his work on the northwest building and the related funding. He stated that Myers declared a surplus, and that the surplus title money was able to transfer to the General Fund, assisting in the acquisition of the facility.

Commissioner Levacy shared some of the history about the Wigwam Event Center which was owned by the Wolfe family prior to being purchased by Violet Township. The Wolfe family sold the property to Violet Township to preserve its landscape, in lieu of selling to developers for a significant amount of additional money. Commissioner Levacy complimented Violet Township

Public Comments

Ray Stemen of Lancaster spoke about his attendance at the Commissioners meetings over the last seven years and spoke about his lapel pins. One pin was a flag, and the other a flag with a cross. COVID-19 Update

Fairfield County's reported COVID-19 cases have decreased by 18% over the past week. From 2/25/2022 through 3/3/2022 there have been 110 new COVID-19 cases reported, down from over 2,000 cases per week in January, for a rate of 69.8 cases per week per 100,000 population (Low Community Levels).

Seven new hospitalizations were reported in the past week and five COVID-19 related deaths were reported for Fairfield County. There were no additional deaths reported for January keeping the total at fifty-eight. Fairfield County resident deaths for the month of January. Five additional deaths were reported for February for a total of thirteen Fairfield County resident deaths so far for the month of February. December 2021 and January 2022 saw the highest number of COVID-19 deaths during the pandemic.

Some of the most neglected in our Military are Merchant Marines. There is no monument in Fairfield County to honor their service during wartime, yet they carried troops, medical supplies, food supplies, equipment, ammunition and so much more.

All other branches of service are recognized with Memorials in Veteran's Park. Many say that that Merchant Marines were not a part of the organized Military heirarchy, but I beg to differ. They are recognized by the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the U.S. Government for their participation in times of war. They were inducted and paid differently but they did serve all of us.

In World War II, 5,562 Merchant Mariners died for our country. During war time, they were a valued members of the Military. Many were on ships which guarded our coasts from invasion. Many took troops to foreign destinations. Many were on ships to take supplies to the troops in the European and Pacific theatres. At times these ships were under seige, bombed or torpedoed by the enemy powers. Merchant Mariners were a large part of the supply lines that provided all that the U.S. and our other Allies needed to survive and fight on foreign soil. The work was dangerous, they were a prime target for Axis U Boats and submarines.

We are asking the citizens of Fairfield County to assist us in our fundraising efforts to place a Memorial Monument in Veterans Park, Lancaster, Ohio to recognize the service of all Merchant Marines who served and sacrificed.

Some of our own citizens were Merchant Marines - Ray Grein, a lifetime citizen of Fairfield County was one who served during World War II. I met Mr. Grein in the early 1990's and came to be acquainted with him in the years following. He is only one of many. These men deserve to be recognized and I would very much appreciate any help you can give financially or in publicizing our fundraising efforts. Health Commissioner Report

R. Joseph Ebel R.S., M.S., MBA

Hello, I'm Joe Ebel, Fairfield County Health Commissioner. I joined the Fairfield County Health Department (FCHD) in April of 2021, after the retirement of our former Administrator, Larry Hanna. Larry came to the department in October 2006 as the environmental health director. He became the department's administrator about five years later.

I have over 30 years of public health experience, having worked in Licking, Morrow, Marion and Crawford counties during that time. I am excited to work with our talented staff at FCHD as we move out of our pandemic response and move to advance public health services and programs in Fairfield County.

The Fairfield County Health Department's activities in 2021 were primarily focused on our response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 vaccines became available in December of 2020 and eligibility expanded to all adults by the spring of 2021. Early COVID-19 vaccine efforts were focused at the Fairfield County Fairgrounds where 10,337 vaccines were given. The Fairfield County Health Department opened a mass vaccination clinic at the River Valley Mall where 19,738 vaccinations were given. We also worked with the Violet Township Fire Department to set up a drive-through vaccination site in Violet Township where 1,008 vaccinations were administered. FCHD staff, partners, and volunteers gave a total of over 33,183 COVID-19 vaccinations and booster doses during 2021.

To reduce the community spread of the virus we performed contact tracing, the quarantine of exposed individuals, and isolation of positive cases. This required a huge effort by FCHD staff and contract employees.

When in-person school resumed in the fall, we worked closely with the school staff to implement risk reduction and to perform quarantine and isolation notifications for exposed students and staff and to exclude positive cases from school. Eventually, the schools were able to adopt the "Mask to Stay" and "Test to Play" policies developed by the Ohio Department of Health, which helped to keep more students in the classroom.

During the pandemic, our normal public health activities continued. Environmental Health was busy with an increase in new home construction, which means increased well and sewage permits and plumbing inspections. Food safety was still important, and our staff inspected restaurants (Food Service Establishments) and grocery and convenience stores (Retail Food Establishments), with most facilities receiving two inspections per year.

Our nurses focused on COVID-19, but worked on other communicable disease investigations, childhood immunizations, flu clinics, and home visits.

We hired a health educator to begin expanding our health promotion and disease prevention activities. Investing in prevention activities is at the heart of public health and is much more cost effective than treating preventable illnesses later in life.

In 2022, we will continue to work to make Fairfield County a place where everyone is empowered to reach their full health potential by preventing disease, protecting the environment, and promoting healthy lifestyles.

Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP)

Public health preparedness for emergencies, business continuity, mass care events, pandemics and many other events involves all departments of FCHD. Emergency management and response functions are integrated into each program and into each plan created by FCHD. The PHEP program oversees the Medical Reserve Corps Volunteers and serves as co-chair for the Fairfield County Healthcare Coalition. The PHEP program also oversees all training and exercising, as well as quality improvement, for the Fairfield County Health Department.

 FCHD for future emergencies.





Epidemiology Report

Fairfield County Health Department investigated 731 reported disease cases in 2021, excluding COVID-19 investigations. Chlamydia remained the most frequently reported disease accounting for 46% of all cases. Hepatitis C and gonorrhea cases were the next most frequently reported diseases. (Note: Not all diseases are required to be reported to local health departments. In Ohio, there are about 90 diseases that are considered reportable infectious diseases.)

Public Health Nursing Division

Nursing Programs

Children with Medical Handicaps (CMH) Judy Scali is our CMH nurse. She works part-time in this program to assist families in finding providers and services for children with special medical needs. She also assists with finding financial assistance for these services.

Help Me Grow (HMG)
Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Early Childhood Program contracts with FCHD for a part-time nurse to conduct home visits. In addition to CMH, Judy Scali also works in the HMG program. Judy goes out with a team to do evaluations for children who may need special referrals or other services. When COVID-19 hit Fairfield County, this program was limited.

Perinatal Leadership

Perinatal Leadership is a coalition of many community partners that focuses on pregnant women and their new babies, ensuring they are healthy. This group identifies barriers in care for women who are facing challenges and collaborates to reduce these gaps. The goal is to have healthy women birth healthy babies and surround them with resources.

FCHD continues to focus on Plans of Safe Care from the Comprehensive Addiction and Recover Act (CARA) legislation. Any infant exposed in utero to illicit drugs or other compounds requires a Plan of Safe Care. The goal of this legislation is to surround the family unit with resources to lead happy and healthy lives.

Fairfield County was one of the first three counties in Ohio to turn this legislation into a community plan with the support of the Ohio Injury Prevention Program (OIPP), Child Injury Action Group (CIAG), and the Quality Improvement Center for Collaborative Community Court Teams (QIC-CCCT) Grants.

Get Vaccinated (GV) Ohio Grant FCHD continued to implement the Get Vaccinated Ohio grant from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). The foundations of this grant focus on improving immunization rates in Fairfield County while removing barriers that prevent children from getting vaccinated. Due to COVID-19 this program was delayed for half the year.

Tuberculosis (TB) Unit FCHD is the appointed TB Unit for the county. FCHD provides skin testing which screens for TB. These screenings are required for select school programs, employment, and medications. FCHD works to provide physicals to immigrants moving to Fairfield County as well. Lastly, FCHD provides case management for people who have active TB disease including Daily Observation Therapy (DOT), side effects of prescriptions, investigations, and screenings of close contacts.


Infections Disease Investigation and Control Program

Health departments are required to monitor and investigate reportable diseases. The Ohio reportable diseases are usually reported by laboratories, physicians or their offices, hospitals daycares, and schools.


The Infectious Disease Program is also responsible for COVID-19 contact tracing and case investigation. In addition to these services the program provides surveillance and guidance to community entities including long-term care facilities, schools, and daycares.

Environmental Health Programs

Food Safety Program staff work to protect the community against food-borne illnesses by educating and inspecting all food service and retail food establishments including, restaurants, grocery stores, mobile food services, food vending machines, and temporary food establishments.

MS4 Program

FCHD conducts Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) inspections on discharging aeration systems in Violet Township, Liberty Township sections 6 and 30R, and the Lithopolis area. This program is part of the U.S. EPA's effort to preserve, protect, and improve the nation's water resources from polluted storm water runoff.

Rabies

When an animal bite is reported to our office as a result of a person being bitten by an animal such as a dog, cat, or bat, the Environmental Health Division conducts an animal bite investigation to determine if the animal has or is experiencing signs of rabies. Animals are quarantined and further action is taken as necessary. Staff encourages vaccination for all animals to help prevent the spread of the rabies virus.

Vector Grant (Mosquito Control)

We received grant funding again in 2021 from the Ohio EPA Mosquito Control Grant Program. With this funding we were able to hire a summer employee to trap and collect mosquitoes. Sites were chosen throughout Fairfield County, and trapping took place from June through August. All mosquitoes were identified, and all Culex mosquitoes were tested for West Nile Virus. A mosquito spraying program will be implemented moving forward.

Recreation Programs

The public swimming pool and campgrounds programs protect the public from injury, the potential for disease transmission, and provide a safe and healthy recreational environment. Recreational programs include: Campgrounds, resident camps, pools, and spas.

Schools |

FCHD staff perform two school environment inspections a year to help school districts improve the environmental health of the school facility. State guidelines are used by staff for those inspections.

Household and Small Flow Sewage Treatment Systems

Sewage Program staff permit and inspect all new residential and commercial small flow septic systems to ensure that they are designed and installed correctly. They permit and inspect existing septic systems that require an alteration permit for repairs and respond to sewage nuisance complaints.

Plumbing Program

Our plumbing inspector permits and inspects the plumbing in all new homes and commercial buildings, existing home additions, and existing commercial building remodels.

Private Water Systems

Much of Fairfield County does not have a public water supply. Many homes are served by a private water system which could be a well, cistern, hauled water storage tank, spring, or pond. The private water staff permits, inspects, and samples all new private water systems in the county and samples existing wells to ensure safe drinking water.

Water Pollution Control Loan Fund

FCHD continues to take part in the Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) program to help low to moderate income families repair or replace their failing septic systems.

Solid Waste Program

FCHD includes an Ohio EPA approved enforcement program charged with regulating solid waste activities in Fairfield County. The Solid Waste Program includes the oversight of the collection, storage, and final disposal of all solid waste.

Body Art Program

Body Art Facilities are also monitored and licensed to ensure safe and sanitary conditions are being maintained. Body art establishments include businesses that offer tattoos, piercings, permanent makeup/cosmetics, and microblading.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

WIC is a nutrition education program. WIC provides nutritious foods that promote good health for pregnant women, women who recently gave birth, breastfeeding moms, infants and children up to age 5. Some of the nutritious foods provided include cereal, eggs, milk, whole grains, peanut butter, beans, fruits, and vegetables. WIC provides nutrition education, breastfeeding promotion and support, and referrals for obtaining specialty health care. In 2021, the Fairfield County WIC Program served an average of 1,060 participants per month.

In 2014, WIC added another site located in Pickerington, Ohio at the Government Services Building (11050 Tussing Road). WIC served an average of 243 participants at this location per month during 2021.

The USDA provided the Ohio WIC program a waiver to perform WIC appointments over the telephone during the COVID 19 Pandemic. In January 2021, the Fairfield County WIC program staff returned to the office to perform WIC Certifications, Recertifications, and Follow-up appointments over the telephone during the COVID 19 Pandemic. The parent or participant continued to come into the health department to load their benefits on their WIC Nutrition Card.

The local WIC program issued 236 Farmer Market Coupons and 96 were redeemed at Farmer Markets, total percentage redeemed was 40.68%

WIC Vendor Redemption: \$351,504.53 was spent by WIC participants on the purchase of WIC Authorized Foods in Fairfield County.

Health Education

2021 was an exciting year at the Fairfield County Health Department! The addition of a Health Educator allowed some new programs to go out into the community and help bring awareness to several topics. Physical materials and digital messaging through social media was utilized to increase health related messaging throughout the county.

Program Highlights:

- <u>Stomp Out Germs</u>: This program provided curriculum, books, hands-on activities, and more to participating Kindergarten through Third grade classrooms in Fairfield county to learn about hand washing, germ prevention, and hygiene.
 - Over 1,600 students received materials
 - 70 teachers received classroom supplies
- WIC Reading Readiness: Fairfield County Community Foundation awarded FCHD a grant from the Terry A. McGhee/Sally J. Grimm Community Fund to provide books to our WIC participants.
 - ♦ 300 families will receive books for the Prekindergarten aged children
- Whole Health Bags: Goody bags featuring a healthy recipe, safe cooking information, information on general wellness, and more went out to those participating in our COVID-19 Thanksgiving test kit give away.







Hotel and Motel Lodging Tax Amendment - Effective April 1, 2022

What is the Hotel/Motel lodging tax and what activities does it support?

In July 1981, the Board of Fairfield County Commissioners passed a resolution to establish a 3% collection of lodging excise tax. This tax supports the Fairfield County Visitors and Convention Bureau. In September 1993, another resolution was passed to establish an additional 1.5% lodging excise tax for the Decorative Arts Center of Ohio. Each of these organizations supports tourism and travel to Fairfield County, focusing on what makes our county unique. What is new about the Hotel/Motel lodging tax?

In December 2021, the Commissioners amended the definition of a hotel to include lodging establishments with fewer than five rooms or if an establishment has rooms which are used for guests regardless of whether each room is accessible through its own key. This would include establishments using Airbnb and other types of short-term lodging reservation platforms.

What does the amended Hotel/Motel definition mean?

This is not a new tax, but an equitable way to ensure all overnight guests are contributing to the lodging tax to support and promote tourism. If your lodging establishment has five rooms or more and you were collecting the tax before April 1, 2022, people staying at your establishment will not see any changes.

If your lodging establishment has fewer than five rooms used for the accommodation of guests or if your establishment has rooms which are used for guests regardless of whether each room is accessible through its own key, people staying at your establishment should begin paying the lodging tax on April 1, 2022. In the mail, identified establishment owners will receive information about the process for collection and forms to use.

Conveyance of Property - County Auditor Procedures

Please note, this document is not legal advice. This document is an informational tool to help citizens navigate processes connected with the County Auditor's Office. Deeds and other instruments of conveyance are not reviewed by the Auditor's Office for legal compliance. We encourage you to consult an attorney for questions you have about real property conveyance. The Auditor's Office does not provide legal guidance on the preparation of deeds or conveyance of real property. The County Auditor's Office often receives questions about what needs to be done to navigate the process to convey or transfer property. One of the most common questions the County Auditor's Office receives is: "Where can I find a conveyance fee statement form?"

Conveyance fee statement forms can be found at: https://www.co.fairfield.oh.us/auditor/fc-auditors-online-forms.html. Representatives from your title company or real estate attorneys may help you prepare and file conveyance fee statement forms. In general, for conveying property, the required documents are typically a deed (or an instrument of conveyance) and the conveyance fee statement (known as a DTE 100 or 100EX).

Another question that arises is: "As I am working with my attorney to prepare a deed or conveyance instrument, how do I make sure that the legal description of the property complies with County Conveyance Standards?"

You can submit your prepared deed to the County Auditor's Map Room for approval of the legal description to ensure it complies with the Conveyance Standards. This approval is a pre-requisite for the transfer. For review of the legal description and its compliance with Conveyance Standards, prepared deeds can be emailed to maproom@fairfieldcountyohio.gov.

Dropping Off Documents

Conveyance instruments and conveyance fee statements can be dropped off to the County Auditor's transfer desk once the legal description has been approved for compliance with Conveyance Standards. The Auditor's Office standard office hours are Monday-Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and the office is located at 108 N. High St., Lancaster OH, 43130. Documents can also be submitted by mail to the Fairfield County Auditor: Attn: Conveyance 108 N. High St., Lancaster, Oh, 43130.

Electronic Filing

Electronic filing options do exist through Simplifile; however, we understand if you are a one-time filer this may not be the most practical for your situation. Fees

The transfer fee is \$.50 per parcel - this applies to both exempt and non-exempt transfers. The conveyance fee is \$4.00 per thousand of consideration (if money is changing hands).
