Welcome

Commissioner Fix opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance. He took a moment to recognize Ed Laramee and said the following:

"Ed Laramee was a friend of mine. Ed passed away late last week at the age of 80, so I wanted to say a few words to remember him by, and to put into the public record so if someone generations from now for whatever reason comes across this, they will know that a good man served this county – largely unheralded – for 26 years.

Ed started working in the auditor's office – hired by Barbara Curtiss – in 1995. He served as Deputy Auditor pretty much from that time until his retirement earlier this year. He retired for a minute, in 2016, until his successor passed unexpectedly, and he immediately came back to work. His boss then was Jon Slater, whom Ed had run against in the 2010 Republican Primary for the auditor's seat that Mrs. Curtiss had retired from. He was unsuccessful in that campaign, but Mr. Slater wisely kept ed by his side until they retired within months of each other.

Ed was a Massachusetts guy – had a funny way of speaking. When I first met Ed Laramee in 1999, I thought he was a little peculiar, but also really smart. It took me a bit of time to understand how to interpret what Ed was saying but as I learned to do that, his political wisdom became clear.

For some reason Ed took me under his wing that year, provided me with a great deal of counsel during my own unsuccessful first campaign – that to be a violet township trustee. I have no idea what Ed saw in me but he stayed by my side through that, through my 13 years as a Pickerington Regular Meeting #25 - 2022 – June 21, 2022-1 -

City Councilman, the many years we spent together with the Fairfield County Republican Party, and most recently in my first term as a County Commissioner.

Now there are a number of people here who may have appreciated (or not) Ed as a person, but may have had some disagreement with some of his decisions as the Chief Deputy Auditor. I had my own. But I can tell you, like his style or not, that Ed lived his life by a few simple principles that he reminded me of often:

- 1. Regardless of any pressure that is put upon you always do what you believe to be the right thing to do regardless of the consequences. you always do the right thing and the rest will take care of itself.
- 2. Never forget that it is the **people** that we work for not each other, not the party, not some higher office it's the people, it's their money, we are just here to be the caretakes of it.
- 3. Regardless of how you feel about someone who is in office or seeking office, always respect the fact that they made the choice to put their name on the ballot. It's not an easy thing he would say to put yourself out there and have people take shots at you all so that you can serve the public. So always respect someone who is running, has run, or who holds an office even though you may disagree 100% with what they believe in.

Ed lived his life this way. He always did what he thought was right – often knowing that behind his back people would be rolling their eyes or shaking their heads. I'm not here to tell you that he was always right – just that he believed he was doing the right thing – all the time – every time.

As Ed became aware of his illness late last year, and understood that his days were likely numbered, he was at peace. We had lengthy talks (every talk with Ed was a lengthy talk) about how he felt he had spent his 80 years on earth the right way, he was proud of his family and of the life he and his wife sandy had made together. He was proud of the work he had done here in Fairfield County, and the home he made in Pickerington.

I am proud to have called Ed Laramee a friend and mentor. He made a significant positive impact in my life, and I imagine in the lives of many others. Though he is gone I will always carry a little reminder of Ed with me every time I am up here or anywhere I am acting on behalf of the public. "Just be you" he would always say. Don't try to be something you're not or be like someone else." "Just be jeff fix and know that you'll get the job done."

So thank you Ed. Thank you for your years of service to this government. Thank you for your friendship and mentorship to me and thank you for being the kind of public servant that we should all look up to."

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Listen and Learn - ADAMH

Marcy Fields, Executive Director of ADAMH, presented a Listen & Learn. She began by summarizing the services the ADAMH Board provides to Fairfield County. There are 13 Network of Care Agencies in the County to provide services to residents. They also provide training opportunities to community members and groups. Funding comes from Federal and State grants and allocations, and local levies. She provided contact information for services and organizations available to residents. Marcy also gave some ADAMH highlights for 2022, including new staff, review of trends and programs, discontinuation of non-effective programs, and the Board focus on organization and efficiency. Funding for FY23 includes the discontinuation of two programs, increasing funding for School Based Prevention Funding, and released RFP's for different programs, services, and support groups. The biggest barrier ADAMH faces is hiring staff to implement all these services. They will be working on solutions to this barrier in FY23. One of the projects ADAMH is working on currently is the construction of the STARLight Center in Lancaster. The Center will be a 24/7 facility with behavioral and healthcare professionals. It will offer supportive mental health and substance abuse treatment to persons needing more intensive care services. She provided the timeline of the STARLight Center and stated as of now the facility is still on time for completion. Marcy also spoke on the major projects and priorities of SFY 2023.

Commissioner Levacy stated his appreciation for the work Marcy Fields has accomplished in the short time she has been the Executive Director of ADAMH.

Commissioner Fix added that Marcy has exceeded his expectations and believes Fairfield County to be a better place because of her.

County Auditor Dr. Carri Brown welcomed Carter Corcoran to the Weights and Measures department.

Public Comments

Chris Schmelzer from Bremen spoke about a recent conversation he had regarding religion and the Declaration of Independence.

Steve Evans from Amanda spoke about his concerns for the solar project in Amanda.

Ray Stemen from Lancaster spoke about taking a trip to Amish country and seeing the devastation recent tornadoes had on the community.

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Judy Stemen from Lancaster commended the Amish community for their persistence through hard times. She also gave her concerns for solar projects and the COVID-19 vaccine.

1st and 2nd Round of Brownfield Remediation Grants Approved

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Fairfield County Land Reutilization Corporation received funding for the former Bulk Petroleum property project at \$278,617 for assessment activities. This property was first commercially developed in the 1960s and utilized for petroleum product storage and distribution until the late 1990s. Brownfield Remediation Funds will help assess the extent of any contamination, including groundwater and soil testing. After testing and needed remediation, this property would be once again developable for the city of Pickerington.

Any brownfield grant funding that was not allocated during rounds one and two of funding will be available to all counties during round three of funding. The application process for round three funding will open on July 1, 2022.

Commissioner Fix welcomed everyone in attendance and thanked them all for joining for this exciting announcement. The Commissioners and their staff have been working hard to find the best use of the ARP funding and determine which projects would receive ARP funding. ARP funding has a list of allowable uses those eligible projects must meet. The Commissioners thought it helpful to create a Strategic Plan for the entire county to determine areas of focus in the county. The pillars of the Strategic Plan include Infrastructure, Social Services, Housing, Workforce Development, Economic Development, and County Operations. Commissioner Fix spoke on the quality of the project proposals requesting ARP funding.

Commissioner Levacy spoke on the need for sustainable infrastructure, and the importance of connectivity. He announced the projects receiving ARP funding that fell under the infrastructure pillar on the Strategic Plan. These projects are necessary for improving services and improving the health and wellness of County residents.

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Baltimore Village Administrator Teri Wise thanked the Commissioners for providing the project funding for their infrastructure project. She stated that a goal of hers has been to provide services without adding additional costs to the residents of Baltimore.

Commissioner Levacy introduced County Administrator Aundrea Cordle to speak on Social Services. Aundrea thanked those with project proposals that fall under this pillar, and announced the projects under this pillar that would be receiving ARP funding.

Judge Terri Vandervoort spoke about the purpose of the Juvenile & Probate Court. She offered statistics on the juveniles that her office sees. She shared that the bulk of her assets were being directed towards truancy cases and being diverted away from other necessary services.

Commissioner Davis spoke about the Housing Coalition Summit the Commissioners had attended the previous December. Since that summit, concerns have changed as prices have increased. He announced the projects that would be receiving ARP funding under the housing pillar. Homelessness continues to be a problem for communities. He appreciates the opportunity to be helpful to the issue and welcomes Marcy Fields to speak more on the issue.

Executive Director of ADAMH Marcy Fields spoke about the housing needs in the community. She is appreciative of the funding which will get ADAMH closer to their goals. She explained some of the plans and changes that are coming to ADAMH to improve services and support the residents that need it and explained the phases of their plans for the future. She thanked the Commissioners for this opportunity.

Commissioner Fix spoke on the projects receiving funding under the Workforce Development and Economic Development pillars. Many townships and villages don't have the resources or expertise to apply for grants for economic and workforce development and one of the uses of this funding is to hire a professional grant writing team.

Cheryl Ricketts spoke about the Agriculture Society. She thanked the Commissioners for their commitment to agriculture in Fairfield County. She provided a summary of some of the improvements the Agriculture Society has made and what they plan to do in the future. As a result of what they have been able to do, they plan to make some improvements to the Fairgrounds. She stated her appreciation for the support from the Commissioners for providing them with the opportunity to make improvements.

Deputy County Administrator Jeff Porter announced the projects receiving funding under the pillar for County Operations. He explained some of the improvements that have been conducted Regular Meeting #25 - 2022 – June 21, 2022- 14 -

in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic. He also explained some improvements the Sheriff's Office will conduct for improving communication and services. - Premium pay for essential workers: Offer additional support to those who have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure. Funds can be used retroactively back to January 27, 2020.
- Water, sewer and broadband infrastructure: Make necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, invest in wastewater and stormwater infrastructure and provide unserved or underserved locations with new or expanded broadband access


