Review Meeting

<u>Welcome</u>

Commissioner Levacy opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance.

Listen and Learn – Parks District

Marcey Shafer, Director of the Fairfield County Parks District (district) provided an update and a PowerPoint presentation that is available in the minutes. She stated that the District's Board is appointed by the County's probate judge and spoke about the goals of the park district and about parks within the district. Many County departments provide service to the district and the district is funded through levy monies, local government funds, grants, donations, and rental fees. The district includes more than 1150 acres. Rock Mill Park had an eroding retaining wall that has been repaired and additional repairs are planned for the park. Ms. Shafer spoke about completed 2023 projects, the strategic plan for 2024, and a 2023 grant for H2Ohio Wetland projects. She showed a map of the many parks within the district and encouraged people to visit.

Commissioner Davis thanked Ms. Shafer for her presentation.

Commissioner Fix asked about the district's partnership with Coyote Run.

Ms. Shafer replied that Coyote Run is a 900+ acre privately owned nature preserve. She added that the district has a great relationship with Coyote Run and has been able to host educational programs at the nature reserve.

Commissioner Fix spoke about visiting Coyote Run and how amazed he was at the different forms of life that have habitats there. He also spoke about seeing a vernal pool while visiting the preserve.

Commissioner Levacy asked about the Wagner Preserve and the Blue Heron nests located there.

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Ms. Shafer stated that the Land Bank has helped to demo some buildings at the Wagner Preserve and added that there is an existing farm on the property. We hope to open trails on the property, including some this year for student access. She stated that the Parks District is trying to get a camera on one of the heron nests so that people can view their activity; and that it is difficult to count the number of Heron nests but believes there are about 70 nests.

Commissioner Levacy thanked Ms. Shafer for her presentation.

Public Comments

Ray Stemen of Lancaster offered his concerns for the Governor of Michigan urging residents to house immigrants in their homes and said a prayer.

Judy Stemen of Lancaster offered her concerns for the effects of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Legal Update

Prosecutor Witt shared a court victory on a child sexual assault case where the accused was found guilty and is awaiting sentencing. He shared that it was a difficult case, and that the case was a collaboration of Harcum House, CPS, and law enforcement agencies. The victim was 12 years old and was living with a grandmother who had adopted her, and the abuser was the grandmother's spouse. She was in an unsafe and unsupportive environment. This case rested on her ability to describe her abuse in court. He commended the agencies involved in the trial, and for the services provided to the victim.

Commissioner Levacy spoke about Harcum House staff who attended the meeting and thanked them for their services.

RPC Approved Comprehensive Land Use Plan

Regional Planning approved the 2024 Comprehensive Plan at their March 5th meeting which was held at the Workforce Center. Fairfield County Awarded a 2024 Recycle Ohio Grant Award of \$9,000

Lancaster-Fairfield County Community Action Agency, on behalf of the Commissioners, submitted for a Recycle Ohio Grant and received notification that we have been awarded \$9,000 for All-in-One Office Printer and stand, Custom metal signs and Installation, 4ft recycling fluorescent boxes and CFL/Mixed light bulb boxes, and mail back dry cell battery recycling boxes.

The proclamation would recognize March 22, 2024, and Celebrate Women and Celebrate Allison Bolinger Day. The second resolution is to recognize April 22, 2024, as Earth Day. Marcey Shafer, who spoke earlier from our Parks District, is here to accept the Earth Day proclamation. Earth Day was organized over 50 years ago to mobilize and educate people to protect the environment and our Parks District works hard to protect and preserve nature and our natural ecosystems, and to educate residents on how they can also participate in doing so, through programs and events.
- A resolution approving an Expedited Type II Annexation of 9.138 acres from Walnut Township to the Village of Millersport. Thomas Hart is the agent for the petitioner. (Mr. Hart indicated a couple of weeks ago that he would be at the meeting to answer any questions.)

Thomas Hart stated the annexation involves a church camp that needs better water service.

Cody Tatum spoke about the case summarized by Prosecutor Witt earlier in the meeting and added that the victim in the case wanted other victims to know that there are people who will listen, that it is not your fault when you are victimized, and that you should speak out no matter the outcome. Mr. Tatum stated that Harcum House is moving forward boldly as it leads the state and helps shape the voice of safety.

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Commissioners Levacy and Fix stated their appreciation for the dedication and hard work of Mr. Tatum and the staff at the Harcum House.

Availability of Funds

The City of Lancaster's Community Development Department anticipates receiving an allocation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds issued by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for use in fiscal year (FY) 2024 which commences on September 1, 2024. The City's CDBG FY 2024 allocation is estimated to be \$500,000, which is similar to the amount received in previous years.

Limitations on Use of Funds

The use of CDBG is governed by HUD regulations and by the City of Lancaster's Consolidated Plan. CDBG funds must be used to further one of the following three HUD goals:

- 1) Benefit to low- and moderate-income persons
- 2) The elimination of slum and blight
- 3) An urgent need (disaster)

Information is provided outlining basic eligible and ineligible activities. Further restrictions limit the percentages spent on public services (15%) and on planning and administration (20%).

Activity Priorities and Funding Allocations

In accordance with *The City of Lancaster's Consolidated Housing and Community Development Plan* and HUD regulations, the City is required to follow established criteria for determining activities and funding allocations. These criteria include the following:

- Extent to which the activity furthers the housing and community development needs and priorities identified in the consolidated planning process and is consistent with the priority objectives of the Consolidated Plan.
- "Maximum feasible priority" for activities which will provide the greatest public benefit to low- and moderate-income households, address the priority needs of low- or extremely low-income persons, and/or meet other clearly defined priority housing or non-housing community development needs. <u>HUD's Income Guidelines</u> for low- and moderate-income are updated on the City's Community Development Department website annually.

Two public hearings will be conducted about the establishment of the FY 2024 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program.

- The first public hearing on the City's CDBG program is scheduled to be held on Thursday, March 14, 2024 at 3:00 p.m. at 104 E Main St, 2nd Floor Conference Room Lancaster, OH 43130
- The second public hearing will be held on Monday, April 29, 2024 at 3:00 p.m. at 104 E Main St, 2nd Floor Conference Room Lancaster, OH 43130

PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Performance Measures

In accordance with Community Planning and Development Notice 03-09 issued by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, dated September 3, 2003, referencing the encouragement of each formula funding grantee to develop a local performance measurement system in conjunction with the utilization of Community Development Block Grant funding, the City of Lancaster has prepared a system to address the components of said notice. The City of Lancaster, Ohio is a formula funding grantee receiving entitlement Community Development Block Grant funding. Currently, the City of Lancaster requires its funding agencies to submit detailed information regarding beneficiaries which is incorporated annually in the City's Consolidated Annual Evaluation and Performance Report (CAPER). The information gathered is reviewed in depth regarding compliance with monitoring and eligibility program requirements and the impact with the goals and objectives of the City's Consolidated Housing and Community Development Plan.

Commencing with the FY 2005 Community Development Block Grant Annual Plan, the City required all agencies to utilize the performance measurement system in their funding application requests. The City requires funded agencies to submit required beneficiary performance information. A data sheet has been prepared which documents performance data. Data is required for each housing activity to sufficiently document beneficiary information to address the following categories:

- Activity Name
- Funding Request
- Name requesting funding and implementing activity
- Activity objective outlining the relationship with the Consolidated Plan
- Proposed number of persons/households benefitting annually
- Income characteristics of persons/households benefitting
- Detailed information regarding output accomplishments
- Other funding sources in relationship to proposed activity
- Outcome narrative

Performance measurements is an organized process for gathering information to determine how well programs and projects are meeting needs, and then using that information to improve performance and better target resources.

Two critical components of the performance measurement system are:

- productivity
- program impact

In housing and community development agencies *productivity* reflects the level of efficiency (quantity, quality, and pace) with which an agency undertakes its activities.

Program impact reflects the extent to which those activities yield the desired outcomes in the community or in the lives of the persons assisted.

The following five topics define the terms used in an Outcome and Performance Measurement System and will need to be addressed by each agency requesting CDBG funding.

(1) Goals:

Proposed solution to problems or needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Determine the objective the proposed funding will address.

(2) Inputs:

Include resources dedicated to or consumed by the program such as money, staff, equipment, and supplies.

(3) Activities:

What the program does with the inputs to fulfill its mission. Activities include the strategies, techniques, and types of treatment that comprise the program's production process for service methodology.

(4) Outputs:

The direct product of a program's activities. They are usually measures in terms of the volume of work accomplished, such as number of low and moderate income households served.

(5) Outcomes:

Benefits that result from a program. Outcomes typically relate to a change in condition, status, attitudes, skills, knowledge, or behavior. Common outcomes could include improved quality of life for program participants, improved quality of local housing stock, and revitalization of a neighborhood.

The City of Lancaster is requiring funding agencies to adhere to the components of the performance measurement system. The City of Lancaster monitors CDBG accomplishments with the preparation of the Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report. Additional accomplishment information will be required to facilitate the City's analysis to determine if an activity is operating at the most efficient and effective level.

Numerous benefits may be derived from the implementation of the City's performance measurement system. The system will ensure the funding agency and activity makes a difference in the lives of low- and moderate-income residents; services will be improved; definitive evidence will be provided that CDBG resources produces a benefit; and the general public will recognize the benefits the CDBG program dollars produces, thus generating funding support.

Waiver of Tax Budget

Under Section 5705.281 of the Ohio Revised Code, the county budget commission, by an affirmative vote of a majority of the commission, including an affirmative vote by the county auditor, has waived the requirement that the taxing authority of a subdivision or other taxing unit adopt a tax budget but requires such a taxing authority to provide such information to the budget commission as may be required by the budget commission to perform its duties, including dividing the rates of each of the subdivision's or taxing unit's tax levies. As you know, while the tax budget is waived, budget activity continues. The budget commission is conducting its work with a limited number of in-person meetings.

Desk Reviews and Reports at Budget Commission Meetings

Desk reviews (in lieu of in-person meetings with multiple political subdivisions) are being conducted, and requests for information support those reviews. The next budget commission meeting is April 1. At that meeting, we will report upon our requests for information. The purpose of this memo is to highlight the requests for information, specific to special levy funds and to the general fund. Receipt of information will be helpful for the budget commission meeting that will be held on August 5th.

Requests for Information

These specific requests for information relate to ADAMH, DD, Senior Services, Child and Protective Services, and the general fund. We will be seeking a summary of the long-term (10 years if available) projections for revenues and expenses of the special levy funds, as well as for the general fund. These are records that are already being reviewed and evaluated at the departmental level, and the budget commission will maintain documentation received to support decisions about setting tax rates.

There are other requests for information to multiple political subdivisions, such as projected cash balances, revenues, and transfers -and/or- responses to audit reports. This memo is focused on the funds specific to the county and a summary of long-term plans.

In March, we will reach out to leaders of ADAMH, DD, Meals on Wheels, and JFS. We will also reach out to Bart Hampson, Budget Director, because the County Commissioners maintain the long-term projection of the general fund and also because the County Commissioners have a connection with special levies, as well. We will be seeking responses to the requests by May 1.

The purpose of this memo is to give notice about requests for information that are forthcoming and to indicate we are available if questions arise. Requests for information are usual; however, balances within some funds might be higher than they have been historically due to changes in state and/or federal funding. This means documenting the effect of the changes is an important part of the narrative. *We appreciate the attention given to the requests for information.*

RESOLUTION NO. 24-020

RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY OHIO ADOPT A RESOLUTION PURSUANT TO OHIO REVISED CODE SECTION 303.58 PROHIBITING THE CONSTRUCTION OF ECONOMICALLY SIGNIFICANT WIND FARMS, LARGE SOLAR FACILITIES AND LARGE WIND FARMS FROM THE UNINCORPORATED AREA OF PLEASANT TOWNSHIP.

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code Section 303.58 provided that a Board of County Commissioners may adopt a resolution designating all or part of the unincorporated area of a county as a restricted area, prohibiting construction of economically significant wind farms, large solar facilities and large wind farms; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Township Trustees desires to ensure access to buildable land within the unincorporated area of Pleasant Township for future growth in agriculture, residential and commercial sectors in areas with access to major transportation corridors; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Township Trustees has received input from its residents and the overwhelming consensus is that economically significant wind farms, large solar facilities and large wind farms are not compatible with the character or future economic growth and development, either agricultural, residential, or commercial of land in Pleasant Township; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Township Trustees recognizes that most of the currently vacant land in Pleasant Township is easily accessible to transportation corridors and devoting that land to wind and solar facilities would eliminate future residential, agricultural and commercial development, including the homes, students and jobs that would result from that development; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Township Trustees asserts the use of land in Pleasant Township for economically significant wind farms, large solar facilities, and large wind farms is detrimental to the future development of Pleasant Township and the well-being of the residents of Pleasant Township Fairfield County Ohio.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF PLEASANT TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES, COUNTY OF FAIRFIELD, STATE OF OHIO, WITH AT LEAST TWO-THIRDS OF ALL MEMBERS CONCURRING IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE REVISED CODE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board of Pleasant Township Trustees hereby request that the Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio adopt a resolution pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 303.58 designating in the unincorporated area of Pleasant Township as a restricted area, prohibiting the construction of any economically significant wind farms, large solar facilities, and large wind farms in the unincorporated area of Pleasant Township.

Review Meeting

The Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Hearing Room located at 210 E. Main St., Lancaster, OH. Commissioner Levacy called the meeting to order, and the following Commissioners were present: Jeff Fix, Steve Davis, and Dave Levacy. Welcome

Commissioner Levacy opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance.

Listen and Learn – AED Awareness and Demonstration; 9:00 a.m.

Kasey Farmer, Basil Joint District Assistant Fire Chief, spoke about the value of the AED Maintenance Program. An AED is an automated external defibrillator. He stated that the batteries and pads for the AED expire and can be too costly for some organizations to replace. He also spoke about an AED maintained by the maintenance program that saved the life of an eleven year old.

Garrett Blevins thanked Mr. Farmer for his testimony regarding the AED Maintenance Program and introduced Teri Watson, Community Outreach Coordinator for Fairfield Medical Center, and a Community Heart Watch Chair.

Ms. Watson stated that brain damage begins in 4 minutes and death within 10 minutes of a cardiac event; and that it is important that bystanders jump into action for the individual's survival. Our community has 400 AEDs and there is an app called PulsePoint AED which inventories the AEDs. There are AEDs in law enforcement vehicles, schools, and businesses, yet the national survival rate for cardiac arrest is only 10%. MS. Watson spoke about grant opportunities for an entity to receive an AED and about the community's mobile training unit. She also spoke about the new Avive Connect AED, which is smaller and less expensive than a traditional AED. Avive Connect AEDs connect to 911 systems once there are 100 devices in an area. An Avive Connect AED video was played, and a demonstration given by Ms. Watson and Mr. Farmer.

Commissioner Davis asked if there were issues regarding privacy since the units connect and inform others in the network of names and addresses.

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Mr. Farmer replied that some information in an emergency is public information.

Commissioner Fix thanked Ms. Watson and Mr. Farmer and asked what measures could be taken to have 100 units in the community.

Ms. Watson stated that churches, schools, businesses and even sports leagues should have AEDs, and added that there are 750 AEDs in the three county area of Hocking, Licking and Fairfield counties. Three hundred of those AEDs will be obsolete in three years.

Mr. Farmer added that homes should also have AEDs.

Commissioner Davis asked for an inventory of AEDs in county buildings.

County Administrator Cordle asked if people and entities are moving away from the older AED models to the Avive Connect AED.

Mr. Blevins stated that the Fairfield County Healthcare Coalition has provided 53 AEDs and 104 items for AEDs. The Fairfield County Foundation funded the Fairfield County Healthcare Coalition program for two additional years.

Commissioner Davis spoke about funding for the additional 70 units needed to have 100 Avive Connect AEDs in the community.

Sherry Pymer asked about purchasing Avive Connect AED units.

Mr. Farmer explained that the units could be purchased but that many feel the lease is advantageous. Information on the Avive Connect AED can be found in the minutes.

Child Protective Services-PACT Highlight; 9:30 a.m.

Deputy Director of Protective Services, Sarah Fortner, spoke on the Ohio shared practice model for public children's services known as PACT (Practice in Action Together.) Fairfield County is one of 8 counties in Ohio to participate in the PACT initiative. The goal was to initiate an effort to look at inequity in Ohio families. Ms. Fortner stated that public children services exist to protect and stabilize children and PACT aims to measure the outcomes and where children experience inequity. She added that an advisory group was created to hear experiences and challenge those in the group. The goal was to create values. Ms. Fortner spoke about relational outcomes and the local advisory group; and added that there is not a financial value for the program.

Commissioner Fix asked about the starting point for the program.

Ms. Fortner stated that the clock had started, and that Fairfield County wanted to be able to say it was one of the founding counties of the initiative. She added that Fairfield County is highly recognized for the work it does and a lot of the values of the program is what the county lives out every day.

Commissioner Davis stated that when a goal of a group is equity, there must be some inequity.

Ms. Fortner spoke about the data and stated that it shows that children of color are in care for longer periods of time and that they sometimes feel that chaos is the only way to receive attention.

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Commissioner Davis spoke about diversity and the inequity that also exists based on socioeconomic status.

Public Comments

Judge Terre Vandervoort spoke about a resolution before the Commissioners to purchase court technology and about a Tyler system upgrade that has helped with system efficiency.

Sherry Pymer of Walnut Township shared an article on deindustrialization and skyrocketing utilities due to the green energy movement. The article is available in the minutes.

Week in Review

Commissioner Levacy Awarded Advocate of the Year for United Way of Fairfield County

Commissioner Levacy was awarded the Advocate of the Year recognition for United Way of Fairfield County. Commissioner Levacy never misses an opportunity to advocate for United Way and is a huge supporter of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.

Commissioner Davis added that Ms. Cordle was awarded the United Way Chairman's Award, and that Ms. Corcle has been volunteering and supporting United Way since she was 23 years old.

Mr. Szabrak spoke about the relationship between the technical school and the Workforce Center and stated the school's superintendent has been both awesome and supportive. He also spoke about a training program to lay fiber and the career readiness students. He added that the resolution allows for the lease of space to the technical school while additions are added to their building.

Commissioner Fix stated his appreciation for the partnerships with community organizations that Mr. Szabrak has been fostering.

• A resolution requesting the Fairfield County Commissioners to commence legal action regarding the obstructions/interference of the county's drainage easement.

Mitch Noland stated he spoke with a property owner before the fence was erected. The property owner has left metal casings in the ground which prohibit the Engineer's Office from utilizing the drainage easement. The Sheriff's Office has been to the property eleven times and the Engineer's Office has ben working with the property owner for about a year. The property owner is not willing to compromise and is impeding their ability to inspect the area.

Commissioner Davis stated the resolution authorizes legal action and asked if the action would be through the Prosecutor's Office. He asked if the property owner's name could be revealed.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Darnell replied that the legal action would be through the Prosecutor's Office and that the office was confident about the facts of the impending case. The property owner is Juan Morales.

• A resolution authorizing the approval of a construction agreement and bid award with AmeriCoat Asphalt and Concrete for parking areas at the Records Center and the Emergency and Facilities Management Complex.

Mr. Kochis thanked Dennis Keller for working on the projects.

Ms. Cordle spoke about the Records Center parking lot and the agreement with Double Edge Brewery.

• A resolution to approve a contract amendment with Steed Hammond Paul, Inc for additional design services for the lab and restrooms at the Workforce Center.

Mr. Kochis spoke about the opportunity for additional facilities at the Workforce Center.

• A resolution authorizing a purchase of service contract between JFS and Carealot Transport for demand responsive transportation services.

 A resolution to approve the Fairfield County Flood Prevention Regulations for FEMA compliancy allowing the county to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program. There were two hearings during Commission meetings on February 13th and 27th.

Ms. Mattei stated that an additional whereas clause is being added to the resolution to repeal and replace a former 2012 resolution and the corrected resolution would be available in the approved packet.

- A resolution to approve a contract between the Fairfield County Commissioners and the Village of Thurston for nonresidential building inspection services.
- A resolution authorizing the purchase of two work trucks for the Utilities department.

CDBG PY2024 Hearing; 10:00 a.m.

Ms. Mattei stated that two hearings are required for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). This is a federal program; some communities receive monies through Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the county participates in the small cities' allocation program. The state uses a formula to determine how much is allocated to each community. The grants are now two year grants, and the county receives the same amount every two years as it once did per year. The Critical Infrastructure Program has been successful in several areas. The maximum award for the Neighborhood Revitalization Grant Program is \$750,000. The Critical Infrastructure Grant is a single component grant, as in the sewer project with the Village of Carroll. All projects must have a benefit of at least 51% for low to moderate income people.

Commissioner Fix asked if the available low to moderate income data was current.

Ms. Mattei replied that the data needs to be updated. She stated that a community can qualify through the American Community Survey Data or an income survey; or the application can be completed for disabled clientele. All governmental private non-profits are eligible to apply for the grant. Eligible activities range from water and sewer, street, drainage, and even park improvements. The process starts with a letter to all county local government entities. There are two hearings, and the applications are due to RPC by April 12th. Applications are due to the state by mid-June . The application requirements include a narrative and signed Engineer's estimate, and the project must reflect federal prevailing wage. We are also required to provide a fair housing component. Mr. Hillberry from RPC is helping with the CDBG program and Ms. Saleh is running the Fair Housing program. The county is required to have a Fair Housing contact person, and that is now Ms. Saleh. Fair Housing in Ohio includes protective classes of race color, national origin, ancestry, religion, sex familiar status, disability, and military status. In addition to the discriminatory side of fair housing, there is reasonable accommodation and modifications due to disabilities component. Fair Housing landlord responsibilities and rights are outlined in the law.

Commissioner Fix asked if there were any comments, questions, or concerns regarding the CDBG hearing and there were none.

Commissioner Fix closed the hearing at 10:24 a.m.

ORDINANCE 860 A STATEMENT OF VILLAGE SERVICES AND ZONING CONDITIONS TO BE PROVIDED TO THE AREA CONTAINED IN A PROPOSED ANNEXATION OF THE APOSTOLIC CAMPGROUND

WHEREAS, the Village Council of Millersport deems it to be in the public interest to annex the property of Apostolic Campground; and

WHEREAS, a petition for the annexation of the Apostolic Campground shall be filed on the behalf of Apostolic Campground; and

By the end of calendar year 2021, Harcum House served 456 children impacted by abuse. Those increases continued, and the sustained nature of the community's need resulted in 497 children impacted by abuse being served by the end of 2022. Year-end 2023 resulted in 421 children being served by the end of the context is on pace to see over 500 children by the end of the calendar year.

Grantor is authorized by Ohio Revised Code ("Revised Code") Section 1551.11 to grant funds appropriated by the General Assembly and any assistance provided by any governmental agency for new concepts, programs, or technology for the conservation of energy, for the efficient and environmentally acceptable utilization of present, new, or alternative energy sources, or which develop resources of the state. Under Revised Code Section 1551.12(F), Grantor may grant funds for the furnishing of goods or performance of services. Grantor has been awarded funding by USDOE under Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance Number referenced in the table above to develop and implement a comprehensive Program. The Program will promote energy conservation and efficiency, reduce energy demand and develop and deploy renewable energy sources.
- Project. Grantee shall use the financial assistance to be provided by Grantor pursuant to this Agreement to undertake the energy project further described in the Program application or proposal (the "Application") submitted by Grantee and summarized in the Scope of Work (the "Project"). The Scope of Work and Project Budget are attached to this Agreement as <u>Exhibit I</u> and incorporated by this reference. The Application is not attached but is also incorporated by this reference into the Agreement.
- 3. Grant of Funds.
 - (a) <u>Funds</u>. Grantor hereby awards and grants to Grantee funds in the aggregate amount of \$250,000.00 (the "Grant Funds") to be used for the sole and express purpose of undertaking and completing the Project substantially as described in the Application. Grantee may not use the

Grant Funds for any purpose other than completion of the Project. Grantee may not pledge the Grant Funds as security for any loan or other obligation or indebtedness.

(b) <u>Availability of Funds to Complete the Project</u>. It is a condition to the award of Grant Funds that the Grantee provides funds from other sources to pay project costs in excess of the Grant Funds. Grantee represents and warrants to Grantor that Grantee has obtained such additional funds or that Grantee has a binding commitment for such additional funds and, with the exercise of reasonable diligence, will have obtained such additional funds no later than the time such funds will be required to pay Project costs as and when such costs are incurred and payable.

4. Payment of Grant Funds.

(a) <u>Invoices</u>. Grantor shall disburse the Grant Funds on a reimbursement basis for eligible costs of the Project incurred on or after the Effective Date. Grantee shall require delivery before payment is made for purchased goods, equipment, and services unless Grantee obtains satisfactory security from the vendor for the payment and performance of the underlying purchase agreement. Grantee shall submit to Grantor for review and approval requests for reimbursement detailing expenditures which have then been incurred by Grantee in accordance with the Project budget included in the Application, subject to the allowance for budget alterations provided in paragraph (b) of this Section 4. Grantee shall submit reimbursement request on the form provided by Grantor from time to time. All expenses to be reimbursed with Grant Funds shall be supported by contracts, invoices, vouchers, paid receipts and other documentation as appropriate to evidence the costs incurred by Grantee to perform the work described in the Application. Grantor shall be the sole judge of the adequacy of reimbursement requests. Grantee shall submit to Grantor such documentation necessary or useful to substantiate a reimbursement request. The final reimbursement request shall be received by Grantor no later than Jan. 31, 2026. All funds must be requested within 45 days of project completion.

(b) **Budget Alterations.**

(i) Subject to paragraph (ii) below, Grantee shall have discretion to reallocate an amount not greater than 10 percent of the Grant Funds, in the aggregate, among budget line items otherwise funded in whole or in part with Grant Funds, and any such reallocation shall be considered by Grantor to be consistent with the Project budget. In the event Grantee makes a budget alteration as permitted by this paragraph, Grantee shall submit with its request for reimbursement a revised Project budget reflecting the alteration. Any changes to the Project budget beyond the scope of this paragraph, including, without limitation, alterations that add budget line items or total, cumulatively with prior alterations, more than 10 percent of the Grant Funds may be affected only by amendment of this Agreement as provided in Section 16(e).

(ii) If at the completion of the Project the Grantee's share of total allowable costs, is less than the total costs reimbursed, Grantee must refund the difference.

(c) <u>Budget Reductions.</u> Grantee acknowledges that Grantor is subject to State of Ohio and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services budgetary constraints that could result in the reduction of the amount of Grant Funds provided under this Agreement. Should Grantor's funding levels be reduced, Grantor shall notify Grantee in writing of the extent of any reduction to the Grant Funds and reduce Grantee's commitments in a manner corresponding to the reduction of Grant Funds and such notice shall result in the Agreement being amended without further action by the parties. Grantee hereby irrevocably authorizes Grantor to reduce the amount of Grant

Funds provided under this Agreement upon written notice to Grantee provided there is a corresponding reduction in commitments outlined on page 1 of this Agreement.

- (d) <u>Permissible Expenses</u>. If "travel expenses," as defined in Ohio Administrative Code Section 126-1-02, are a cost of the Project eligible for reimbursements with Grant Funds in accordance with the Project Budget included in Exhibit I, Grantee Shall be reimbursed for those permissible travel expenses in amounts in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code Section 126-1-02, as updated from time to time (the "Expense Rule") and Grantee agrees that it shall not be reimbursed and Grantor shall not pay any items that are deemed to be "non-reimbursable travel expenses" under the Expense Rule, whether purchased by the Grantee or Grantor or their respective employees or agents.
- (e) **<u>Retainage</u>**. Grantor may withhold payment of an amount equal to ten percent (10%) of the Grant Funds until Grantor receives and approves Grantee's Project Completion Report.
- (f) <u>Decontamination and/or Decommissioning Costs</u>. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement, neither the federal government nor the State of Ohio shall be responsible for, or have any obligation to, Grantee for (i) Decontamination and/or Decommissioning (D&D) of any of Grantee's facilities, or (ii) any costs which may be incurred by Grantee in connection with the D&D of any of its facilities due to the performance of the work under this Agreement, whether the D&D work was performed prior to or subsequent to the effective date of this Agreement.
- 5. <u>Grant Funds Not Expended</u>. If the Grant Funds are not expended by Grantee in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement or within the time period set forth in this Agreement, the award of the Grant Funds shall cease, and Grantor shall have no further obligation to disburse the Grant Funds. Grantor shall also have no obligation to disburse any amount of the Grant Funds that exceeds the eligible costs of the Project actually incurred by Grantee. If Grant Funds have been paid to Grantee and Grantor determines that Grantee has not performed in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Grantee shall return such improperly expended Grant Funds within 30 days after demand by Grantor. If the Project does not become operational by the Project Completion Date (as such date may be extended as provided in Section 6(a)) and/or is affirmatively abandoned by Grantee, all Grant Funds paid by Grantor to Grantee under this Agreement shall be refunded to Grantor by Grantee within thirty (30) days after the Project Completion Date or abandonment has occurred.

6. Agreement Deadlines and Term.

- (a) <u>Project Completion</u>. Grantee shall complete the Project not later than the Project Completion Date set forth on the first page of this Agreement. If Grantee anticipates that the Project will not be completed by the Project Completion Date, Grantee must request an extension of time to complete the Project at least 60 days before the scheduled Project Completion Date. It will be within the sole discretion of Grantor to grant or deny such extension of time.
- (b) <u>Term of Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be in effect from the Effective Date set forth on the first page of this Agreement through the date which is three years after the Project Completion Date (the "Expiration Date"), unless it is terminated earlier as provided in Section 12 (the "Term"). Grantee acknowledges that the Term extends beyond the Project Completion Date for purposes of reporting by Grantee and monitoring by Grantor of the results of the award of Grant Funds, and that Grantee's obligation to file any delinquent reports survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.
- 7. Project Performance.

- (a) <u>Completion According to Application and Scope of Work</u>. Grantor has approved an award of financial assistance to Grantee to induce Grantee to undertake and complete the Project with the goal of achieving the Program objectives described by Grantor in its State Energy Program application submitted to USDOE. Therefore, Grantee's completion of the Project and performance of other obligations as set forth in the Application and the Scope of Work are essential terms of this Agreement. (While the Scope of Work is intended to be consistent with the Application, in the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the Scope of Work and the Application, the terms of the Scope of Work will prevail over the conflicting or inconsistent terms of the Application.)
- (b) <u>Performance Metrics</u>. The Project will be subject to assessment by Grantor according to the performance metrics applied by USDOE to the Program. The Program metrics may include: (i) renewable energy capacity and generation, (ii) jobs created and/or retained, (iii) emissions reductions, (iv) infrastructure investment, (v) accomplishments, publicity, good news, (vi) industrial process efficiency, (vii) workshops, trainings and education, (viii) energy savings (kwh/therms/gallons/BTUs/etc.), (ix) energy cost savings, and all other relevant material related to this Agreement. Grantee shall timely and accurately report to Grantor from time to time at Grantor's request information relevant to assessment of the Project against the Program performance metrics.
- (c) <u>Compliance with Federal Requirements</u>. Grantee shall comply with all USDOE requirements for the Program, as USDOE may clarify or change those requirements from time to time. Without limiting the foregoing, Grantee shall submit the Project for review under the National Environmental Policy Act ("NEPA") of 1969 unless a categorical exclusion applies, comply with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and implementing regulations prior to receiving any Grant Funds, comply with federal prevailing wage laws (Davis-Bacon and related acts) with respect to any construction activities on the Project, review and adhere to all applicable National Policy Assurances and Certifications applicable to the Grant Funds (copies of which are attached as <u>Exhibit III</u> to this Agreement), and comply with the USDOE Financial Assistance Rules, 10 C.F.R. part 600, as applicable to recipients of subgrants or subawards.
- (d) Build America, Buy America (BABA). Grantee shall comply with domestic procurement requirements provided in the Build America, Buy America Act in section 70914 of Public Law No. 117-58, also known as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. The Department of Energy can issue a waiver in certain circumstances. Please see the link for further information https://www.energy.gov/sites/default/files/2022-11/Guidance%20on%20Submission%20of%20a%20DOE%20Buy%20America%20Requirement%2 OWaiver%20Request%2011-17.pdf.
- 8. <u>Reporting</u>. The federal award providing funds for this Agreement imposes certain reporting requirements on Grantor. Grantee must provide information necessary and sufficient for Grantor to comply with such reporting requirements. Failure to comply with the reporting requirements concerning the Grant Funds and the Project is considered a material noncompliance with the terms of the award. Noncompliance may result in withholding of future payments, suspension, or termination of the current award, and withholding of future awards. A willful failure to perform, a history of failure to perform, or unsatisfactory performance of this and/or other financial assistance awards, may also result in a debarment action to preclude future awards by federal agencies.
 - (a) <u>Quarterly Progress Reports</u>. Grantee shall deliver to Grantor by the 10th day of each quarter during the Term of this Agreement a quarterly progress report covering Grantee's activities on
the Project, including the goals accomplished, milestones met and any performance deficiencies or delays. <u>Exhibit IV</u> contains guidelines for formatting quarterly reports.

- (b) Project Completion Report. Grantee shall notify Grantor promptly in writing when the Project is completed (the "Project Completion Report"). In no event shall the Project Completion Report be submitted later than 30 days after the Project is completed in accordance with the Application and Scope of Work. The Project completion report may be submitted in substantially the same format as a quarterly progress report unless otherwise directed by Grantor. Following receipt of the Project Completion Report, Grantor will review the completed Project. Notice of Project completion and Grantor review shall be conditions to final disbursement of the Grant Funds.
- (c) <u>Emission Allowances</u>. Energy projects may be eligible to receive energy efficiency or renewable energy emission allowances or other allowances or credits based on the energy attributes of the project (an "Allowance or Credit"). If Grantee is entitled to claim an Allowance or Credit as a result of the Project, Grantee must affirmatively claim such Allowance or Credit or forfeit such Allowance or Credit to Grantor for the benefit of the public as provided in Section 4928.62(C) of the Ohio Revised Code. Grantee is hereby deemed to forfeit any Allowance or Credit related to the Project unless Grantee notifies Grantor in writing of its intention to claim the Allowance or Credit at least 120 days prior to the scheduled deadline for claiming the Allowance or Credit related to the Project. Grantor hereby exercises its right to claim ownership of any such Allowance or Credit that Grantee affirmatively waives or is deemed to have forfeited under this paragraph.
- (d) <u>Signature and Costs</u>. Grantee (if Grantee is an individual) or the chief executive officer, chief financial officer, or other officer of Grantee authorized to sign tax returns on behalf of Grantee (if Grantee is an entity) shall certify by his or her signature of each report required by this Section 8 that the information reported by Grantee is true, complete and correct. All costs incurred by Grantee to comply with the reporting requirements of this Agreement shall be borne by Grantee and shall not be an allowable expense reimbursable from Grant Funds.
- (e) <u>Additional Information</u>. Grantor reserves the right to require any other documentation that may report Grantee's activities related to the Project and the expenditure of Grant Funds as may be required to satisfy any federal reporting requirement. Grantee shall respond within a reasonable time to any such supplemental request.
- (f) <u>Remedy</u>. Reporting is essential for Grantor's effective administration of this grant and its financial incentive programs, generally. If Grantee fails to submit any required performance report or additional information and such breach continues uncured for more than 30 days, Grantor may recover, and Grantee shall pay, as liquidated damages for the breach, an amount equal to \$500 for each month or part of a month the performance report is past due.
- (g) <u>Dissemination of Scientific and Technical Reports</u>. If this Agreement requires submission of scientific and technical reports, such reports will be disseminated on the Internet via the USDOE Information Bridge (<u>www.osti.gov/bridge</u>), unless the report contains patentable material, protected data, or SBIR/STTR data. Citations for journal articles produced under the award will appear on the USDOE Energy Citations Database (<u>www.osti.gov/energycitations</u>). Reports submitted to the USDOE Information Bridge must not contain any Protected Personal Identifiable Information (PII), limited rights data (proprietary data), classified information, information subject to export control classification, or other information not subject to release.
- 9. Audit Standards; Records Maintenance and Access.

- (a) <u>Audit Standards</u>. Grantee acknowledges this Agreement involves the use of federal funds and as such is subject to audit by the agency of the United States government granting funds to Grantor for purposes of performing the Project. As directed by Grantor, the Project will be subject to fiscal and compliance audits in accordance with 2 CFR 200 and United States Government Accountability Office Guidelines for Financial and Compliance Audits of Federally Assisted Programs.
- (b) Maintenance of Records. Grantee shall establish and maintain for at least three years after the Expiration Date or any earlier termination date its records regarding this Agreement, the Grant Funds and the Project, including, but not limited to, financial reports, documentation of expenditures of Grant Funds, job creation and retention statistics, and all other information pertaining to Grantee's performance of its obligations under this Agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the following record types shall be subject to the retention periods indicated for each: (i) real property and equipment records shall be retained for three years from the date of the disposition or replacement or transfer of the real property or equipment; (ii) if Grantee is required to report program income after the period of grant support, records concerning such income shall be retained for three years after the end of Grantee's fiscal year in which the income is earned; and (iii) indirect cost rate computations or proposals, cost allocation plans, and any similar accounting computations of the rate at which a particular group of costs is chargeable shall be retained for three years after (A) the date of submission to the federal government for negotiation if the computation or proposal is negotiated or (B) the end of the fiscal year (or other accounting period) covered by the computation or proposal if not submitted to the federal government for negotiation. If any audit, dispute, litigation, or negotiation is pending when the applicable retention period would otherwise expire, Grantee shall maintain such records as may be relevant to such matter until it is finally resolved.
- (c) Inspection and Copying. At any time during normal business hours, and upon not less than 72 hours prior written notice, Grantee shall make available to Grantor, its agents and other appropriate state and federal agencies or officials (including, without limitation, the Comptroller General of the United States, USDOE, or any of their authorized representatives) all books and records containing information regarding this Agreement, the Grant Funds and the Project which are in the possession or control of Grantee. Grantor, its agents and other appropriate state and federal agencies and officials may review, audit and make excerpts, copies, or transcripts of such books and records. Grantee shall also make available for interview by Grantor, its agents and other appropriate state and federal agencies or officials those directors, officers, employees and agents of Grantee who may have information regarding the Grant Funds and any transaction involving the Grant Funds. Grantor shall use reasonable efforts to conduct any such inspection of books and records in such a manner as not to interfere unreasonably with the normal business operations of Grantee. Grantee shall, at its own cost and expense, segregate records to be made available for inspection pursuant to this Section 9(c) from Grantee's other records of operation. Grantee shall also cause each of its contractors paid with Grant Funds to make its books and records available for inspection and copying to the same extent and in the same manner as described in this paragraph for Grantee. The obligations of Grantee and rights of Grantor and other state and federal officials to access records shall continue if pertinent records are retained.
- (d) <u>Site Visits</u>. Authorized representatives of Grantor and USDOE have the right to make site visitsat reasonable times to review Project accomplishments and management control systems and to provide technical assistance, if required. Grantee shall provide reasonable access to facilities, office space, resources, and assistance for the safety and convenience of government representatives in the performance of their duties. All site visits and evaluations shall be performed in a manner that does not unduly interfere with or delay Project work or evaluation.

(e) <u>Federal Stewardship</u>. USDOE will exercise normal federal stewardship in overseeing the project activities performed under the award that provides funding for this grant. Stewardship activities include, but are not limited to, conducting site visits; reviewing performance and financial reports; providing technical assistance and/or temporary intervention in unusual circumstances to correct deficiencies which develop during the Project; assuring compliance with terms and conditions of the federal award (which, in turn, includes compliance by Grantee with the terms and conditions of this Agreement); and reviewing technical performance after Project completion to ensure that the federal award objectives have been accomplished.

10. Property Rights; Publications.

- (a) **Intellectual Property.** Nonprofit organizations are subject to the intellectual property requirements at 10 C.F.R. 600.136(a), (c) and (d). All other organizations are subject to the intellectual property requirements at 10 C.F.R. 600.136(a) and (c).
- (b) **Property and Equipment Purchases.** This Agreement is subject to any applicable property recapture requirement that may be imposed by federal law, regulation or program guideline. If Grantee defaults in the performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and/or this Agreement is terminated for default or non-performance, property and equipment acquired with Grant Funds may be subject to recapture and Grantee may be required to transfer all Grantee's right, title and interest in such property and equipment to Grantor. Grantee shall provide for the security and safekeeping of all property and equipment obtained with Grant Funds (directly or by reimbursement of costs).
- (c) <u>Publications</u>. Grantees of USDOE funding are encouraged to publish or otherwise make publicly available the results of the work conducted under the award. An acknowledgment of federal support and a disclaimer must appear in the publication of any material, whether copyrighted or not, based on or developed under this Project, as follows:

Acknowledgment: "This material is based upon work supported by the Department of Energy under Award Number **DE- EE0010093**."

Disclaimer: "This report was prepared as an account of work sponsored by an agency of the United States Government. Neither the United States Government nor any agency thereof, nor any of their employees, makes any warranty, express or implied, or assumes any legal liability or responsibility for the accuracy, completeness, or usefulness of any information, apparatus, product, or process disclosed, or represents that its use would not infringe privately owned rights. Reference herein to any specific commercial product, process, or service by trade name, trademark, manufacturer, or otherwise does not necessarily constitute or imply its endorsement, recommendation, or favoring by the United States Government or any agency thereof. The views and opinions of authors expressed herein do not necessarily state or reflect those of the United States Government or any agency thereof."

11. Adherence to State and Federal Laws and Regulations.

(a) <u>General</u>. Grantee shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws in the performance of Grantee's obligations under this Agreement, the completion of the Project and the operation of the Project if Grantee has any obligation to Grantor under this Agreement. Without limiting the generality of such obligation, Grantee shall pay or cause to be paid all unemployment

compensation, insurance premiums, workers' compensation premiums, income tax withholding, social security withhold, and all other taxes or payroll deductions required for all employees engaged by Grantee in connection with the Project, and Grantee shall comply with all applicable environmental, zoning, planning and building laws, and regulations, and all permit requirements applicable to the Project. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between federal statutes and regulations and the terms and conditions of this Agreement or the underlying federal award to Grantor, Grantor will seek guidance from USDOE.

- (b) <u>Ethics</u>. In accordance with Executive Order 2019-11D, Grantee, by its signature on this document, certifies: (1) it has reviewed and understands the Ohio ethics and conflict of interest laws including, without limitation, Ohio Revised Code §§ 102.01 *et seq.*, §§ 2921.01, 2921.42, 2921.421 and 2921.43, and §§ 3517.13(I) and (J), and (2) will take no action inconsistent with those laws and the order, as any of them may be amended or supplemented from time to time. Grantee understands that failure to comply with the Ohio ethics and conflict of interest laws, is in itself, grounds for termination of this Agreement and the grant funds made pursuant to this Agreement and may result in the loss of other contracts or grants with the State of Ohio.
- (c) <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. No personnel of Grantee, contractor of Grantee or personnel of any such contractor, and no public official who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the review or approval of any work completed under this Agreement, shall, prior to the completion of such work, voluntarily or involuntarily acquire any personal interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible or in conflict with the discharge or fulfillment of his or her functions or responsibilities with respect to the completion of work contemplated under this Agreement. Grantee shall immediately disclose in writing to Grantor any such person who, prior to or after the execution of this Agreement, acquires any personal interest, voluntarily. Grantee shall cause any such person who, prior to or after the execution of this Agreement, acquires any personal interest, voluntarily disclose such interest to Grantor in writing. Thereafter, such person shall not participate in any action affecting the work under this Agreement unless Grantor determines that, in light of the personal interest disclosed, his or her participation in any such action would not be contrary to the public interest.
- (d) **No Contingency Fees.** Grantee represents and warrants to Grantor that Grantee has not employed or retained any person or entity to solicit or secure this Agreement upon an agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee. If such representation proves to be false, Grantor shall have the right to rescind this Agreement without liability or, in its discretion, to deduct from the Grant Funds or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, or contingent fee, or to seek such other remedies as may be legally available for the breach.
- (e) <u>Outstanding Liabilities</u>. Grantee represents and warrants to Grantor that Grantee does not owe: (1) any delinquent taxes to the State of Ohio or a political subdivision of the State of Ohio; (2) any moneys to the State of Ohio or a state agency for the administration or enforcement of any environmental laws of the State of Ohio; and (3) any other moneys to the State of Ohio, a state agency or a political subdivision of the State of Ohio that are past due, whether or not the amounts owed are being contested in a court of law.
- (f) Falsification of Information. Grantee represents and warrants to Grantor that Grantee has made no knowingly false statements to Grantor or any of its employees or agents in the process of obtaining the award of Grant Funds. Grantee acknowledges that any person who knowingly makes a false statement to obtain an award of financial assistance may be required under Ohio Revised Code § 9.66(C) to repay such financial assistance and shall ineligible for any future

economic development assistance from the State of Ohio, any state agency or a political subdivision. In addition, any person who provides a false statement to secure economic development assistance may be guilty of falsification, a misdemeanor of the first degree, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code § 2921.13(F)(1).

- (g) Equal Employment Opportunity. Grantee shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, disability, age, military status or ancestry. Grantee shall ensure that applicants for employment are considered for employment, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, religion, color, sex, national origin, disability, age, military status or ancestry. Grantee shall incorporate the requirements of this paragraph in all of its contracts for any work to be performed as part of the Project (other than subcontracts for standard commercial supplies or raw materials), and Grantee shall require all of its contractors to incorporate such requirements in all subcontracts for such work. Grantee agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination provision. Grantee will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employment positions, expressly indicate that applications placed for consideration of employment will be reviewed without regard to the race, religion, color, sex, national origin, disability, age, military status or ancestry of the applicant. Any prohibition against discrimination on the basis of age under the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 or with respect to an otherwise qualified disabled individual as provided in Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 shall also apply to any program or activity funded in whole or in part with the Grant Funds.
- (h) Prevailing Wage and Labor Standards. All laborers and mechanics employed by Grantee, its contractors or subcontractors on any such construction work (as defined in 29 C.F.R. part 5) that is part of the Project shall be paid in accordance with the Davis-Bacon Act and related laws, 40 U.S.C. 276a to 276a- 5, as amended, the wages that have been determined by the U.S. Secretary of Labor to be the wages prevailing for the corresponding classes of laborers and mechanics employed on project(s) of a character similar to the contract work in the civil subdivision of the state wherein the work is to be performed. In addition, all laborers and mechanics employed by Grantee, its contractors or subcontractors on such construction work shall be paid overtime compensation in accordance with the provisions of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, 40 U.S.C. 327 to 333. Grantee shall require that all of its contractors and their respective subcontractors shall comply with all regulations issued pursuant to these acts and with other applicable federal and state laws and regulations. In the event that construction work to be undertaken on the Project is not subject to the application of the Davis-Bacon Act and related laws, and neither the federal government nor any of its agencies prescribes predetermined minimum wages to be paid to mechanics and laborers to be employed in such construction work, Grantee shall comply with the provisions of Ohio Revised Code Sections 4115.03 to 4115.16, inclusive, as applicable, with respect to the payment of all mechanics and laborers employed in such construction work.
- (i) <u>Procurement</u>. When procuring property and services to be paid for in whole or part with Grant Funds, Grantee shall comply with the procurement standards and other requirements for procurement set forth in 10 C.F.R. § 600.236(b) through (i). Without limiting the foregoing, Grantee acknowledges all of its contracts for the procurement of property and services will contain contract provisions as described in 10 C.F.R. § 600.236(i). It is the sense of the Congress that, to the greatest extent practicable, all equipment and products purchased with funds made available under this Agreement should be American-made.
- (j) Historic Preservation. (i) Prior to the expenditure of federal funds to alter any structure or site,

Grantee shall comply with the requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA), consistent with USDOE's 2009 letter of delegation of authority regarding the NHPA. Section 106 applies to historic properties that are listed in, or eligible for listing in, the National Register of Historic Places. In order to fulfill the requirements of Section 106, Grantee must cooperate with Grantor in contacting the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) to coordinate the Section 106 review outlined in 36 C.F.R. part 800. SHPO contact information is available at the following link: http://www.ncshpo.org/find/index.htm. (ii) Section 110(k) of the NHPA applies to USDOE-funded activities. Grantee shall avoid taking any action that results in an adverse effect to historic properties pending compliance with Section 106. (iii) Grantee should be aware that the USDOE Contracting Officer will consider Grantor to be in compliance with Section 106 of the NHPA only after Grantor has submitted adequate background documentation to the SHPO for its review, and the SHPO has provided written concurrence to Grantor that the SHPO does not object to Grantor's Section 106 finding or determination. Grantee shall provide promptly to Grantor and/or to the SHPO such information concerning the Project and any properties that may be affected by the Project as may be necessary or useful for Grantor to make its Section 106 finding or determination and for the SHPO to evaluate a request for concurrence in the Section 106 finding or determination. Grantor shall provide a copy of the SHPO concurrence to the Contracting Officer.

- (k) <u>Public Records</u>. Grantee acknowledges that this Agreement and other records in the possession or control of Grantee regarding the Project are public records under Ohio Revised Code § 149.43 and are open to public inspection unless a legal exemption applies.
- (1) <u>Lobbying Restriction</u>. Grantee shall not expend any Grant Funds, directly or indirectly, to influence congressional action on any legislation or appropriation matters before Congress other than to communicate to Members of Congress as described in 18 U.S.C. § 1913. This restriction is in addition to those prescribed elsewhere in statute and regulation.

12. Termination.

- (a) <u>Reasons for Termination</u>. Grantor may withhold payment under this Agreement or terminate this Agreement in whole or in part under any of the following circumstances: (i) Grantee fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including any Program rules and requirements incorporated into this Agreement; (ii) Grantor determines that Grantee cannot or will not take the necessary action to bring Grantee into compliance with applicable requirements of 10 C.F.R. part 600, with the requirements of any applicable program statute or rule, or with any other term or condition of this Agreement within the time allowed by this Agreement or otherwise approved by Grantor; (iii) Grantee ceases to exist or becomes legally incapable of performing its responsibilities under this Agreement; or (iv) Grantee fails to comply with any reporting requirements including, but not limited to, submission of reports provision of this Agreement. Grantor may also terminate this Agreement in the event USDOE cancels its grant of funds to Grantor.
- (b) <u>Procedure</u>. If Grantor has a basis to terminate the Agreement or to withhold Grant Funds as provided in paragraph (a) of this Section 12, Grantor shall notify Grantee in writing (the "Notice") sent by certified mail or commercial delivery. The Notice shall state in reasonable detail the basis for the action and sections of the statutes, rules, regulations or contractual obligations that Grantee is charged with violating.
- (c) <u>Effect of Early Termination</u>. Within sixty (60) days after early termination of this Agreement, Grantee shall provide Grantor with a Closeout Report setting forth the total expenditure of the Grant Funds by Grantee and the status of the Project at the time of termination. In addition,

Grantee shall surrender all reports, documents, and other materials assembled and prepared pursuant to this Agreement, which shall become the property of Grantor. Grantee shall have the right to use of the data for Grantee's own internal, non-commercial educational, training or research purposes. Upon review of the Closeout Report, Grantor shall determine whether or not Grantee shall be required to refund any portion of the Grant Funds. The refund decision will be within the sole discretion of Grantor, on behalf of the State of Ohio (the "**State**"). In no event shall Grantee be required to refund an amount in excess of the total Grant Funds awarded under this Agreement. Grantee shall be entitled to compensation for any un-reimbursed expenses reasonably and necessarily incurred in the satisfactory performance of this Agreement. Grantee shall incur no new obligations after the date of receipt of the Notice, and shall cancel as many outstanding obligations as possible. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Section 12, Grantee shall not be relieved of its responsibility for damages sustained by Grantor by virtue of any breach of contract by Grantee, and Grantor may withhold any reimbursement to Grantee for the purpose of set-off until such time as the exact amount of damages due Grantor from Grantee is agreed upon or otherwise determined.

- (d) <u>Termination Requested by Grantee</u>. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Section 12, if Grantee is unable or unwilling to comply with such additional conditions as may be lawfully applied by Grantor, Grantee may request to terminate this Agreement by giving reasonable written notice to Grantor, indicating the effective date of termination, the reasons for requesting the termination, and an appropriate budget revision. In such event, Grantor shall terminate the Agreement only if both parties agree to the termination and to the conditions under which it shall occur.
- 13. <u>Indemnification</u>. Each party shall be responsible for its own acts and omissions and those of its employees, staff, and/or agents. Neither party shall be responsible for the acts and/or omissions of the other party's employees, staff, and/or agents. Nothing in this Agreement shall transfer responsibilities of the acts and/or omissions of one party to the other party.
- 14. <u>Certification of Funds</u>. None of the rights, duties and obligations of the parties under this Agreement shall be binding on either party until all statutory provisions of the Ohio Revised Code including, without limitation, Section 126.07, have been complied with, and until such time as all funds have been made available and are forthcoming from the appropriate state agencies.
- 15. <u>Notice</u>. Any notice or report required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been sufficiently given for all purposes if mailed by first class certified or registered mail or sent by commercial delivery to the following addresses of the parties or to such other address as either party may hereafter furnish by written notice to the other party.

16. Miscellaneous.

If to Grantor:

- (a) <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Ohio as to all matters including, but not limited to, its validity, construction, effect and performance.
- (b) **Forum and Venue.** Grantee irrevocably submits to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of any federal or state court sitting in Columbus, Ohio, in any action or proceeding arising out of or related to this Agreement, Grantee agrees that all claims in respect of such action or proceeding may be heard and determined in any such court, and Grantee irrevocably waives any objection it may now or hereafter have as to the venue of any such action or proceeding brought in such court or that such court is an inconvenient forum. Nothing in this Agreement shall limit the right of Grantor to bring any action or proceedings against Grantee in the courts of any other jurisdiction. Any actions or proceedings by Grantee against Grantor or the State of Ohio involving, directly or indirectly, any matter in any way arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be brought only in a court in Columbus, Ohio.
- (c) <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including its exhibits and documents incorporated into it by reference, constitutes the entire agreement and understanding of the parties with respect to its subject matter. Any prior written or verbal agreement, understanding or representation between the parties or any of their respective officers, agents, or employees is superseded and no such prior agreement, understanding or representation shall be deemed to affect or modify any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement.
- (d) **Severability.** Whenever possible, each provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted in such manner as to be effective and valid under applicable law, but if any provision of this Agreement is held to be prohibited by or invalid under applicable law, such provision shall be ineffective only to the extent of such prohibition or invalidity, without invalidating the remainder of such provisions of this Agreement.
- (e) <u>Amendments</u>. This Agreement may not be amended or modified except upon such terms as both parties may agree in a writing executed by authorized representatives of each party.
- (f) **Forbearance Not a Waiver**. No act of forbearance or failure to insist on the prompt performance by Grantee of its obligations under this Agreement, either express or implied, shall be construed as a waiver by Grantor of any of its rights under this Agreement or applicable law.
- (g) **Pronouns.** The use of any gender pronoun shall be deemed to include the other gender, and the use of any singular noun or verb shall be deemed to include the plural, and vice versa, whenever the context so requires.
- (h) **<u>Headings</u>**. Section headings contained in this Agreement are inserted for convenience only and shall not be used in construing this Agreement.
- (i) <u>Assignment</u>. Neither this Agreement nor any rights, duties, or obligations of Grantee pursuant to this Agreement shall be assigned by Grantee without the prior express written consent of Grantor, which shall not be unreasonably withheld. Any purported assignment not made in accordance with this paragraph shall be void.
- (j) **<u>Binding Effect</u>**. Each and all of the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall extend to and bind and inure to the benefit of Grantee, its successors and permitted assigns.

- (k) <u>Survival</u>. Any provision of this Agreement which, by its nature, is intended to survive the expiration or other termination of this Agreement, including, without limitation, any indemnification obligation, record retention and inspection rights shall so survive and shall benefit the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns.
- (1) <u>Counterparts; PDF Accepted</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed to be an original and all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same agreement. Copies of signatures sent by facsimile transmission or provided electronically in portable document format ("PDF") shall be deemed to be originals for purposes of execution and proof of this Agreement.

Contract Provisions

Appendix II to Part 200—Contract Provisions for Non-Federal Entity Contracts Under Federal Awards

In addition to other provisions required by the Federal agency or non-Federal entity, all contracts made by the non-Federal entity under the Federal award must contain provisions covering the following, as applicable.

- A. Contracts for more than the simplified acquisition threshold currently set at \$150,000, which is the inflation adjusted amount determined by the Civilian Agency Acquisition Council and the Defense Acquisition Regulations Council (Councils) as authorized by 41 U.S.C. 1908, must address administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as appropriate.
- B. All contracts in excess of \$10,000 must address termination for cause and for convenience by the non-Federal entity including the manner by which it will be effected and the basis for settlement.
- C. Equal Employment Opportunity. Except as otherwise provided under 41 CFR Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 CFR Part 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 CFR 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor."
- D. Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. 3141-3148). When required by Federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti- Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non- Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.

- F. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under 40 U.S.C. 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- G. Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. CONTRACT FOR POLICE PROTECTION SERVICES FOR VIOLET TOWNSHIP, FAIRFIELD COUNTY, OHIO

This Agreement is entered into by and between the **Board of Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio, by and through the Fairfield County Sheriff's Office,** hereinafter referred to as "the **County**" and Violet Township, hereinafter referred to as "the **Township**".

WHEREAS, the Board of Township Trustee of Violet Township, Fairfield County, Ohio ("Violet Township") desires to enter into a contract with the Fairfield County, Ohio Sheriffs Office ("Sheriff") for the provision of regular police protection within the unincorporated areas of Violet Township pursuant to Section 505.43 and 505.50 Ohio Revised Code; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff is willing to provide regular police protection services to Violet Township,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, Violet Township and the Sheriff agree to the following:

Section 1. The County shall furnish personnel necessary to perform police services for forty (40) hours a week. It is further mutually agreed between the parties hereto that the duties of the aforesaid Sheriff personnel will be determined from time to time by the best judgement of the Sheriff and the Township, including but not limited to, normal police duties, serving court papers, and duties in cooperation with other Township functions. In addition, notwithstanding anything set forth herein, the Sheriff shall have the right to use the aforesaid Sheriff personnel in any emergency as he sees fit and to consult with the Township as to emergencies that may exist in the Township.

Section 2. The Township agrees to pay the County compensation for services performed as required by Section 1 herein in accordance with the following:

(A). All payments to be made by the Township hereunder shall be payable directly to the Fairfield County Sheriffs Office, which shall then forward those payments to the Fairfield County Treasurer for deposit to the Sheriffs policing revolving fund. The total amount owed by the Township to the County for services to be provided hereunder from January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024 shall be one hundred seventeen thousand one hundred thirty-three dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$117,133.67) per year, payable in 12 monthly installments as follows:

January 1, 2024: \$9761.14 February 1, 2024: \$9761.14 March 1, 2024: \$9761.14 April 1, 2024: \$9761.14 May 1, 2024: \$9761.14 June 1, 2024: \$9761.14 July 1, 2024: \$9761.14 August 1, 2024: \$9761.14 September 1, 2024: \$9761.14 November 1, 2024: \$9761.14 December 1, 2024: \$9761.13

Section2. The term of this contract shall commence on January 1, 2024 and end on December 31st of 2024, regardless of date signed. The parties may renew this agreement for like periods of one (1) year upon written agreement signed by all parties. Not withstanding the above, this agreement may be terminated by either party upon thirty (30) days advance written notice to the other. This agreement may be amended only by a written document signed by both parties

SectionJ. Neither the Township nor the County shall assign, sublet, or transfer its interest in this agreement to any third party without the written consent of the other party hereto.

<u>Section 4.</u> This agreement contains the sole and entire agreement between the parties and shall supercede any and all other agreements heretofore made between the parties.
