Review Meeting

The Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. in the Administrative Courthouse, 210 E. Main St. Lancaster, OH. Commissioner Steve Davis called the meeting to order, and Commissioners David Levacy and Jeff Fix were also in attendance. Welcome

Commissioner Davis opened the meeting by welcoming those in attendance and outlining the order of business. He then invited Commissioner Fix to present a proclamation recognizing the Canal Winchester Chamber of Commerce on its 70th Anniversary.

Commissioner Fix presented the proclamation to representatives of the Canal Winchester Chamber of Commerce in recognition of the organization's seven decades of service to the community.

Elizabeth Wood, President of the Canal Winchester Chamber of Commerce, accepted the proclamation and thanked the Board for the recognition and its continued support of the Chamber.

Presentation of the 2026 Ohio Counties Scholarship for Central Ohio

Rachel Reedy, CCAO Outreach & Member Engagement Manager, presented the 2026 Central Ohio CCAO Scholarship. She noted that Commissioner Fix was instrumental in establishing the scholarship program in 2023. Reedy announced that Sadie Moore had been selected as this year's recipient and highlighted her many accomplishments, including her involvement in 4-H and the National Honor Society. She also read an excerpt from Sadie's scholarship application.

Sadie Moore thanked the County Commissioners Association of Ohio for the scholarship, stating that it was both an honor and a privilege to receive the award. She expressed her gratitude for being part of Fairfield County and shared that she will begin her studies at The Ohio State University this fall.

Commissioner Davis congratulated Ms. Moore, commenting on her confidence and the professionalism with which she carried herself.

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Regional Planning Commission Updates

Holly Mattei, Interim Director of the Regional Planning Commission (RPC), introduced herself and the RPC staff, including the department's intern and Kelsey Miller from the Crossroads team. She explained that the Regional Planning Commission is an independent commission established under the Ohio Revised Code and is comprised of citizen representatives as well as representatives from the county's cities, villages, and townships.

Kelsey Miller provided an overview of the administration of the county's subdivision regulations, emphasizing the review process and coordination with applicants to ensure quality development.

Joshua Hillberry discussed the administration of floodplain management and zoning assistance, including work on model zoning codes for Thurston, Millersport, Greenfield Township, and the Village of Rushville. He also highlighted the RPC's administration of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) programs.

Nicholas Eastham provided an update on the Commercial Building Department, noting that the department currently has 65 active permits, an increase from 40 in 2025. He also discussed the Fair Housing Office, which is housed within the department, and reviewed the protected classes covered under fair housing laws.

Mattei concluded the presentation with an overview of the RPC's long-range planning initiatives. She discussed the County Comprehensive Plan, housing needs strategies, cooperative approaches to development, and agreements for development, including the county's first Cooperative Economic Development Agreement (CEDA). She also emphasized the importance of community engagement in long-range planning efforts and noted that both Building Department permits, and lot split applications, are now available through an online system. She reminded the Board that the Regional Planning Commission meets on the first Tuesday of each month at the Records Center.

The Commissioners expressed their appreciation to Holly Mattei and the Regional Planning Commission staff for the work they perform in support of Fairfield County's municipalities, villages, and townships.

Continuation of First Hearing, Ditch Petition, Sturbridge Meadows, 9:20 a.m.

Commissioner Davis reopened the Ditch Petition Hearing and reviewed the order of proceedings. He noted that the Board had previously received the Engineer's report and recommendation that the petition be denied. Commissioner Davis asked County Engineer Jeremiah Upp if he had any additional comments, and Engineer Upp indicated that he did not. Commissioner Davis then administered the oath to all individuals who wished to provide testimony.

The following residents offered testimony in opposition to the petition:

Chris Matheny, Wayside Drive, stated that he did not believe the proposed project would provide any benefit to his property as it is not affected by drainage from the farmland.

Tom Marthaller, Wayside Drive, testified that he opposed the petition because he believed few property owners would benefit from the project. He also expressed concern that many residents are retired or nearing retirement and are not in a financial position to absorb the assessment.

Kim Perry, Wayside Drive, stated that she did not believe her property would benefit from the proposed improvements and questioned why only certain homes were included in the assessment area.

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Robert Helfrich, Wayside Drive, testified that he felt the original notice did not clearly explain the scope of the project. He expressed concern that the proposal negatively affected home sales in the neighborhood and stated that only a small number of properties would benefit while many homeowners would bear significant costs.

Brett Baucher, Wayside Drive, testified that he opposed the petition because he did not believe the project would provide any benefit to his property.

Zachariah Hails, Wayside Drive, stated that he opposed the petition because he did not see any benefit to his property.

Dale Sunderland, Wayside Drive, testified that the project would have a significant financial impact on him. He explained that the proposed improvements would require removal of his garage, which he uses for work, as well as numerous mature trees on neighboring properties. At 82 years of age, he stated that he could not afford the anticipated assessment.

Commissioner Davis asked if anyone wished to speak in favor of the petition. No one came forward.

Commissioner Davis then requested procedural guidance from the Prosecutor's Office regarding the Board's action on the petition.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Amy Brown-Thompson advised that the Board could act by voice vote rather than by resolution. When asked about appeal rights, she explained that if the petition were approved, those opposed to the project would have 30 days to appeal the decision.

Commissioner Fix asked Engineer Upp to clarify the estimated cost of the project.

Engineer Upp stated that the current estimate was approximately \$1.1 million to be divided among property owners based on the statutory assessment process. He explained that although some residents believed they would not benefit from the improvements, each assessed property contributes drainage to the watershed and was therefore included in the engineer's review.

Commissioner Fix made a motion to deny the petition, seconded by Commissioner Levacy.

Commissioner Fix added that, while he understood the drainage concerns, the estimated assessment was too great to justify the anticipated benefits. He noted that Ohio law requires the Board to consider the statutory criteria, including whether the benefits outweigh the costs, and concluded that the project did not meet that standard.

Commissioner Levacy agreed, stating that while some properties experience greater drainage issues than others, the overall cost of the project was too substantial to justify approval. He added that if the estimated cost had been significantly lower, the outcome may have been different, but under the current proposal he could not conclude that the benefits outweighed the expense.

Commissioner Davis stated that, after considering the statutory criteria required under the Ohio Revised Code, he believed the petition satisfied the first criterion but did not satisfy the remaining two criteria necessary for approval.

Roll call vote of the motion resulted as follows:

Voting aye thereon: Jeff Fix, David Levacy, and Steve Davis

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Following the vote, Commissioner Davis acknowledged that the decision was difficult for everyone involved. He stated that he understood the proposed improvements could have provided some benefit to portions of the area but concluded that the statutory requirements for approval had not been met. He advised those in attendance that there is a 30-day period in which the decision may be appealed.

With no further business, Commissioner Davis adjourned the hearing at 9:42 a.m.

Public Comments

John Thompson, of Sudbury Drive, addressed the Board regarding the broader infrastructure challenges in the area, noting that the property lies near the Fairfield and Licking County line. He stated that existing water and sewer infrastructure is already strained and encouraged the Commissioners to work collaboratively with Licking County officials to address regional drainage and infrastructure needs. He suggested exploring long-term solutions, including regional water management projects, and urged the Board to consider the cumulative development demands affecting the area.

Sherry Lape, of Sudbury Drive, addressed the Board regarding hearing on the ditch petition. She stated that the proposed improvements would benefit two subdivisions and a roadway. She expressed her belief that grant funding may be available to help offset project costs. She also shared her opinion that the project had been over-engineered, contributing to its high estimated cost. She encouraged the Commissioners to consider that some individuals who testified in opposition were not Fairfield County residents and emphasized that the drainage issues extend beyond her property, affecting multiple homeowners who have experienced significant drainage-related damage.

Rob [Last Name Unconfirmed] addressed the Board and stated that he did not believe Joe Pickering was the property owner of the affected parcel and, therefore, questioned his authority to speak in opposition to the petition. He also expressed his belief that inaccurate information had been presented by the farmer regarding the project.

Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday

Ohio's sales tax holiday will return to its traditional back-to-school format this year after the expanded holidays offered in 2024 and 2025. The tax-free weekend will take place from Friday, August 7, through Sunday, August 9, and will exempt sales tax on clothing priced at \$75 or less, school supplies costing \$20 or less, and school instructional materials priced at \$20 or less. Unlike the past two years, counties will not be reimbursed for the sales tax revenue lost during the holiday.

Resolution Review

- The first resolution on the agenda is for a proclamation to recognize the Canal Winchester Chamber of Commerce on its 70th Anniversary. This proclamation honors the Chamber's seven decades of service and leadership in supporting local businesses, economic development, and community growth. Since its founding in 1956, the Chamber has helped guide Canal Winchester's transformation into a thriving commercial center and, through its partnership with the Fairfield 33 Development Alliance, has strengthened regional economic development efforts. - And the Commissioners have a resolution to appropriate money for Fund #2683, the 911 Wireless Fund.
- Economic and Workforce Development has two resolutions to authorize a partial assignment and assumption agreement related to the Fairfield County Route 33 CRA. The first resolution is between Fairfield County and Basil Western Logistics, LLC, and the second between the County and OH Basil Western GPF-Roebling 2026.
- JFS has a resolution to approve a service agreement between Fairfield County JFS, Workforce Development Services, and Eastland-Fairfield Career & Technical Schools (EFCTS) to provide a part-time instructor from EFCTS Adult Workforce Development, for GED preparation and Basic Skills/Academic Enrichment for Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act eligible participants.

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Updates from Elected Officials and Department Heads

County Engineer Jeremiah Upp reported that the department remains busy during the construction season. He noted that the Engineer's Office transitions to a four 10-hour workday schedule when it benefits operations. Upp also reminded motorists, particularly motorcyclists, to use caution on recently chip-sealed roads and noted that a list of those roadways is available on the Engineer's Office website.

County Auditor Dr. Carri Brown reported that the Fairfield County Budget Commission recently met to approve public fund allocations. She stated that Madison Township will remain in fiscal emergency for another reporting cycle, explaining that the designation is primarily due to reporting and communication issues. Dr. Brown also stated that the average home value in Fairfield County now exceeds \$300,000, with the average home sale price reaching approximately \$391,000 in June, reflecting a strong seller market. She added that the Auditor's Office continues to make progress on technology upgrades and highlighted the U.S. 33 corridor as the office's current "Map of the Month."

Commissioner Davis asked whether Madison Township's offices were fully staffed.

Dr. Brown responded that they were and noted that the township fiscal officer is an elected position.

Tony Vogel reported that the final easements for the State Route 204 project will be presented to the Board on the August 11 agenda. He explained that the final property owner is expected to sign the easement once the resolution is approved, allowing construction to move forward throughout the remainder of the project area.

Commissioner Fix thanked Tony Vogel for his continued assistance with development projects, particularly those involving Liberty Center and the Village of Millersport, and with development discussions with the county's townships and villages.

Rick Szabrak reported that he recently spoke at the County Commissioners Association of Ohio (CCAO) conference, where attendees expressed interest in sending representatives from other counties to Fairfield County to learn about its approach to managing growth and development. He also highlighted the success of the inaugural Level Up Skills Camp, which received coverage from 10TV; and praised Lancaster High School's new career and technical education facility. Szabrak added that local school districts have experienced workforce leadership changes and that productive discussions are underway regarding future workforce partnerships.

County Administrator Aundrea Cordle added that, during a recent tour of the Lancaster High School facility, Superintendent Nathan Hale demonstrated how the new classrooms incorporate workforce development programs and partnerships with the Fairfield Workforce Center.

Commissioner Levacy commented on the growing value and impact of the Fairfield Workforce Center.

Szabrak added that 101 students graduated from workforce programs last year, noting that the programs benefit both students and local school district budgets.

Jon Kochis reported that construction on the Feters Run project began earlier in the week. He stated that the project bid came in under budget, allowing the county to expand the scope of improvements along the river corridor after receiving the necessary approvals.

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Commissioner Davis recognized the many individuals whose efforts contributed to the successful return of the Lancaster Festival and thanked county staff for their work in making the event a success.

Corey Clark reminded everyone that Child Support Awareness Day would be observed on August 5 and encouraged employees to wear green in recognition of the occasion.

Jeff Porter reported that the Request for Proposals (RFP) for temporary employment services has been posted on the county website. He also stated that he is working with Prosecutor Amy Brown-Thompson and Clerk of Courts Branden Meyer to evaluate public records request software that would improve the county's public records process.

Heather O'Keefe reported that a replacement has been hired for the Fairfield County Family and Children First Council (FCFC) following Tiffany Wilson's departure.

Old Business

Commissioner Levacy shared that he toured the new Lancaster High School and was impressed by the facility, particularly the workforce development area that provides students with hands-on training and skills in their chosen career paths. He also reported that the Veterans Hall of Fame met last week and encouraged additional nominations before the September 1 deadline.

Commissioner Davis congratulated the Festival Board on a successful festival and an outstanding closing concert, noting it was a wonderful evening and again expressing appreciation for everyone's efforts. He also shared that he participated in an administrative meeting regarding a potential capital project, with additional information expected in the future.

New Business

Commissioner Levacy announced that he will be attending a meeting of the Governor's Executive Workforce Committee.

Commissioner Davis discussed the proposed changes to the Multi-County Juvenile Detention Center (MCJDC) funding formula. He noted that a similar discussion regarding a three-year lookback occurred approximately six years ago, at which time he opposed the proposal. Commissioner Davis explained that all four participating counties had previously agreed to a revised cost-sharing formula. However, Licking County Commissioner Tim Bubb has proposed implementing a rolling three-year lookback, with each of the next three years using its own three-year average to determine each county's share of the costs. Commissioner Davis stated that he has discussed the funding calculations with Commissioner Bubb and believes the proposal is a reasonable approach. He indicated that when the commissioners meet to consider the matter, he intends to support the proposal.

Commissioner Fix commented that he believes the proposed funding approach is reasonable.

Commissioner Levacy expressed his agreement with the proposal.
