Review Meeting

Welcome

Commissioner Levacy opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance and explained why the meeting would be held with expediency.

Listen & Learn – Fairfield County Board of Developmental Disabilities (DD)

Dr. David Uhl, Superintendent to the Fairfield County Board of Developmental Disabilities, introduced DD staff and spoke about the reason for the existence of DD. He introduced DD Board member Sharon Scruggs and spoke about the individuals and school districts supported by DD. Dr. Uhl stated that the staff would be presenting on sustainability and innovation addressed through technology, partnerships, and resources; and added that the three presenters all have integral roles with DD.

Michelle Dexter spoke about what sustainability means to those involved with DD. She stated that there are many pieces to the puzzle in supporting an individual and that contributions can be made through one's expertise, passion, and resources. Ms. Dexter added that sustainability can also be addressed through grants, as well as technology, partnerships, and resources.

Jenna Trager spoke about growth and intervention. She stated that the COVID-19 pandemic and opioid epidemic have led to a large increase in early intervention referrals. She emphasized that referrals have increased across the state and highlighted the innovations that are unique to Fairfield County.

Lori Ferbrache spoke about using technology to enhance an individual's ability to be independent. She spoke about enabling technology and stated that Ohio became a Tech First State in 2018 and that the Smart Tech Environment was completed at Forest Rose in 2023.

Commissioner Levacy commented on the expanded possibilities with technology for those with communication disabilities.

Dr. Uhl added that DD supports nearly 1600 people and that the three presenters are passionate team members who help individuals with their journey to greater independence. He then spoke about two John Pekar Legacy Awards and four Celebration Awards. He announced that the Fairfield County Board of Commissioners have been unbelievably supportive and are the winners of one of the four Celebration Awards.

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Commissioner Levacy spoke about the legacy of John Pekar and of the great work Dr. Uhl had done thus far in his tenure.

Commissioner Davis thanked Dr. Uhl and the other presenters for their time and commitment.

Public Comments

Ray Stemen of Lancaster spoke about the destiny of the nation and provided a prayer.

Judy Stemen of Lancaster spoke about memories of DD in the 1970's and about COVID-19 headlines.

Stephanie Taylor stated that on April 12, 2023, Habitat for Humanity volunteers will start in Pleasantville and the recipient will be receiving her first home.

Mary Ann Berry of Pleasantville spoke about opposing the Eastern Cottontail Solar Project, and that her main concern was over the issue of food and stewardship of the land, she asked the Commissioners to consider a resolution prohibiting solar projects in Fairfield County.

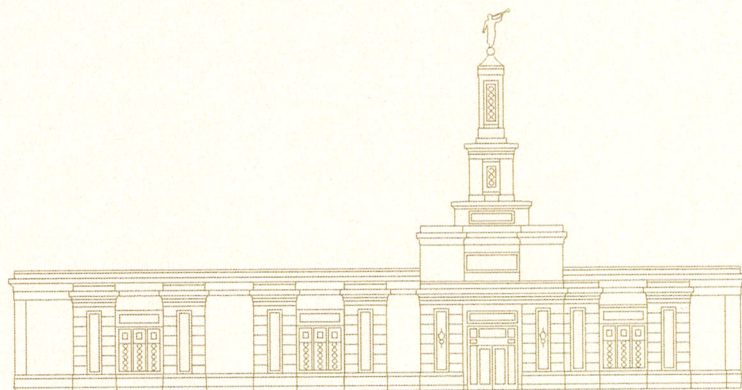

FBI Citizens Academy

The FBI Citizens Academy is an engaging eight-week program that gives business, religious, civic, and community leaders an inside look at the FBI. Classes meet in the evenings at FBI field offices around the country. The mission is to foster a greater understanding of the role of federal law enforcement in the community through frank discussion and education. **I am honored to have been selected to participate in the FBI Citizens Academy beginning in April.**

Board of Health Apportionments

In 2022, I conducted a detailed presentation about the calculation of apportionments (shares of costs) for the Board of Health and the entities who participate in the General Health District. **In March of 2023, the County Auditor team is reaching out to each political subdivision to see if there are any questions about how the calculation is derived.** Here are some key points of the process:

- The *Board of Health* evaluates its prospective resources and expenses. The member political subdivisions evaluate and determine the need for resources. The *District Advisory Council* reviews and approves contracts (such as with the City of Lancaster) and evaluates the budget.
- The County Auditor is the chief appraiser for the real estate *valuations of the political subdivisions*. A video about the role of the county appraiser is found here:

For the apportionment calculations, the percentage of each political subdivision's share of the aggregate valuation is calculated. (Tax Year 2021 applies to Fiscal Year 2023 and so forth.)
- *The percentage share for each political subdivision is applied to the need presented. This calculation provides the share or allocation from political subdivisions. This resulting calculation is referred to as an apportionment.*
- *Deductions of apportionments are made at the time of real estate tax property settlements. The apportionments are provided to the Board of Health for operations.*

Payroll Dates for Elected Officials

Elected Officials are paid twice a month, twenty-four times a year, for codified salaries. The pay period beginning date for the first pay is January 1. The pay period ending date for the final pay is December 31. The practice allows for efficient alignment with codified annual salaries. If there is a change in the expected service date, though, where service ends prior to a payroll ending date, there might be a need for reimbursement to the county, depending on the timing of the scenario. **Elected Officials are paid slightly ahead.** Overall, the manner of payment provides for compliance with the ORC and is considered a best practice among counties for how it results in fewer adjustments for quarterly retirement contributions.

April Map of the Month

The April Map of the Month is a “heat map” showing 2022 property sales in Fairfield County.

Concentrations of sales are found in the City of Lancaster, the Northwest portion of the county, and in the Buckeye Lake Region.

I'm not opposed to solar, however, I am opposed to an industrial solar plant possibly being constructed on property zoned ag residential, of which I live directly across the street from. I understand the landowners who lease their property to Eastern Cottontail have rights, but so do I. I, as well as others, have major concerns about this project and how it will effect and alter our properties. I am not an attorney, but below is information I found regarding property rights. I have highlighted the areas that I believe pertain to my and others concerns, and legitimize that our property rights are at risk if this project is approved.

[In General – Adjoining Landowners \(uslegal.com\)](https://www.uslegal.com)

Adjoining landowners have reciprocal rights and obligations towards each other. Though these rights and obligations have existed at common law, the rights and obligations have been modified by various state laws and court decisions.

Generally, landowners are expected to use their property reasonably without unduly interfering with the rights of the owners of contiguous land. A landowner's use of the property is treated as unlawful if he/she does anything on the property that appropriates or encroaches upon adjoining land or substantially deprives an adjoining owner of the reasonable enjoyment of his or her property.

Property owners have the right to make improvements and changes on their land so long as they do not infringe or alter the land of adjacent landowners. Landowners can grade or change the level of their land or build foundations or embankments as long as proper precautions are taken. If permitted by law, landowners may blast on their own property but will be liable for damages caused by the flying debris thrown onto adjoining land.

Adjoining landowners are those persons, such as next-door neighbors, who own land that share common boundaries and thus have mutual rights, duties, and liabilities. The reciprocal rights and obligations of adjoining landowners existed at common law but have been invariably altered or expanded by various state laws and court decisions.

In general, the underlying theme is that adjoining landowners are expected to use their property reasonably without unduly interfering with the rights of the owners of contiguous land. Actions taken by a landowner that appropriate adjoining land or substantially deprive an adjoining owner of the reasonable enjoyment of his or her property is an unlawful use of one's property.

Adjoining landowners carry certain mutual rights, duties and liabilities. Landowners are expected to use their property reasonably without injuring the rights of adjoining landowners. The enjoyment should not unreasonably interfere or disturb the rights of adjoining landholders or create a **private nuisance**. Subject to this general requirement, a landowner can use his/her property according to his/her will upon the condition that such use will not injure any adjoining landowner (and does not violate the plethora of state and federal laws as to zoning, environmental hazards, etc. etc.)

A landowner is relieved from liability for injuries caused to an adjoining owner if the landowner makes a "reasonable use" of his/her property. However, the rule which allows a person to use his/her own property in such a manner to cause injury to another's property without any liability will be limited and is carefully defined in the courts and by statute.

A landowner's use of his/her property becomes unreasonable and unlawful if it constitutes an appropriation of the adjoining land and if it deprives the reasonable enjoyment of the adjoining owner of his/her property to a material degree. Brownsey v. General Printing Ink Corp., 118 N.J.L. 505 (Sup. Ct. 1937).

I am asking you to consider exercising your control under Senate Bill 52 and create an exclusionary zone for Fairfield County; or follow the lead of the 10 Ohio counties who have banned wind and solar projects.

Ottawa and Delaware are considering potential bans as of September 5, 2022.

I attended the Fairfield County Commissioners meeting on March 7, 2023.

There were union members in attendance who spoke about the Eastern Cottontail project and the jobs that would be created: high paying jobs with good benefits and pensions.

Some members to be employed, could be from Lancaster, but most will not reside in Fairfield County or possibly within the state of Ohio. The majority of these jobs are **short-term, temporary** positions. The large number of jobs Eastern Cottontail claims to create could be misleading to some, as these jobs are throughout the entire construction project, not all employed at the same time. Once their job assignment is complete, they get to return home, and chances are they are **not** living by solar panels, as I will be. The income the majority of these members will receive will not be spent locally within Fairfield County and therefore has little financial benefit to our community.

While these members talked about all the jobs that could be created, let's not forget about the people with decreased incomes or potentially losing their jobs. This includes farmers who lease the land, truck drivers, mechanics, welders, hired labor; ag sales for products such as fertilizer and seed producers; related business such as crop insurance and farm equipment, and I'm sure there are others I've missed.

This would have a significant effect on our agriculture economy. Farmers rely on ag production from the farmland to provide revenue that is dispersed in many of our local businesses. Less land to work on equals less income. Less farmland means less production, then results in more demand than supply, which means higher prices which are passed on to the consumer.

Farmers who lease land are in competition with the solar energy company, who can outbid them with **federal funds**, which are our tax dollars. There's no way they can compete.

We are already losing land to neighborhoods and businesses, which are needed, but we also need to keep some farmland, especially the best farmland in Walnut Township. People need to be fed. **2021-2022 Ohio lost 400,00 acres of farmland!**

The destruction this project could cause cannot be the best solution for Fairfield County. A industrial size solar project, is not a farm and does not belong on prime farmland, especially in the middle of ag residential properties. I am requesting your consideration in creating an exclusionary zone which would prohibit industrial solar projects in Walnut Township.

Will a connector road between U.S. 33 and I-70 ever become a reality?

CARROLL – Government officials have for years talked about building a connecting road from U.S. 33 to Interstate 70 to ease traffic congestion on U.S. 33. They've said the road would probably run from Pickerington to near Ohio 310 in Licking County.

But will the road ever become a reality?

The county hosted a public meeting recently at the Fairfield County Workforce Center on future development, and several people wanted to know more about it.

County economic development director Rick Szabrak said there are no current plans to build the road. But county commissioner Jeff Fix was not as definitive, although he said it may take at least 10 or 15 years and cost around \$240 million to complete.

"It will happen some day," Fix said. "Hopefully, in our lifetime. But there's no guarantees."

He said he doesn't know when or doesn't know where though. Fix said anyone who says they do know when or where is not being truthful.

"We understand there is a need for trucks to be able to get from (U.S.) 33 to (Interstate) 70 and vice versa to be able to keep them off the county roads, to be able to keep the congestion off (U.S.) 33," Szabrak said. "This has been a concept for 20-some years. But there are no plans, quite frankly, for it to happen."

He said it is listed as a project the county would like to see happen, though.

"But until somebody puts the \$240 million up and shows up with a Brinks truck with that money, there's not a lot of likelihood that happens," Szabrak said. "So we need to

come up with a lot of other ideas and other ways to be able to alleviate that (traffic) problem."

However, Fix said the county is advocating to the Ohio Department of Transportation and the U.S. Congress for the connector road. He said ODOT has said a connecting road is needed.

"We're knocking on every door we can because it is essential to us to move people around the county in a much better fashion that we are today," he said. "The bypass around the southern part of Lancaster was in process for 20-plus years. So none of this stuff happens overnight."

Regarding another transportation issue on U.S. 33 in Pickerington, Fix said the state will eventually build an interchange at U.S. 33 and Pickerington Road with traffic diverted east and north.

He said he hopes for it to be sooner than later.

County hires transportation consultant to look at local transit issues

LANCASTER – The Fairfield County commissioners have made improving transportation access for local residents a priority for 2023.

To that end, the county hired RLS and Associates near Dayton for about \$49,000 to look into the county's transportation needs and issues. The company is expected to deliver its report in August. It is a transportation consultant that commissioner Steve Davis said frequently works for the Ohio Department of Transportation.

"They're going to study the transit system in the county and see what we could or should be doing better," Davis said. "Or perhaps whether the transit system is just fine the way it is."

The company met last week with numerous people and groups involved in local transportation, including the commissioners, Meals on Wheels of Fairfield County, Fairfield Center for disABILITIES and Cerebral Palsy, the Salvation Army and several more.

Local employers like Claypool Electric, Fairfield Medical Center and Midwest Fabricating attended the two-hour meeting and talked about the gaps in the local transit system and how to fill them.

"That was RLS's first shot at collecting information," Davis said. "I think their next step will be to do a deep dive data analysis with Lancaster-Fairfield Transit. All transit systems that receive federal or state money are required to keep very detailed records of their deliveries and their denials.

"They're also going to do a deep dive into the financial status and history of Lancaster-Fairfield Transit, all with an eye towards giving us guidance as to

whether we're hitting the right mark from a service standpoint and whether there would be a cost or outlay benefit to the potential transfer of governance from city to county."

While giving an overview of the county's transit system is the first part of the RLS's job, the second part is to study whether the county should take over the Lancaster-Fairfield Public Transit system. The company will study the costs and benefits of such a move.

Davis said as of December, the LFPT had to deny 500 trips last year throughout the county. But he said the agency is adding staff and drivers to lower that number this year.

"So we're curious about that number and whether there are ways that we might bring that number down," he said.

Davis said he didn't know what the details of a takeover would be like. But he said the county considers LFPT director Chasilyn Carter and her staff as "a part of the solution, not a part of the problem."

As for gauging the success of working with RLS, Davis said the county has a history of commissioning various studies and not acting on them before he took office in 2011.

"So I think the most important thing is when you start a discussion is to conclude that discussion," he said. "I'm perfectly fine if RLS wants to come back and tell us our transit system is fine and there's no perceptible benefit to moving that system from city to county. That's fine. We close the books."

But Davis said he hopes the study helps provide the means for people who want to work to be able to get to work.

"That's what's motivating the county's questions right now," he said. "We have a fairly large number of local employers who are having difficulty getting workers who want to work to work."

Davis also said FMC sometimes discharges patients who have no way home.

"And that happens everyday," he said.

Mayor David Scheffler previously said the city has no issue with the county taking over LFPT.

"I know Commissioner Davis wants to expand what's done county wide," Scheffler said. "Certainly, that takes a lot of resources. I think if the city and country work together to get that done it would be a great benefit."

LFPT has a budget of \$2.7 million this year, with the city contributing \$150,000. The rest of the funding comes from state and federal sources, along with contracts to serve clients like Meals on Wheels of Fairfield County and the Fairfield County Board of Developmental Disabilities. LFPT also gets revenue from selling advertising on the sides of its vehicles.

LFPT had 111,945 passengers last year. There were 96,026 riders in 2021 and 89,362 in 2020 as the COVID-19 pandemic hit. Scheffler said ridership is now approaching pre-pandemic levels.

The transit system had 130,408 riders in 2019, the most it has had since 2009 when there were 56,820 riders. Ridership jumped to 111,787 in 2015 and was at 115,167 in 2016.

The low mark since 2009 was the 55,321 riders in 2012.

IRREVOCABLE LICENSE TO UTILIZE RIGHTS-OF-WAY AND UTILITY MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT

This Irrevocable License to Utilize Rights-of-Way and Utility Maintenance Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into between Fairfield County Board of Commissioners ("Grantor") and the Pickerington Local School District Board of Education ("Grantee"), each of which is a political subdivision and public body in the State of Ohio. Grantor and Grantee are at times collectively referred to hereinafter as the "Parties" or individually as the "Party". The Agreement is effective as of the date the last party hereto executes this Agreement.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code §3317.37, Grantee has the authority to "provide the necessary apparatus and make all other necessary provisions for the schools under its control" and "purchase or lease sites therefor, or rights-of-way thereto"; and,

WHEREAS, Grantee desires to install conduit and fiber optic cable within existing Fairfield County road rights of way along Refugee Road from Woodstock Avenue to Toll Gate Road and along Pickerington Road from Stemen Road to Refugee Road to connect each of the Grantee's buildings to the Grantee's network operations center ("the Project"); and,

WHEREAS, Grantor has dedicated rights-of-way along the roads impacted by this Project; and,

WHEREAS, Grantor is willing to allow Grantee to occupy Grantor's rights-of-way, upon the terms and conditions of this Agreement; and,

WHEREAS, while Grantee is not a public utility as identified under Ohio law, Grantor wants to ensure that Grantee complies with the same requirements as any other public utility that occupies Grantor's road rights of way.

- 2.) Legal Obligations of Grantee. Grantee is the owner of the Project. Grantee shall maintain its Project in compliance with the Fairfield County Engineer's Office Utility Permitting Regulations, incorporated hereto, along with any and all applicable Ohio Revised Code Sections.
- 3.) Grantee as Public Authority While Grantee is not a public utility, Grantee acknowledges that it is a public authority under Ohio Rev. Code 153.64(A)(2)(a).

Grantee further agrees to become a member of Ohio Utilities Protection Services (OUPS) as a Facility Owner in compliance with Ohio Rev. Code 3781.26(A).

Pursuant to Title IV-D of the Social Security Act, Parts 302, 303, and 304 of Title 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR); sections 3125.13 to 3125.17 of the Ohio Revised Code; and rules 5101:12-1-80 to 5101:12-1-80.4 of the Ohio Administrative Code (hereafter "IV-D Contract rules"), the Fairfield County Child Support Enforcement Agency (hereafter "CSEA") enters into this IV-D Contract with Jeffery Feyko, Attorney at Law (hereafter "Contractor") to purchase services for the effective administration of the support enforcement program.

The CSEA and the Contractor certify that all IV-D Contract activities shall be performed in compliance with Title IV-D of the Social Security Act, 45 CFR Parts 302, 303, and 304, and the rules in Division 5101:12 of the Administrative Code.

Unless otherwise specified, the terms of this IV-D Contract apply to both governmental contractors and private contractors.

The IV-D Contract consists of this document and all attached forms or documents that are incorporated and deemed to be a part of the IV-D Contract as if fully written herein. Nothing in this IV-D Contract shall be construed contrary to state or federal laws and regulations.

3. **Optional Purchase of Non-CSEA Initiated Activities:** In a IV-D Contract with a court for magistrate services, the CSEA may elect to purchase non-CSEA initiated activities in addition to CSEA initiated activities.  - **Modifications:** The CSEA or Contractor may modify the language in this IV-D Contract, provided that both the CSEA and the Contractor agree to the modifications, the CSEA submits the proposed modifications to OCS, and OCS accepts the modifications. If the CSEA or Contractor modifies the language in this IV-D Contract without the agreement of both parties to the IV-D Contract and acceptance from OCS, the modified IV-D Contract will have no force or effect of law.
9. **Billing Requirements:** When the Contractor is a private entity, the Contractor shall ensure that the JFS 07035 (IV-D Contract Invoice) is submitted to the CSEA no later than thirty (30) days after the last day of the month in which services were provided.
- When the Contractor is a governmental entity, the Contractor shall ensure that the JFS 07034 (Governmental Contractor Monthly Expense Report) and the JFS 07035 are submitted to the CSEA no later than thirty (30) days after the last day of the month in which services were provided. If the Contractor neglects or refuses to submit the JFS 07034 or JFS 07035 to the CSEA for payment within the appropriate time frame, the CSEA reserves the right to refuse payment.
- If the Contractor neglects or refuses to submit the JFS 07035 to the CSEA for payment within the appropriate time frame, the CSEA reserves the right to refuse payment.
10. **Expensed Equipment:** Equipment that has been included in the unit rate on the JFS 07020 and expensed rather than depreciated during the IV-D Contract period shall be transferred to the CSEA or the appropriate residual value shall be paid to the CSEA when the equipment is no longer needed to carry out the work under this IV-D Contract or a succeeding IV-D contract.
11. **Monitoring and Evaluation:** The CSEA and the Contractor shall monitor and evaluate the extent to which services described in the IV-D Contract are being performed. The CSEA shall evaluate the performance of the Contractor on the JFS 02151 (IV-D Contract Evaluation) and provide a copy of the completed JFS 02151 to the Contractor.
12. **Recordkeeping:** The Contractor shall maintain accounting procedures and practices that sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature expended in the performance of this IV-D Contract. All books, records, payroll, and documents related to this IV-D Contract that are in the possession of the Contractor or of a third party performing work related to this IV-D Contract shall be maintained and preserved by the Contractor for a period of three years after final payment, unless otherwise directed by the CSEA. Such records shall be subject at all reasonable times for inspection, review, or audit by duly authorized federal, state, and CSEA personnel or their designees. 15. **Insurance:** When the Contractor is a private entity, the Contractor shall contract for such insurance as is reasonably necessary to adequately secure the persons and estates of eligible individuals against reasonable, foreseeable torts that could cause injury or death.
16. **Finding for Recovery:** The Contractor certifies that the Contractor is not subject to a finding for recovery or it has taken the appropriate remedial steps required under section 9.24 of the Ohio Revised Code or it otherwise qualifies to contract with the State of Ohio under section 9.24 of the Ohio Revised Code.

19. **Confidentiality:** The Contractor agrees that information regarding an individual shall only be used for purposes related to the IV-D program, in accordance with rules 5101:12-1-20 to 5101:12-1-20.2 of the Ohio Administrative Code. Disclosure of information for any other purpose is prohibited.
20. **Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Compliance:** The Contractor certifies that it is in full compliance with all statutes and regulations pertaining to the ADA of 1990 and with section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
21. **Civil Rights:** The Contractor certifies compliance with rule 5101:9-2-01 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

IV. Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Information

A. Performance

In performance of this contract, the contractor agrees to comply with and assume responsibility for compliance by officers or employees with the following requirements:

- (1) All work will be performed under the supervision of the contractor.
- (2) The contractor and the contractor's officers or employees to be authorized access to federal tax information (FTI) must meet background check requirements defined in IRS Publication 1075. The contractor will maintain a list of officers or employees authorized access to FTI. Such list will be provided to the agency and, upon request, to the IRS.

- (4) FTI will be accounted for upon receipt and properly stored before, during, and after processing. In addition, any related output and products require the same level of protection as required for the source material.
- (5) The contractor will certify that FTI processed during the performance of this contract will be completely purged from all physical and electronic data storage with no output to be retained by the contractor at the time

the work is completed. If immediate purging of physical and electronic data storage is not possible, the contractor will certify that any FTI in physical or electronic storage will remain safeguarded to prevent unauthorized disclosures.

(6) Any spoilage or any intermediate hard copy printout that may result during the processing of FTI will be given to the agency. When this is not possible, the contractor will be responsible for the destruction of the spoilage or any intermediate hard copy printouts and will provide the agency with a statement containing the date of destruction, description of material destroyed, and the destruction method.

(7) All computer systems receiving, processing, storing, or transmitting FTI must meet the requirements in IRS Publication 1075. To meet functional and assurance requirements, the security features of the environment must provide for the managerial, operational, and technical controls. All security features must be available and activated to protect against unauthorized use of and access to FTI.

(8) No work involving FTI furnished under this contract will be subcontracted without the prior written approval of the IRS.

(9) Contractor will ensure that the terms of the FTI safeguards described herein are included, without modification, in any approved subcontract for work involving FTI.

(3) Each officer or employee of a contractor to whom FTI is or may be disclosed shall be notified in writing that any such unauthorized access, inspection or disclosure of FTI may also result in an award of civil damages against the officer or employee in an amount equal to the sum of the greater of \$1,000 for each unauthorized access, inspection, or disclosure, or the sum of actual damages sustained as a result of such unauthorized access, inspection, or disclosure, plus in the case of a willful unauthorized access, inspection, or disclosure or an unauthorized access/inspection or disclosure which is the result of gross negligence, punitive damages, plus the cost of the action. These penalties are prescribed by IRC sections 7213, 7213A and 7431 and set forth at 26 CFR 301.6103(n)-1.

(4) Additionally, it is incumbent upon the contractor to inform its officers and employees of the penalties for improper disclosure imposed by the Privacy Act of 1974, 5 U.S.C. 552a. Specifically, 5 U.S.C. 552a(i)(1), which is made applicable to contractors by 5 U.S.C. 552a(m)(1), provides that any officer or employee of a contractor, who by virtue of his/her employment or official position, has possession of or access to agency records which contain individually identifiable information, the disclosure of which is prohibited by the Privacy Act or regulations established thereunder, and who knowing that disclosure of the specific material is so prohibited, willfully discloses the material in any manner to any person or agency not entitled to receive it, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not more than \$5,000.

(5) Granting a contractor access to FTI must be preceded by certifying that each individual understands the agency's security policy and procedures for safeguarding IRS information. Contractors must maintain their authorization to access FTI through annual recertification. The initial certification and recertification must be documented and placed in the agency's files for review. As part of the certification and at least annually afterwards, contractors must be advised of the provisions of IRCs 7431, 7213, and 7213A (see Exhibit 4, Sanctions for Unauthorized Disclosure, and Exhibit 5, Civil Damages for Unauthorized Disclosure). The training on the agency's security policy and procedures provided before the initial certification and annually thereafter must also cover the incident response policy and procedure for reporting unauthorized disclosures and data breaches. (See Section 10) For the initial certification and the annual recertifications, the contractor and each officer or employee must sign, either with ink or electronic signature, a confidentiality statement certifying their understanding of the security requirements.

C. Inspections

The IRS and the Agency, with 24-hour notice, shall have the right to send its inspectors into the offices and plants of the contractor to inspect facilities and operations performing any work with FTI under this contract for compliance with requirements defined in IRS Publication 1075. The IRS' right of inspection shall include the use of manual and/or automated scanning tools to perform compliance and vulnerability assessments of information technology (IT) assets that access, store, process or transmit FTI. Based on the inspection, corrective actions may be required in cases where the contractor is found to be noncompliant with FTI safeguard requirements.



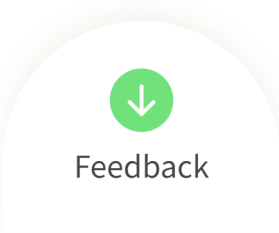

**CONTRACT FOR HOUSING PRISONERS IN THE FAIRFIELD COUNTY JAIL
BETWEEN FAIRFIELD COUNTY AND PERRY COUNTY**

WHEREAS, this contract is made this day of 8th March, 2023, by and between the Fairfield County Board of Commissioners, located at 210 East Main Street, Lancaster, OH 43130, ("Fairfield BCC"), the Fairfield County Sheriff, located at 345 Lincoln Avenue, Lancaster, OH 43130, (the Fairfield Sheriff), and the Perry County Board of Commissioners, located at 212 South Main St. Lower Level, New Lexington, Oh 43764 ("the Perry BCC") and the Perry County Sheriff, located at 110 W. Brown St., New Lexington, Ohio 43764 ("Perry Sheriff").

WHEREAS, the Perry BCC and the Perry Sheriff has the necessity and the need to house its prisoners elsewhere on a temporary basis beginning 2023;

WHEREAS, Perry BCC and the Perry Sheriff have reached out to the Fairfield BCC and Fairfield Sheriff to see if Fairfield County would be willing to house the Perry County Prisoners during this period by entering into a contract with the Fairfield BCC and the Fairfield Sheriff, pursuant to R.C. 341.23;

WHEREAS, Fairfield BCC and the Fairfield County Sheriff are willing to enter into a contract pursuant to R.C. 341.23 so long as certain housing parameters are agreed upon;

WHEREAS, this Agreement is intended to set forth the rights, duties, responsibilities, and obligations of the Fairfield Board, the Fairfield Sheriff and the Perry Board and Perry Sheriff for the term hereinafter set forth.

In consideration of the mutual covenants herein made each of the parties agrees as follows:

1. The Fairfield BCC and the Fairfield Sheriff shall receive, keep, board, and safely maintain in the Fairfield County Jail the following persons, as space permits:
 - a.) Perry County Prisoners who have been lawfully committed to custody by the Perry County Sheriff, or his deputies, via arrest or court order for any reason; and/or who have been charged with any misdemeanor or felony offense and are awaiting a bond hearing; and/or who are awaiting a trial and have not otherwise posted bail or been released by court order; and/or who serving a jail sentence after conviction except as provided in Paragraphs 2 through 12 below.

- b.) Persons incarcerated pursuant to subparagraph a. above shall be designated as "Perry County Prisoners" in this Agreement.
2. The Fairfield Sheriff hereby agrees to house no more than Twenty (20) Perry County prisoners at a time in the Fairfield County Jail commencing on January 1, 2023 and ending on December 31, 2023. Of the Twenty (20) Perry County Prisoners Fairfield County will receive, five (5) of those twenty (20) Prisoners can be female.
 3. Perry BCC agrees to pay Fairfield BCC and Fairfield Sheriff a per diem rate of \$ 92 per prisoner, per day. A day shall be calculated based on the date of booking reception and release. The Fairfield BCC and Fairfield Sheriff shall invoice the Perry Sheriff and Perry BCC a per diem rate of \$92 per each prisoner remaining. Such invoices shall be made the first of each month based on the number of prisoners held, the number of days held. Payment shall be made by the Perry County Sherriff to the Fairfield County Commissioners with the mailing address of 210 E. Main Street, Room 301, Lancaster, Ohio 43130. Said payment shall be applied to the Fairfield County General Fund. The Fairfield Sheriff reserves the right to return prisoners and refuse to accept additional prisoners if timely payment is not received.
 4. Perry County Prisoners confined in the Fairfield County Jail shall be subject to the rules and regulations of the Fairfield County Jail, which apply to all the prisoners therein.
 5. The Fairfield Sheriff may reject and refuse to receive any prisoners who may be afflicted with a prior medical problem, afflicted with any contagious disease, contagious infections, sexually transmitted disease, mental illness, illness, or injury that has not been treated prior to entry into the Fairfield County Jail.
 6. The Fairfield Sheriff, at his sole discretion, may unilaterally refuse to receive Perry County Prisoner(s) or may return any Perry County Prisoner(s) for reasons including but not limited to the current Fairfield County Jail population, internal security conditions of the jail, or for any other reason that the Fairfield Sheriff deems pertinent at the time. If the Fairfield Sheriff opts to return or reject Perry County Prisoner(s) for any reason, the Fairfield Sheriff shall give verbal or

electronic notice to the Perry County Sheriff and the Perry County Sheriff shall have no more than 24 hours to pick up the returned/rejected inmate(s).

7. The Perry BCC agrees to pay for any and all medical, surgical, dental, or ophthalmology expenses incurred on behalf of a prisoner, at any off-site medical facility, including doctor's fees, hospital charges, and prescription costs. Contacts with in-house medical staff, internal physician consultations/visits, will be covered under the agreed housing costs and no additional fees will apply.
8. The Perry Sheriff shall transport and provide security any time a prisoner must leave the Fairfield County Jail for any reason, unless a court orders that no transportation or security is needed. If the Fairfield Sheriff, via his deputies, transports a prisoner to and from the Fairfield County Jail under this Agreement, he shall submit the mileage to the Perry Sheriff for reimbursement as permitted under R.C. 341.23(C).
9. The Perry Sheriff shall bear the expense of the burial of a prisoner who dies in the Fairfield County Jail, if the body is not claimed for interment at the expense of friends or relatives.
10. No person under eighteen (18) years of age shall be received by the Fairfield Sheriff as a prisoner in the Fairfield County Jail.
11. The Perry BCC and Perry Sheriff agree that during the contract term, it shall and will abide and be governed by any and all rules and regulations which now are, or at any time in the future may be, in force at the offices of Fairfield County Commissioners, Common Pleas and Probate-Juvenile Judges, and the Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections.
12. The parties to this contract agree that notice be given to certain persons when particular inmates are to be released from custody, namely victims of domestic violence offenses, named/protected persons in temporary protection orders, named/protected persons in civil protection order and victims of menacing by stalking crimes. To that end, the Perry Sheriff specifically agrees to furnish to the Fairfield Sheriff, through the Fairfield County Jail staff, a current telephone number or numbers and/or contact information for all such protected persons, at the time the inmate is brought to the Fairfield County Jail, the Perry Sheriff shall update the information as any change becomes known. The Fairfield Sheriff agrees that the Fairfield County Jail shall contact those victims and/or protected

persons of any inmate pending release provided that a working telephone number has been furnished to the Fairfield Sheriff, via his jail staff. In situations where no working telephone number is provided, the Perry Sheriff shall be responsible for making the required notification to said victims and/or protected persons of an inmate's pending release upon being notified thereof by the Fairfield Jail when such notification has been given to the victim and/or protected persons and shall furnish the date and time of day said notification has been made. The Perry Sheriff acknowledges that failure to comply with these notifications terms will result in the refusal by the Fairfield Sheriff to accept as inmates those persons who have victims or other persons who are subject to release notification information, without voiding the entire contract altogether.

13. This Agreement may be terminated by either party during its term for any reason, by giving the other party a minimum of thirty (30) days written notice.
14. This Agreement shall be effective September 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021, with the option to renew for an additional specified term(s), upon mutual agreement of all of the parties.

Any alteration of contract shall result in the contract being null and void.



MOWING SERVICES ARE TO INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

The Scope of Work for this Proposal includes all mowing, trimming, edging, and cleaning of sidewalks. The Contractor is responsible for the following items:

The utility is requiring that each location be mowed no more than once every 6 -7 days on average. Additional mowing may be requested by the Utility. We are aware that the mowing timeframe may need to be adjusted during the spring while the grass is growing faster and, in the summer, and fall during the slower growing season. **Check with the Deputy Director of Operations (740-652-7125) when in doubt.**

The Utility requires that trimming around all posts, trees, fence lines and sidewalks should be performed with each mowing. The trimming around trees needs to be done without damage to the base of the trees.

All grass clippings must be blown off all sidewalks and asphalt.

When mowing during the day the contractor must stay a safe distance away from any individuals that would be around the building or parking lots.

Trimming must be done around all air conditioning units inside and outside the fenced areas of those units. Weeds and grass that might be growing in the cracks in the asphalt or gravel parking lots as well as curb blocks and railroad ties should be trimmed. This includes all curb and sidewalk areas.

PERFORMANCE:

The utility will also do a performance review on at least a monthly basis. The performance review will look at the quality of the job as well as the items listed in the "Scope of Work" section of this document. If it is determined that the contractor is not in compliance with the performance review, this will result in a mandatory face-to-face meeting. 

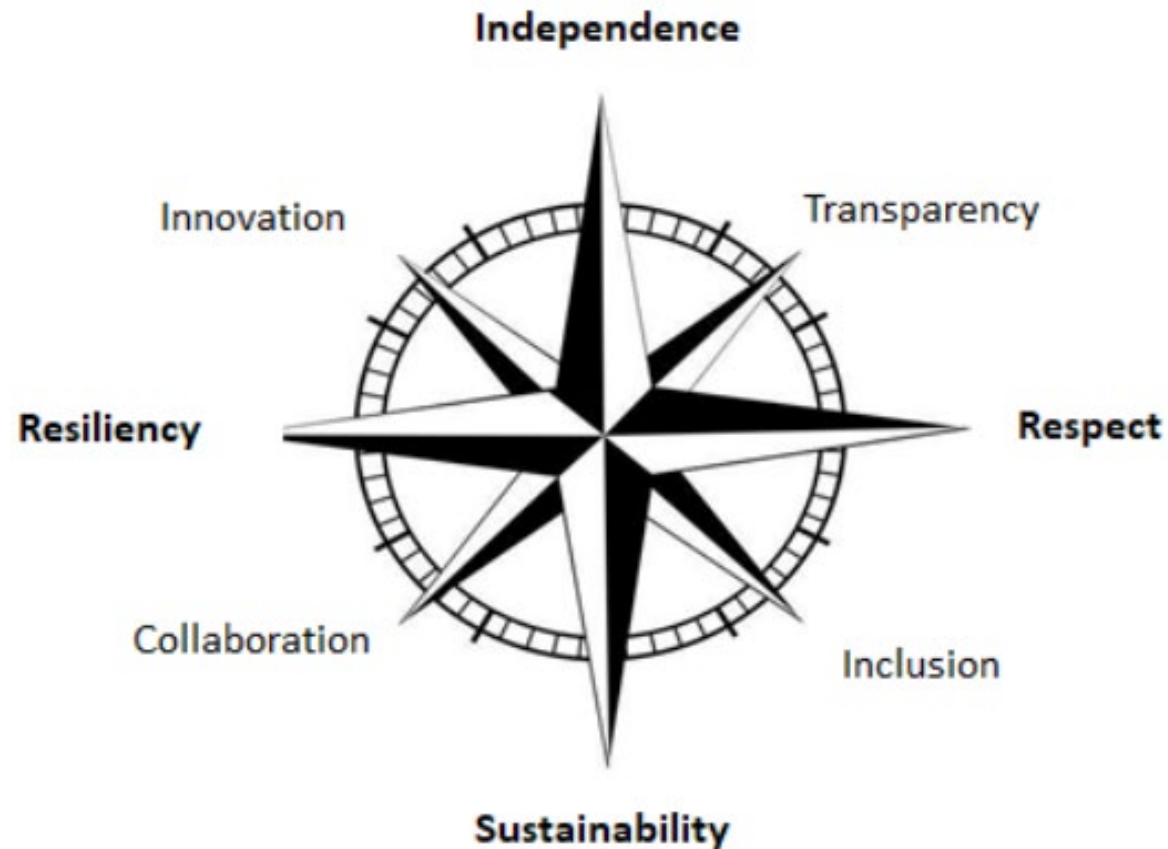

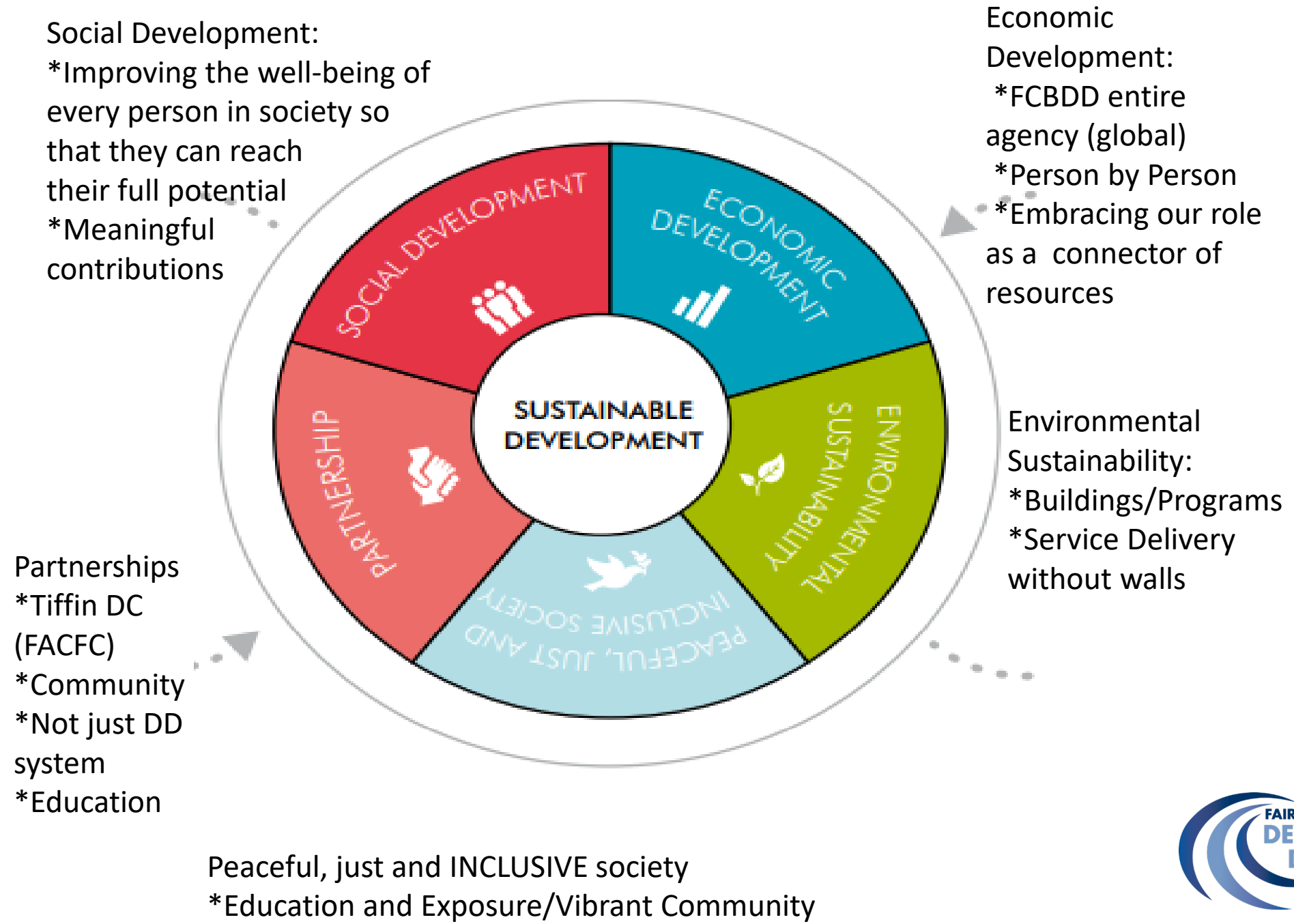

- ▶ In 2022 it’s been reported that there was a 5.5% increase in Early Intervention referrals from calendar year 2021.

Innovations Unique to Fairfield County EI

- ▶ Monthly Playgroup at The Early Literacy Center and Family Community Events
 - ▶ Every month our EI families and members of the community are invited to join our EI playgroups at the Northwest Branch of the Library.
 - ▶ Family Community Events
 - ▶ Every year we facilitate 4 community events for EI families to have time to get out and explore places in the community. We do this with the hope that they then can feel comfortable exploring them more regularly going forward.
 - ▶ Locations of events in years past: Slate Run Park, AHA Children's Museum, Pigeon Roost Farm, Rising Park, Art and Clay on Main, The Garden at the ELC, etc.
- ▶ Partnership with AHA Children's Museum
 - ▶ AHA allows us to purchase a childcare membership each year so that we are able to take families on visits for free to show them the space and see how they like the space before having to purchase a membership or pay admission
 - ▶ This partnership also allows for an alternate location to be used for home visits to help our lower income families explore more community spaces.

Innovations Continued

- ▶ Partnership with Ohio Guidestone
 - ▶ Our Early Childhood Mental Health Consultant attends our team meetings every week. She facilitates regular training to staff based off of family needs and ensures smooth transitions of referrals for further mental health supports.
- ▶ Close partnership with Early Head Start home visiting through Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action.
 - ▶ Allowing EI providers to show both parents and home visitors that are in the home weekly with the child, developmentally appropriate strategies to encourage developmental growth on a regular basis.

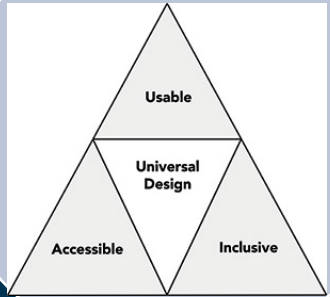

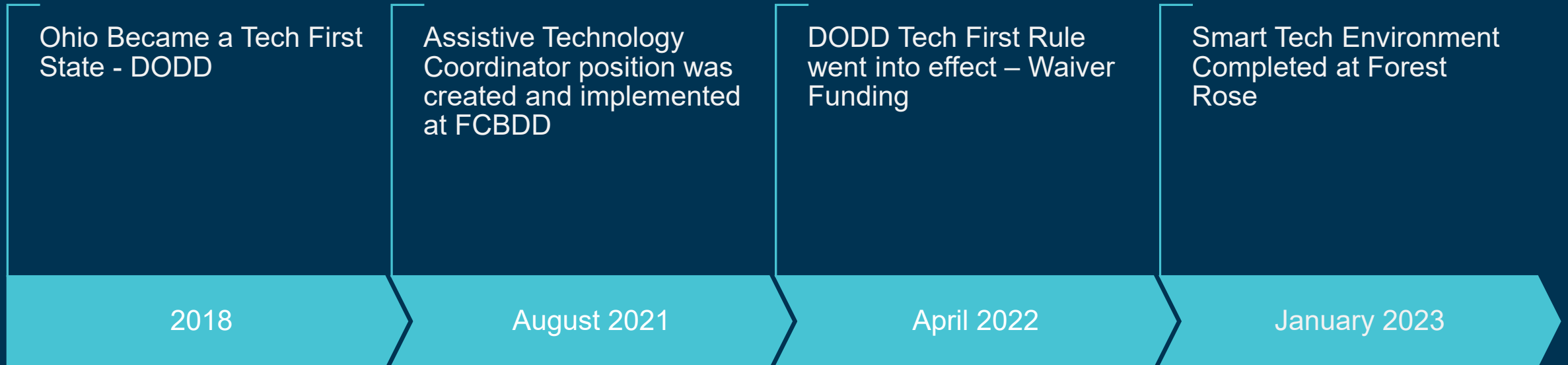

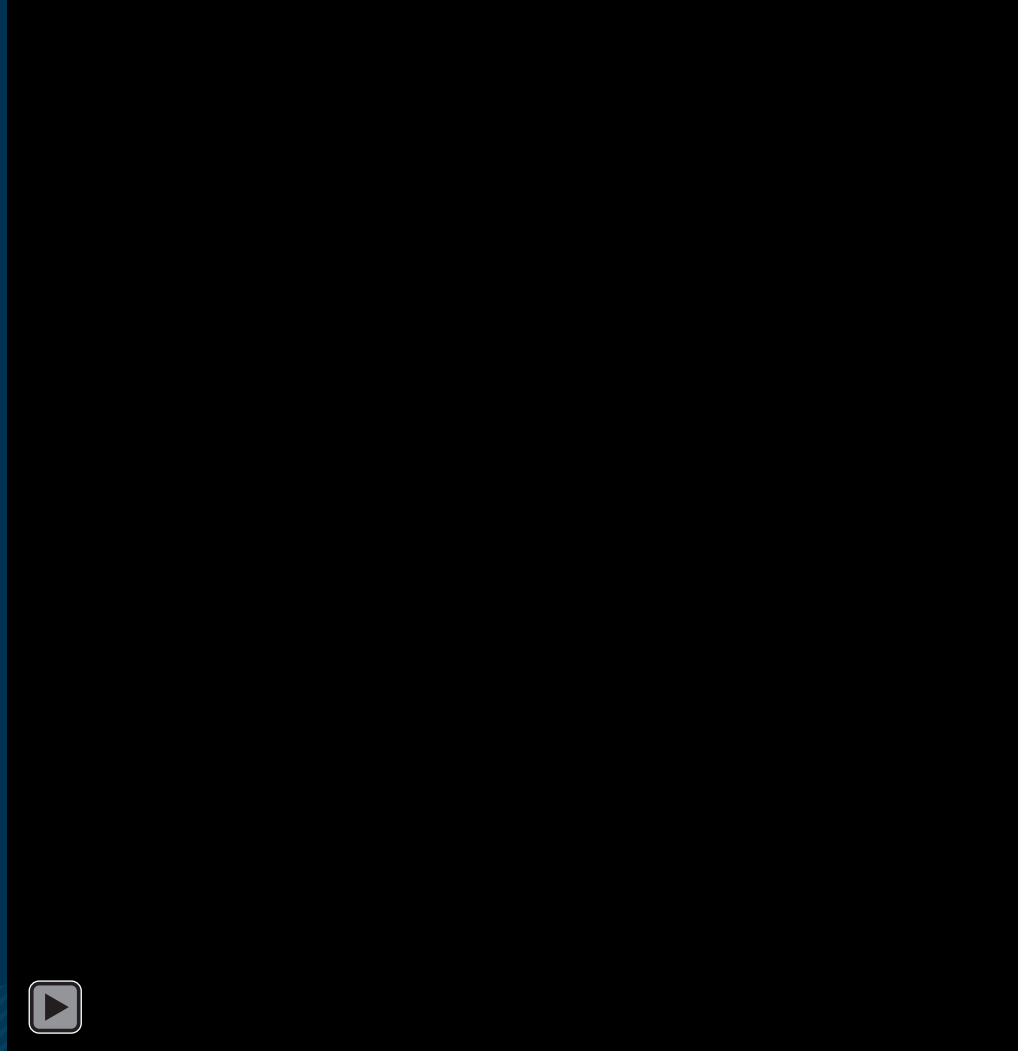
