Fairfield Forward

Special Events/County Fair Support

Dr. Brown reported there was a flier in the review packet about Fairfield Forward.

- The Lancaster Festival begins July 23, and there is an ArtWalk.
- There is an outdoor movie (Goonies and free!) at the Bandstand on Saturday, August 14.
- The dedication of the Patriotic Mural is August 17th.
- There is an open house tentatively planned for 108 N. High on September 21.
- The State of the County Address is September 28. We are accepting input for the address.

We are making progress with the subgrant agreement for the County Fair.

A draft agreement was in the review packet.

The Fair Board meets on July 20 in the evening.

There is also a potential CORSA safety grant for the fairgrounds track.

Strategic Planning

Main Uses of the ARP Fiscal Recovery Funds

We will be using the Fairfield Forward theme for strategic planning. We anticipate catalytic uses of the ARP fiscal recovery funds. There are two main uses for us:

- 1. Responding to the public health emergency with respect to the COVID19 or its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and nonprofits, or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality.
- 2. Making necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure.

As we think about the first purpose, we will need to:

• Identify a need or negative impact of the public health emergency,

- Identify how the county investment would specifically address that need, and
- Readily explain how the investment helps the county respond to the disease or the harmful economic consequences of the economic disruption.

July 27 Kick-off Meeting

July 27 marks the community strategic planning kick-off. The purpose of this kick-off meeting is to introduce the process and expectations for strategic planning to elected officials and department heads of the county.

Stakeholder groups will have additional opportunities to participate.

Fiscal Recovery Reports

There was a summary of fiscal recovery funds through June 30 in the review packet.

There is an article of interest about the business planning tools in the review packet. The RFP for these technical services will soon be issued.

We have issued an RFP for the HVAC equipment improvements for Utilities and Development Disabilities Buildings, and we will be evaluating those proposals in the coming days. There will be a new resolution proposed for ARP use and appropriations prior to the letting of a contract with the selected vendor.

Mr. Keller reported on how HVAC technology has changed and how this will affect the project.

Mr. Keller also introduced Brad Berry, the newest maintenance employee. Mr. Berry is an assistant supervisor for the Facilities Maintenance Team.

• Legal Update

Mr. Horacek announced there was an annexation resolution on the agenda for approval today. The board is required to approve the resolution. Next week's annexation hearing is for a different type of annexation.

He also reminded everyone of the procurement training is this week, July 22 at 2 pm.

Thanks to Josh Horacek and Amy Brown-Thompson for preparing this training.

Mr. Davis mentioned the Commission was invited to a meeting on Friday relating to the opioid litigation. He does not think anything the Commission can say or do will alter the trajectory of the meeting.

The State of the County Address is scheduled for September 28 at the WigWam. We are accepting ideas about the Address.

b. Highlights of Resolutions

Dr. Brown highlighted 15 resolutions for the voting meeting.

- We had a resolution to vacate two alleys reviewed in public hearing last week.
- RPC proposed conditional acceptance of Rolling Hills subdivision.
- We had a resolution to approve a Type 1 expedited annexation of 55+/- acres from Violet Township to the City of Canal Winchester. The approval of the annexation does not alter the utilities service area for Fairfield County. This will be noted on the resolution to approve the expedited Type 1 annexation. There will be language in the annexation resolution that points out how the county intends to maintain its service area.

There was an economic development agreement with Violet Township and Canal Winchester that would suggest that the service area would be altered, as Canal Winchester (who has yet another agreement with Violet Township and the City of Pickerington) included an economic development agreement that states the service area would change.

These separate political subdivisions do not have authority to change the county rights for utilities, and the agreement with the annexation packet does disclaim that, as well.

In addition, Dr. Brown spoke with Attorney Thad Boggs on July 13th. Attorney Boggs represents the City of Canal Winchester. He stated the City of Canal Winchester did not expect the rights for utilities to be altered by the annexation process.

Mr. Vogel spoke to the additional language in the annexation resolution and how not including it may lead to the assumption the county was giving up their rights, and that is not the case.

A copy of the annexation resolution was reviewed.

There were 12 financial and grant related resolutions to approve:

- Appropriations from unappropriated funds for IT for electronic signature improvements;
- Appropriations for an Ohio EPA grant, Juvenile Court grants, and for the TCAP grant (five resolutions);
- A fund-to-fund transfer for EMA;
- Account-to-account transfers of appropriations to classify expenditures correctly (two resolutions);
- A reimbursement for JFS, for the EPIC grant;
- A resolution to approve a use of American Rescue Plan fiscal recovery funds and approve appropriations from unappropriated funds in a major

expenditure category, for contracted services to facilitate ARP related fiscal recovery by obtaining input and feedback from community stakeholders for a community strategic plan for fiscal recovery; and

• Payment of bills over \$100,000.

There are additional financial and contracting resolutions in queue.

c. Administrative, Program, and Budget Update

Administrative & Program Updates

Administrative Approvals

The review packet contained a list of administrative approvals. There were no questions posed.

Outreach re: Rushcreek Estates Ditch Maintenance District

The packets for the Rushcreek Estates Ditch Maintenance District have been distributed properly. The Commission has reached out to property owners with available phone numbers, as well. The packet includes contact information for the County Engineer, as well. The County Engineer has not received any calls about the materials sent.

Destination Downtown Update

Dr. Brown reported people are very excited about the ArtWalk and Lancaster Festival. Everyone appreciated the painting of the poles at the Government Services Center on Main Street. There is excitement about ongoing placemaking efforts.

We shared how the Patriotic Mural at Amstutz was being dedicated on August 17th.

We shared a photo of the Foster the Future Mural in progress at the Records Center. This mural is a work in progress. It will provide a colorful placemaking backdrop, and it has a positive message about foster care and parenting.

IT Strategic Planning Update

Since October 2020, Carri Brown has led an IT Workgroup with open representation of county leaders. The purpose of the workgroup was to identify strategic IT projects to improve public services.

Four Key, Strategic Projects

The group has identified and developed responses to a template for strategic development for key projects:

- Conference room equipment upgrades
- Court Case Management for Juvenile and Probate Court
- Clerk of Courts Case Management
- Public Safety System Improvements

These four projects are estimated to require resources of \$4 M for their first year of implementation. Follow up costs are for maintenance and have also been estimated. Each of these projects improve public services, and the templates provide details on the improvements.

Additional IT Projects

There are additional projects identified for:

- Last mile broadband improvements,
- IT infrastructure (a server) & MUNIS SAAS evaluation,
- BOE pollbooks, and
- Replacement computers.

IT is in the process of developing templates and justification for these four projects.

Also, there will be needs for the *Government Service Center in Pickerington*, and those needs will be identified within the GSC project workgroup.

And *Filemaker or database enhanced options* will be available in 2022 and beyond as the needs arise and are justified.

Two Projects Underway

A project for electronic signatures is underway; IT is leading this project. The Sheriff will be identifying portable radio needs. There have been recent, significant upgrades for radios, making this next phase less critical than the public safety system improvements noted above.

Telecommunications

Telecommunications needs are reaching mission critical status. There is a subgroup preparing a recommendation for a solution. IT is leading the subgroup and will have a fully developed recommendation by the end of the year. Costs have not been determined.

Digitization

There is a subgroup for digitization which is functioning well. Randy Carter is leading this subgroup. There is a significant project envisioned for the Recorder.

311-Communications

A non-emergency number that people may call for information is envisioned and tasked forward after the main priorities above are met.

Overall costs identified are \$5.76 M over four years. Not all costs have been identified as of July 15, 2021.

A spreadsheet and strategic template are available.

Carri Brown and Aunie Cordle are available to help with evaluation and funding proposals. Dan Neeley will lead the group through their next meetings, which are scheduled through 2021.

Leadership Development

We continue to receive excellent feedback about the leadership academy of the National Association of Counties.

Last year at the Leadership Conference, which was a virtual conference, we announced the opportunity for this professional development series. More than 60 employees have taken this training or have signed up to take the training. We will

continue to recognize the good work of employees taking this training and will continue to coach and development our leaders who are seeking to improve their skills.

Budget Update

Ongoing Sales Tax Review & Budget Review

The sales tax estimate for 2021 in Fairfield County is \$23.6 M, or 3% above the sales tax revenues of 2020. We are tracking ahead of that estimate, but we have not changed the projection or planning tool.

For May sales tax revenues, to be paid to the County in August, the non-auto sales tax revenues for Fairfield County were \$1.827 M, or 21% above the previous year. In 2019, total sales tax revenues were \$1.867. Auto sales tax of about \$100K will equal a 3% increase over 2019. We will continue to monitor sales tax revenues. The state experienced a 20% increase overall in non-auto sales tax revenues, as compared to the prior year.

YTD sales tax revenues, including the receipt in July, are \$15.25 M, or 20% above the previous year. As of mid-year, sales tax receipts were almost \$13 M, or about 15% above the previous year. We expect high percentage increases and a leveling off to about a 3% increase over time.

All revenue categories increased except for interest income, which is expected based on the drop in interest rates.

At mid -year, revenues are up 14.55%, and expenditures are about flat.

We expect increases in expenditures based on negotiated agreements and projects that are beginning to take off.

On July 27th, there will be an additional mid-year review of the budget.

A preview was in the review packet along with revenue reports.

Bond Rating/Energy Conservation Project, Part 2

As expected, on July 14, the county's bond rating with Moody's was affirmed as the rating of Aa2, which is above average of Ohio counties and reflects the financial stability of the county.

We are on schedule for the financing of the energy conservation project part 2. We plan to close early in September. In the hallways of the Administrative Courthouse, there are pictures of the planned projects. A summary of the project scope is in the review packet. This project has been discussed several times in public meeting. If anyone has any questions, contact Carri Brown or Dennis Keller.

Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization

Ohio Rural Transportation Organizations will now have access to \$2.6 million annually for transportation-related projects. These are RTPO dedicated funds which has been one of the primary goals of existing RTPOs since their inception, therefore this is an important milestone. The funds will be allocated to RTPOs based on a population. CORPO will have a total of \$991,154 over fiscal years 2022 and 2023. There will be more information to come in September.

Certified Government Financial Manager

Dr. Brown is a Certified Government Financial Manager. If there are other professionals in county government who would like to obtain this certification, they should reach out to Dr. Brown. Dr. Brown is required to maintain 80 hours of professional continuing education. Commissioner Levacy authorized reimbursement for a virtual conference, of which Dr. Brown will be able to attend one day based on the Commission schedule.

Thank you to the Facilities Team and the Community Services volunteers for painting the light poles at the Government Services Center on Main Street in Lancaster.

Mr. Davis reported on a CFLP subcommittee meeting he attended last week. The committee is working on a long-term budget for CFLP.

Commissioner Levacy and Dr. Brown participated in the FMC strategic planning sessions on July 14th.

Members of the GSC in Pickerington work group continue to evaluate options for the new building.

The state of Ohio has grants administered by the Department of Development to support small businesses. The program guidelines, terms and conditions, and required documentation for the programs are available at BusinessHelp.Ohio.Gov. Applications opened June 29 and will remain open until funds are exhausted.

Aunie Cordle reported that the employee change for the insurance deduction to 15% occurred on May 21st in response to a question from Commissioner Davis, who commented on various changes in elected official pay, including the change in deduction and the change to being paid twice monthly instead of on the pattern employees are paid, every two weeks.

Commissioner Davis commented that the mediation with Franklin County will occur soon. Fairfield County won the case with the Franklin County Cooperative, and the county has agreed to mediation. The case itself has a potential to impact the employee health benefits plan into the future.
